BUCKNER PLEADS FOR CONVICTION

H. M. DAUGHERTY

Acquittal Will Be Notice To Let Big Fish Alone, Federal Prosecutor Informs Jurors

FEDERAL COURT, NEW YORK, March 1.—Summons in the Daugherty-Miller trial ended today.

United States Attorney Emory R. Buckner concluded the longest resume of a case in the history of the local federal court with a plea that Harry M. Daugherty, former attorney general, and Thomas W. Miller, former alien property custodian, be found guilty.

They are charged with conspiracy to defraud the United States of their best services in connection with the allowance of \$7,000,000 claims for the proceeds of shares of the American Metal company impounded as enemy owned. It is alleged they participated in a \$441,000 bribe.

Buckner's summation, which began Friday morning, was finally limited by the court.

"It shouldn't take more than 15 minutes to find Miller guilty," Buckner said.

"When you take up the question of Daugherty's guilt or innocence, if you understand the evidence, it should not take you much longer. Don't let him fool you with pleas for sympathy."

"If you let Harry M. Daugherty go free, you are virtually saying to every prosecutor in the United States—that run along and prosecute the pickpockets and the rest of the small fry but don't bother the higher-ups."

"The case against Daugherty is just as crushing, just as convincing as the one against Miller. If you listen to pleas for sympathy and acquit them, you'll be vindicating their conduct which is indefensible in government officials."

The court room doors were then locked and Judge Knox began his charge to the jury.

FOES OF CAPITAL PUNISHMENT TAKE FIGHT TO BALLOT

SALEM, Ore., March 1.—Petitions for an initiative constitutional amendment and revision of the penal code of Oregon to provide for abolition of capital punishment, construction of a model state prison and complete reformation of penal practices were presented to Secretary of State Koser this morning and have been transmitted to the attorney general for preparation of a ballot title. The petitions are signed by Dr. Nina Evaline Wood, of Portland, general organizer for the Sacrificial Service Prison Crusades, and 24 other residents of Portland.

Beyond providing for abolition of capital punishment in Oregon the proposal also requires an appropriation of \$350,000 for replacement of the present penitentiary.
