would cause additional rises. The river reached a stage of 25.3 feet at Yuma, Ariz., yesterday. Reports from Phoenix, Ariz., said 150,000 second feet of water were pulling over the Gillespie dam and rushing down toward the junction with the Colorado near Yuma.

Embankments are being thrown across the sloughs leading to the old bee channel in an effort to prevent the flood waters from reaching the Volcano Lake levee, the main line of defense for the valley farms.

Death Toll Increases

Conditions in other sections approached normal today following the storm which during the first four days of the week deluged the southland. Although no additional property damage was reported, the death toll had mounted to 25 last night with the discovery of three more bodies in the wake of the storm.

The latest fatality was revealed when the body of R. R. Fore, Los Angeles aviator, was found floating in the surf near San Diego. His plane was wrecked when he ran in to a dense fog while carrying a cargo of yeast to San Diego bakers who were threatened with a famine.

With San Diego still cut off from all and highway communication yesterday naval craft were pressed into service to carry mail to the southern city when eagle boat No. 30, loaded with sacks of delayed mail, put out from San Pedro.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—Assurance that the provision for the building of a common carrier railroad would be retained in the contract for timber awarded Fred Herrick in Grant county, Oregon, was given today to the senate public lands committee by W. B. Greeley, chief of the forest service. Under cross-examination at the hearing by the committee for plans for cancellation of the contract, Greeley insisted to counsel of Grant county citizens that he would listen to their interests in the case.

Counsel for Herrick informed the committee that if there was any fear that the contract would permit a protracted period of idleness in operation of the timber grant, that Herrick was willing to modify it.
