AUTO ACCIDENTS, PORTLAND, FATAL TO TWO PERSONS

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 7.—Marybelle Shields, three, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. B. Shields, died almost instantly last night when her skull was crushed as she ran in front of a roadster driven along Williamette Boulevard by Edmund E. Franchiger, 31. He was arrested on involuntary manslaughter charges and held on \$2500 bail.

Fred Moeller, 49, one of the owners of the apartment house at 554 Flanders street, died from internal injuries a few hours after being hit by a taxi driven by J. E. Goheen, at Park and Jefferson streets late Saturday night. Goheen, who says he was driving slowly, asserted that Moeller stepped in front of his car, was knocked down and arose to say he was not hurt and to refuse medical aid. Death came three hours later at his home. Goheen was technically charged with reckless driving and released on \$200 bail.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 7.—Selection of a jury for the trial of Harry E. Sinclair, oil magnate, on a charge of contempt of the senate in

Health Protection First Aim of Canneries.

Concerns Invest Huge Sums to Prepare Products in Best Way for the Consumers.

Government says a lot about protecting health. Have you noticed it is always business that does the work?

A research laboratory has been established at San Francisco by the canners. It occupies a three-story building and costs one canning company \$100,000. The plant includes two chemical laboratories, a bacteriological laboratory, an animal room, a conference room, a library, a dark room for photographic work, electrically controlled incubators and refrigerators and a power plant.

Government officials did not establish this. There were no politicians with splendid gestures of altruism, humanitarianism and disinterested. Business established it for strictly selfish purposes. And we are betting on the selfish purposes.

One of them is, of course, to avoid damage suits which follow the eating of bad food and to save the markets from such blows as the olive industry got after the botulism scare. For just such selfish reasons, the American Cannerymen's association has spent in all almost a million dollars in a dozen years. Of this amount \$600,000 went into a Washington laboratory, \$300,000 into Maine sardine investigations, \$50,000 into a study of ptomaine poisoning and \$15,000 for botulism experiments.

But the laboratory at San Francisco and the other laboratories of "big business" have other selfish reasons for existence. The workers are trying to improve and cheapen processes of manufacture producing more and better food for each consumer's dollar. They are concerned with the advertising problem, improving quality, purity and attractiveness of their products will sell better and, being used, stimulate more sales.

They are studying vitamins and calories. They are studying fermentation. They are studying cases, heat effects and sterilization processes. And because they have a direct money concern they are

FIGHT OVER FOREST LAND IN COUNTY TO BE HEARD IN COURT

PORTLAND, March 7.—The suit of Henry Archambeau against G. F. Ritter was filed in the federal district court here yesterday upon removal from Douglas county. Archambeau is suing Ritter for title to a plot of land in Douglas county and \$250 damages. According to Miller E. McGilchrist, assistant United States attorney, who has entered the case as Ritter's attorney, the defendant is employed by the government as a forest ranger and is in charge of a station at Tiller, Ore.

The land occupied by the forest service station, department of agriculture, is that over which the content is to be held. The government alleges that title was purchased in 1914 from S. C. Burtum for \$600. Ritter is simply the occupant as a representative of the forest service.

OREGON WAITING FOR CALIFORNIA TO ADOPT PRUNE PLAN

Many prune growers of this locality have been interested during the past months in the proposed plan for the organization of the dried prune industry in Oregon and Washington along lines similar to those adopted in California. A committee was appointed to study the California plan, and according to word received from the Portland Chamber of Commerce, which is sponsoring the proposition, the committee has held one meeting, but is not yet ready to make a report. The California plan is still being held in abeyance, while an effort is being made to bring about an agreement on the part of the private packers and distributors. The Oregon committee feels that it is advisable to wait at least a reasonable time to see how the plan works out in California before adopting a system for Oregon. This method, it is believed, will save a lot of time and expense as the Oregon committee can take advantage of the details worked out by the California growers. The Oregon committee expects to meet as soon as the California interests have concluded their plan, which should not be later than the middle of March.
