LONG BEACH, Calif., Feb. 18.—Announcement was made here today of the receipt of information from Miss Martha Stager, of Portland, Oregon, that she has sent a telegram to William Wrigley, Jr., in Chicago, accepting his \$25,000 wager backing George Young, youthful Canadian swimmer, against any challenger for another race across the San Pedro channel from Santa Catalina Island to the mainland.
Miss Stager, who was one of the contestants of the Wrigley marathon in the channel swim which was won by George, informed a local newspaper that she had made the only condition of the race that it be made from Avalon, Santa Catalina Island to the mainland at Long Beach. She stated she had obtained the financial backing of a Los Angeles oil man.

automatically become law.
Mr. Coolidge undoubtedly will take no action until he has conferred with Secretary Jardine and probably other members of his cabinet. Because of this, several days are expected to elapse before a pronouncement, if any is made.
Final action by congress came last night after nine hours of feverish discussion in the house during which the bill's supporters in steam roller fashion crashed more than 100 attempts to change it.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—Final congressional action on radio control legislation was taken today by the senate with the adoption of the conference report.

The measure, which was approved by the senate without a record vote now goes to President Coolidge, who is expected to approve it and to send to the senate before adjournment the names of the five men who are to compose the commission which will have absolute control over radio for one year.

Additional marines are being sent to Nicaragua, it was said today at the White House, because of reports that shipments of arms are on the way into the country from the outside.

The prospect of increasing the number of the President's lieutenants, a further degree of jeopardy for Americans in Nicaragua, and the administration is taking steps to meet that danger.

Building Money Asked.
President Coolidge today asked congress for \$19,878,700 to initiate the administration's public building program.

This is the sum required for the first year of the \$215,000,000 program for new public buildings throughout the country.
The money would be made available during the fiscal year beginning next July 1.

Portland Benefited.
PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 18.—Plans for a new federal court building at Portland, appropriation of \$300,000 for which was asked today by President Coolidge, contemplate sale of the old postoffice and federal courthouse site bounded by Morrison, Yamhill, Sixth and Fifth streets, and use of the proceeds together with the amount appropriated by congress for erection of a new building at another site. The \$380,000 requested would be used for purchase of a site, W. D. B. Bodson, secretary-manager of the Chamber of Commerce believes. The present site is expected to bring between \$1,200,000 and \$1,700,000.
