held responsible for the high waters.

The big dam at West Fir, on the upper Willamette, was reported this morning to have been washed out, but the report could not be verified.

A small roadhouse at Judkins Point, on the Pacific highway just south of here, was reported washed away.

A service station between here and Springfield was moved across the highway by the flood water. A grocery store was moved, for some distance.

The Pacific highway was covered by water on both sides of Eugene, and cars were unable to get through.

Cascade Line Is Blocked. A slide on the Southern Pacific Cascade line near Wicopce blocked through traffic to Klamath Falls and the service still is cut today.

At many points between here and Roseburg on the old line the railroad was under water, and a careful patrol was being made to avert danger from washouts.

All streets east of Sixth in Springfield were reported to be under nearly six inches of water.

Several people spent the early morning hours in trees, waiting for rescue boats. One boatload tipped

GREAT DAMAGE DONE TO ROADS AND BRIDGES

hours of hard effort on the part of the workmen.

Sutherland Flooded Sutherland was badly flooded Sunday, the water running more than two feet deep in the streets and getting into many of the buildings.

On the highway south of the road was under water for a long distance but was passable. The water running across the pavement threatened to take out a bridge between Wilbur and Sutherland and all Sunday afternoon State Traffic Officer Thurber maintained a guard at Camp View.

In Roseburg the flood did a great deal of damage. In the residential districts along the river a number of houses were flooded, while all of the bridges were endangered. At the foot of Mosher street, Hoover street and other places in the Grove the water came up to the houses and forced the residents to vacate, some of the residents being removed from their homes by boat.

The same condition prevailed at Deer Creek where houses on the north end of Rose street were flooded. One family was forced to move out at 3 o'clock Monday morning and county roads.

The camp grounds furnished a sight which drew hundreds of spectators Sunday and Monday. The high water in the South Umpqua and the volume of water in Deer Creek combined to form a most serious condition at the camp grounds. The cabins along the creek bank were completely inundated. In the morning, the bridges and grounds were flooded. The buildings were all roped and anchored and during the night workmen engaged themselves in the task of preventing as much damage as possible.

Highway Covered Further south, in the Winston and Happy Valley districts, the excessive water flooded the highway and county roads. Isolating the residents, while at Dillard the highway was all under water and the garden tracts on the lower lands were inundated, the residents being forced to flee to higher ground.

Similar conditions prevailed further south, particularly in Canyon Creek canyon, below Canyonville. The swollen stream washed out chunks of the highway pavement, and threatened to take out a bridge, the road being blocked for many hours.

Many Bridges Swept Away. In the country districts scores of bridges were washed out and fields under from one to four feet of water.

Automobile traffic on the Pacific highway in the Siskiyou mountains was halted and north-bound motorists held at Red Bluff, Calif., owing to storm conditions in northern California.

Rogue river overflowed and is running level over the Gold Ray dam. The Bybee bridge district was a lake.

In the business district of Medford, many business basements were flooded due to clogged storm sewers.

Portions of the Pacific highway between this city and Gold Hill were undermined.

Many Families Marooned GRANT'S PASS, Ore., Feb. 21.—Flood damage in this vicinity may reach more than \$100,000, reports today indicated. All wires to outlying districts were down this morning, and it was impossible to obtain information concerning damage in the Illinois and Apollo gate river valleys, where streams were out of banks. Many families were marooned by the highest water in 25 years. No loss of life was reported. The streams were subsiding today.

All highway and railroad communication was out this morning. Polk County Situation. WINDYBENDER, Ore., Feb. 21.—WHERE the river here rises a half foot above this morning, no immediate relief is expected from flood conditions. At 10 o'clock it was 20 feet above normal. Many farmers in the lowlands on both sides of the river are out off from outside communications and hundreds of sheep and stock are marooned on lonely knolls.

Santiam Bridge Submerged. JEFFERSON, Ore., Feb. 21.—The Pacific highway south of the Santiam river bridge at Jefferson is under water this morning and patrol officers have been placed at the bridge to keep motorists from going through. A dike placed along the river above the bridge after high water four years ago that washed out several hundred feet of highway at this place gave way during the night and a torrent is rushing over the road.

EXPECT POWER SOON

T. H. Ness, manager of the Umpqua division of the California Oregon Power company, reported at 8 o'clock tonight that he had received word that Copco repair crews were on the Days Creek dike and were headed north and that the line had been opened to that point. They are making excellent progress and Mr. Ness believes that service can possibly be restored to normal unless unforeseen difficulties arise. It will take considerable time to restore the service from the north, as more than one mile of the line near Cottage Grove has been washed out, poles and all. Mr. Ness and the Copco employees have given line service in the emergency, despite tremendous handicaps. With the main line out of commission and with high water preventing the operation of the emergency plant at Winchester, they secured steam in the old plant and supplied the essential industries of the city before noon this morning and at night continued the emergency service and supplied the street lights for the protection of the residents.

LOCAL COUPLE WED SATURDAY

FEDERAL COUNSEL ACCUSES STATEN OF FALSE STORY

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 21.—Another chapter in the aftermath of trial of three state prohibition agents here a year ago developed today when Assistant United States District Attorney McElchris filed affidavits in which he sought to show that James W. Staten, confessed bootlegger, had made conflicting statements regarding his part in a local liquor ring. The affidavits were in answer to statements made in a confession written in federal court two weeks ago by Staten, in which he charged that former federal Prohibition Director Dr. J. A. Linville and his legal advisor, Attorney Frank Mitchell, had been involved in a liquor ring. Charges that Arthur Christensen, Robert and A. C. Smith, brothers, and Claude Hart, a local grocer, received \$500 for liquor from local bootleggers that never was delivered, were made in a letter which Staten is alleged to have written to Assistant United States District Attorney Stearns. This letter was introduced today. Staten charged in the letter that he had been offered a bribe of \$150 to leave town while the trial of Christensen and the Smith brothers was in progress. Later he was kidnapped, he declared, and forced to leave town. Staten went to Georgia where he was arrested on a charge of contempt of court for failure to appear as a witness for the government. He was arrested there and brought back to Portland. He is now awaiting disposition of that case.

AMERICAN GRASP ON NICARAGUA IS MADE STRONGER

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—The American government's determination to take a firmer hold on the situation in Nicaragua is becoming hourly more apparent. Without officially acknowledging any intention to interfere directly between the contending Nicaraguan factions, the state and navy departments have agreed upon a line of procedure which is expected generally to interpose serious obstacles to the Sacaes troops seeking to overthrow the American
