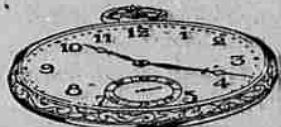

Did You Ever Stop to Think

United States Senator Hiram Bingham, of Connecticut, says:

That the Federal Government is already far too complicated to give real satisfaction. It no longer commands the respect of the citizens that it did a generation ago. And yet many of our good friends who seek the betterment of our people would make it still more complex by adding to the duties and burdens of the administration at Washington.

One of the reasons why our system of government has succeeded is that enough matters of real, vital interest have had to be decided by local officials to draw men of ability and ambition into local affairs. Life is too full of interesting jobs to permit able, intelligent citizens to accept willingly local offices which give them no chance of exercising their talents or of showing their ability as desirable representatives in executive or legislative positions.

If you take away from the state legislatures the responsibility for making proper laws relating to schools, roads, sanitation, and the welfare of the individual citizen, you take away the things in which the individual citizen is most interested. He will stop voting in state elections. You will eventually teach the citizen that these important matters are none of his business. Citizens for whom everything is done by an all-wise central government will not develop political self-reliance or political self-respect.

The fathers of our country, the makers of our constitution, learned how to govern, learned how to

make laws, in the school of local self-government. In the Colonial assemblies, in the legislatures of their several states.

If you desire to develop good law-makers you must give them experience in the making of laws. If you wish to continue the blessings of representative government, you must give the representatives sufficient responsibilities to increase their capacity, to train their judgment, and to test their qualities.
