ELOPING LOVERS BARE THEIR SOULS TO FEDERAL JURY

Italian War Hero and Step Daughter-in-Law Plead for Permission to Be Left Alone.

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 28.—Captain Arnaldo Marson, Italian war hero, and his step daughter-in-law, Mrs. Isabelle Reyes Burch, young Yonkers, N. Y. society matron, who turned their backs on their families, their friends and the law last September and eloped to San Francisco, today attacked the last obstacle between them and the happiness they sought.

Ordered before a federal grand jury here to present their side of the four-cornered situation, they sought to convince the inquisitorial body that they intended no wrong, and that since neither Mrs. Burch's husband nor Captain Marson's wife would consent to divorce, they had taken the only way out and eloped. They were indicted here about two months ago on Mann act charges which were not pressed. The government now seeks an additional indictment for conspiracy to violate the Mann act.

Recently Lyndon W. Burch, husband of Mrs. Burch and grandson of the late Bishop Carl Sumner Burch of the Protestant Episcopal Church, obtained a divorce in New York. At the same time Mrs. Burch's husband, Mrs. Burch's daughter, the late bishop, was granted a divorce from Marson. The divorce left Marson and Mrs. Burch free with the exception of the reckoning which the government demands.

But, however, charged with punishment their future may be, this pair who deserted their respective mates and started out to be masters of their own fate, indicated no regrets in a joint statement issued yesterday.

"Yes, it is worth it," cried Captain Marson. "Love, real love that often comes to us too late in life for fulfillment, has no valuation. There is no price too big to pay for its attainment."

Mrs. Burch, less definite, was more hopeful. "I am working and shall continue to do so," she said. "There must be ultimate peace somewhere in the future, and I am willing to work toward that end. Life is hard and cruel generally. Are not we poor mortals entitled to a wee bit of happiness?"

LAXITY SHOWN IN ENFORCEMENT OF LICENSE LAW

Dog License Revenue Drops From \$1500 to \$7— Unable to Pay Sheep Owners' Claims.

Little attention has been given in recent years to the enforcement in Douglas county of the dog license law. Where a few years ago the county was collecting from \$1200 to \$1500 yearly in dog licenses there now is being paid in only \$5 or \$7. The law provides a license fee of \$1 for male dogs and \$2 for females, and the assessor's records show nearly 3500 dogs in the county, but practically none of these are licensed.

The law provides that dog licenses must be procured before March 1 of each year. Dog owners who delay after that date may be assessed double as a penalty for negligence.

It is the duty of the county assessor, under the law, to furnish the clerk and the sheriff with a list of the unlicensed dogs and persons who fail to take out the required license may be arrested for misdemeanor and may be fined a maximum of \$10 in addition to the costs of the case. During recent years these lists have not been furnished and no arrests have been made for failure to procure licenses.

The law provides that the license money shall be placed in a separate fund and that when sheep owners can show that animals belonging to them have been killed by dogs that they can present a claim for the amount of the loss and will be reimbursed from the money on hand in the fund. In view of the small amount of collections the county clerk is now holding claims totalling approximately \$300 which have not been paid.

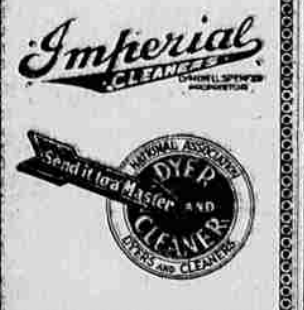

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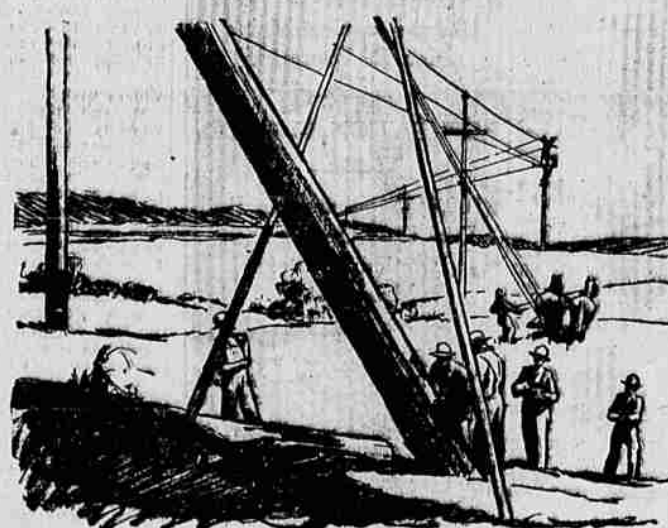
