

KILL-FATED FLIER AND THREE AIDES IN AFRICAN TREK

(Associated Press Special Wire)

CASA BLANCA, Morocco, Mar. 7.—Major Larro-Borges, Uruguayan aviator, and his three companions today were nearing the end of a sixty-mile trek through a sparsely populated region of Spanish northwest Africa, from the place where their wrecked airplane was found Saturday.

Guided and protected by a band of friendly Moorish tribesmen, the Uruguayan headed for Cape Jubá. Only when they reach there will it be known just how their plane came to grief, and how they escaped.

When Major Larro-Borges left Casa Blanca Wednesday morning, it was his intention to fly to Cape Jubá, thence to the Canary Islands and thence across the South Atlantic to Montevideo, Uruguay. Nothing was heard from him for some time notwithstanding an extended search by aircraft, warcraft and ships and the constant flashing of signals.

On Sunday the broken plane was sighted about 60 miles north of Cape Jubá, but there was no sign of the men, causing renewed fears that they had fallen into the hands of unfriendly natives. Yesterday, the word that they were safe came through aviators attached to the Latecoere Aerla lines. These aviators risked their lives on the rugged shore, known as "no man's land" to learn the fate of the Uruguayan. The natives encountered were peaceful, giving information that the four men were on the way to Cape Jubá.

Only recently a small pilot who had been forced to land on this stretch of the African coast was captured by natives and his belongings while in captivity caused death soon after he was released.

MARINES MOVE ON NICARAGUAN TOWN TO SAVE NEUTRALS

MANAGUA, March 7.—United States marines—195 of them—today were on the way to Matagalpa to prevent fighting there between Liberals and Conservative factions.

Major H. G. Bartlett, in charge of the contingent, made known that a note would be sent to General Moncada, chief Liberal military leader, informing him that if the Liberals should attack Matagalpa they would be fired on as the marines were being sent for the express purpose of preventing combats that might jeopardize the lives and interests of Americans in Matagalpa.

The major gave his views to the Liberal mission, which met the marines when the mission was returning from May May after unsuccessful peace discussions with General Moncada.

The mission, on its return to Managua, recalled that in the interview with General Moncada Friday he declared the Liberals doubtless would continue fighting until the United States actually demanded a armed intervention or threat on Liberal forces. The general said he was unwilling in any circumstances to fight the United States. The Liberal mission holds the opinion that if the United States were to declare actual intervention and temporarily take charge of Nicaraguan affairs, peace would follow immediately.

There were eleven new cases of smallpox, seven at Roseburg and one each at Edenbowser, Winston, Dole and Elkton. Nine cases of measles have been turned in, six at Roseburg and three at Glides. There were three new cases of whooping cough in Roseburg and a case of mumps at Reedport.

There are numerous mild and also moderately severe cases of influenza over the county. The Elkton schools have been closed for a week on account of flu. Wilbur is suffering from an epidemic of influenza, especially among the children. Garden Valley also has numerous cases and there are many in Roseburg. Just how many cases there are it is impossible to determine as physicians have not been called in for a number of them, while others have not been reported.

GLIDE DISTRICT TO WAGE WAR ON RODENT PESTS

The annual hunt in the Glide Pest District is on. At the last meeting of the Glide grange, teams were chosen and were placed under the leadership of Ed Everts, Master, and Carl Hill, Overseer, of the grange. The residents of the community were divided between the two captains and a competitive hunt will be in progress during the months of March and April. The losing team will provide a banquet in honor of their rivals.

The Glide Pest District was organized under the direction of the County Agent's office in 1925 for the purpose of clearing the North Umpqua country of rodent pests. The project has been taken seriously by the farmers and ranchers of the district and a very decided decrease in the numbers of such pests has resulted from their combined efforts. Although the fact that ground squirrels, mice and rabbits are destructive to agricultural crops has been long recognized uniform efforts to exterminate them were not attempted until last year. At that time a successful hunt was organized and the results encouraged the members of the community to make it an annual event.

