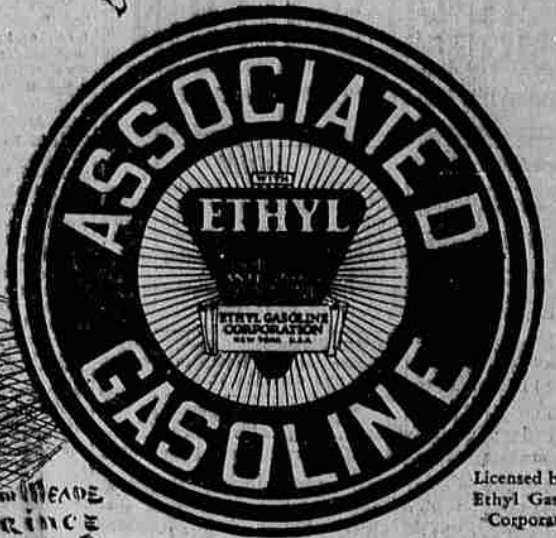


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JIMMY DELANEY, ARM POISONED, IS NEARING DEATH

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Feb. 28.—Little hope was held out today for the recovery of Jimmy Delaney, St. Paul light heavyweight boxer, who has blood poisoning in his left arm.

He has undergone two operations and submitted to a blood transfusion since being admitted to a hospital last week. His condition became worse last night.

Delaney splintered a bone in his left arm during a fight with Maxie Rosenbloom at Cincinnati two weeks ago and it became infected. Delaney is not related to the light heavyweight champion, who fights under the name of "Jack Delaney."

PENDLETON HIGH HOOPSTERS TAKE DISTRICT CROWN

PENDLETON, Feb. 28.—A 32-18 victory over Helix high school Saturday night gave the Pendleton high school basketball five the right to represent this district in the state championships at Salem. Close checking by Pendleton kept the Helix five forging into the lead. McLoughlin high school won third place by defeating Pilot Rock.

LA GRANDE, Ore., Feb. 28.—The championship of Grant, Malheur, Harney, Baker, Union and Wallowa counties will be decided tonight at Union when La Grande and Joseph high school basketball teams play in the finals of a four-day tournament.

Saturday La Grande eliminated Wallowa 40 to 26 and Baker 19 to 15. Baker defeated Joseph 16 to 12 in the third game.

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 28.—The University of Oregon, basketball champion of the northern division of the Pacific coast conference, and University of California, southern division champion, will meet in a three-game play off series in the new McArthur basketball pavilion at the University of Oregon March 3, 4 and 5.

Dates originally scheduled for this series were March 10, 11 and 12, but the change was arranged when Graduate Manager Bill Morrison of California agreed to a request by Bill Hinchart, Oregon coach, for the earlier dates.

BABE RUTH WANTS \$1,000,000 SALARY, REFUND ON FINES

NEW YORK, Feb. 28.—Colonel Jacob Ruppert, owner of the New York Yankees, was hopeful today of adjusting matters with Babe Ruth, who wants \$1,000,000 a year.

"I will make no forecast on the salary issue," said the colonel. "That must be adjusted in a private conference with Ruth. The public is not interested in Babe's pay check."

Ruppert admitted that there might be some change in Babe's contract for the coming season. As to details of the change, he said: "I'll wait and see how Ruth feels when he reaches here. You can't do much in these cross-country conferences."

Ruppert expects the home run king to visit him about the middle of the week. He said he had received no letter from Ruth demanding a two year contract at \$1,000,000 a year and refund of \$7,500 fines.

When a copy of the letter sent by Ruth from Los Angeles was shown him, Ruppert mused: "It's a great letter even though Babe didn't write it. I feel that some one else did the writing and Babe merely nodded."

And as to Ruth's professed ability to earn more through physical than the Yankee magnate said: "I have no access to the Babe's bank book. I assume he is the best judge of that question. I can't make him play baseball unless he cares to."

REEDSPORT, Feb. 28.—Some of the chashest wrestling of the season was presented to fans Tuesday night when Wildcat Pete, favorite of Reedspott went to a draw in a handicap match with Henry Jones of Provo, Utah. Jones had agreed to throw the local favorite twice in one hour, but when he came to the time limit, Wildcat had given him such a task that the job was impossible.

Fans were highly pleased by the showing made by the local boy. Jones is considered one of the best welterweights of the Pacific and Inter-Rocky mountain sections. He admitted that Pete had improved much during the past year and with the gain in weight made more than he had anticipated.

Cyclone Thompson was thrown from the wrestling ring Saturday night and was unable to finish a two hour go with Henry Jones.

Consequently, he was the loser. The match was considered one of the most scientific of its kind shown in Reedspott during this season.

Cyclone received a severe strain to his left wrist and probably will be kept from the ring during the coming few weeks. He suffered intense pain, which was not relieved by simple remedies prescribed. He was taken to Eugene where he secured attention before going to Portland.
