Eastern Chaplain Blind

Rev. E. P. Ayer of Connecticut Man of Varied Service.

HARTFORD, Conn., Feb. 25.—(A. P.)—The chaplain of the Connecticut legislature is a blind man, the Rev. Mr. Edward P. Ayer of Branford.

Chaplain Ayer not only comes to Hartford alone, guided to trains and trolleys by friends, acquaintances, and strangers, but travels all over the state without a companion.

Ayer lost his sight when a student at Amherst College, President Coolidge's alma mater. Robert C. Lansing, secretary of state under President Wilson, was president of Ayer's class. Ayer later attended the Yale divinity school, with a \$150 gift from two friends constituting the greater part of his funds for the first year and a half.

Mr. Ayer does a great deal of work for the State Board of Education for the blind, helping blind boys and girls to overcome their handicap.

Bishops Denounce Jazz

VIENNA, Feb. 25.—(A. P.)—Austrian bishops have declared modern dances pure and innocent but held that jazz is vile. Therefore, their flocks are free to dance the Charleston to the slow strains of the Viennese waltz, or do the Black Bottom to the dreamy tunes of Vienna orchestras. But "Hot Mambo" and "You Charleston Man" come under the heading of music which the bishops at their 1927 conference found "baneful." Therefore it cannot be performed with the sanction of the church.

The bishops stipulated that dance music shall have no jazz qualities, that dancers' positions shall not be suggestive, and that the girls' skirts must be the proper length—the ankles.

Viennese dancing masters are politely puzzled to know how this year's dances can be performed to last year's music. They are confident they can bring "barbaric" American jazz under the refining cultural influence of Europe as they have done with American negro dancing.

FARM POINTERS

Hatching eggs should not be kept in a place with too high temperature or too dry atmosphere. Either causes a rapid evaporation of the watery contents of the egg with small chicks as a final result. Temperature recommended by the experiment station for holding eggs prior to incubation is between 45 and 50 degrees.

Oregon bee keepers, Grange officials and school teachers, may obtain a motion picture film on "How Bees Live and Work," from the U. S. Department of Agriculture through the extension service.

Male birds that have come from low-producing hens are inferior for breeding purposes, according to the poultrymen at the college station. This characteristic is likely to be transmitted to the offspring.

Weekly market reports about prices, crop prospects and movements of honey may be obtained free from Bureau of agricultural economics, United States Department of agriculture, Washington, D. C.

Oregon poultrymen secure clean hatching eggs by adhering to four special rules: First, provide clean nests which are frequently replenished with clean nesting material, such as straw or wood shavings. Second, keep nests clean by having them dark and having something to prevent the birds from roosting on them. Third, collect the eggs of ten. Fourth, keep the birds shut in the house during the morning.