That the greatest benefit to the community may be gotten from this year's hunt the following common pests have been selected for the slaughter with the value each will have in the final count for points:

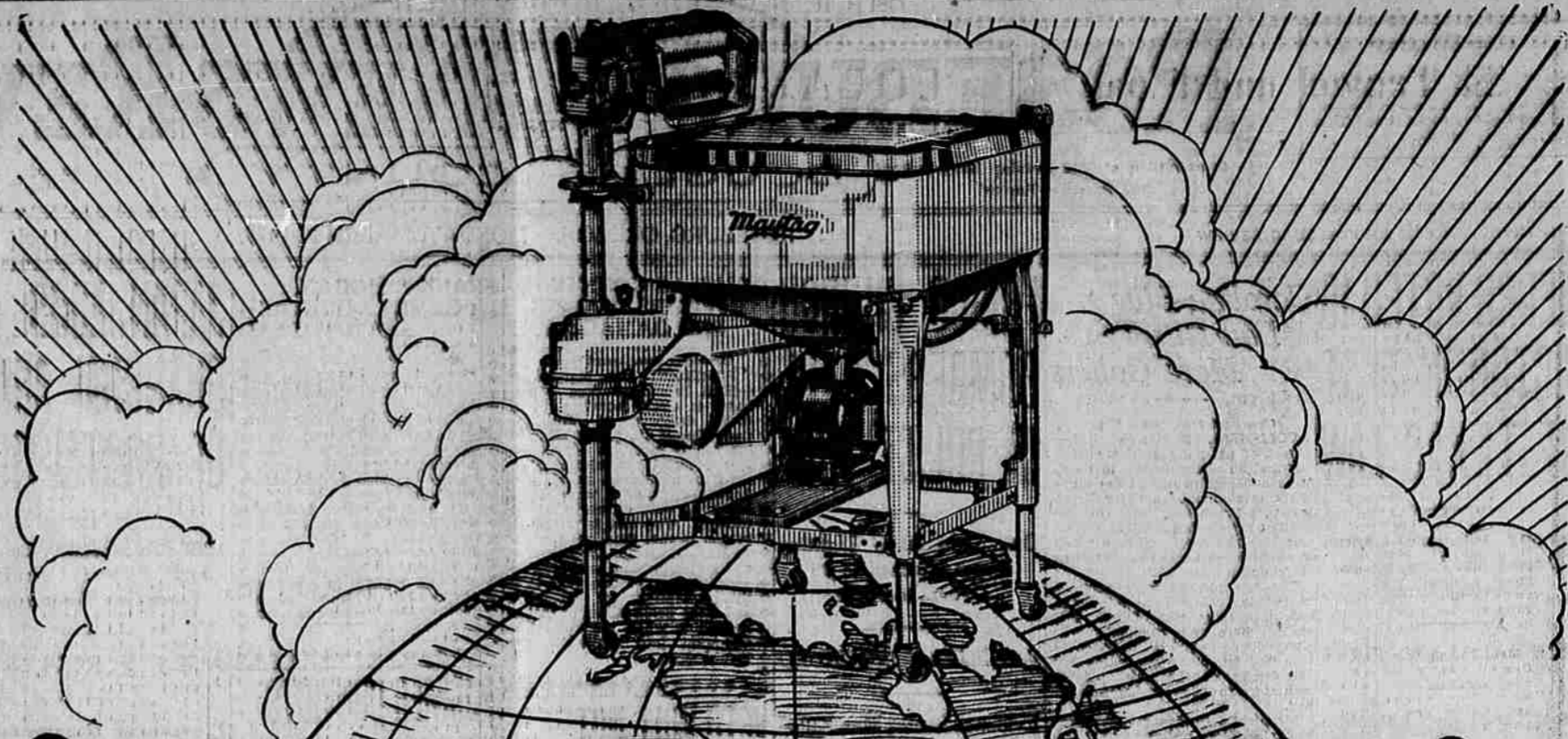
