EASTERN OREGON PLANT CONTRACTS FOR IDAHO POWER

LA GRANDE, Ore., Mar. 8.—The Eastern Oregon Light and Power company has contracted with the Idaho Power company for a part of its future power requirements. In order to hook up with the Idaho company, the E. O. L. & P. plans to spend approximately \$450,000 on construction of new transmission lines this year. The contract calls for an amount of electric power up to 10,000 horsepower. J. P. Lottridge, vice president and manager, declares.

ERRATIC DRIVER PLEADS "SOUSE" AND JURY ACQUITS

PENDLETON, Ore., March 8.—"Too drunk to know what he was doing," won acquittal in justice court here late yesterday for Clayton Rogers, who was charged with driving his car erratically along the street of this city while under the influence of liquor. Attorney for the defense admitted that his client had been drinking, but after a few drinks "didn't know what he was doing." The defense counsel persuaded four men and two women in the jury that it was temporary insanity and after that body departed two hours they found the defendant not guilty.

At present all travel to the coast is routed over the old mountain road.

the first half of 1926 and advanced slightly during the second half. Grease wool prices for the first week of 1927 were from six to ten cents lower than a year earlier. Apparently wool prices are more stable than any time since the war.

Hogs and pigs have been scarce in the county for the last year, now show a tendency for a slight increase in 1927. Government reports expect prices to remain near the 1926 level for some months at least.

Dairying—Douglas county needs more acres producing alfalfa and clover to support the dairy industry. Dairying is coming in for additional interest at the present time. Prices have been favorable in the state as a whole and are expected to remain strong for some time to come.

Parm Crops—Fall sown grain and grain hay crops are all looking well and the indications now are that the spring sown grain will yield better than has been the case for three years, owing to the fact that the moisture conditions are above normal.

Two fields of alfalfa grown by George and Virgil Chenoweth in the Oakland community were harvested for seed last fall and have given a yield of approximately 275 pounds of seed per acre. This seed is of the Grimm variety. Grimm alfalfa has given excellent results in the county and should be planted in preference to other varieties.

Rodent Control—The Extension Service through the office of the county agent, cooperating with the Biological Survey Rodent Control office has prepared a supply of poisoned grain for distribution to the farmers at cost. The poisoned grain is put up in convenient sized packages and will be distributed through the same agencies as last year so far as possible. The following places will be community centers: Roseburg, County Agent's office, Douglas County Flour Mill, and the Farm Bureau Exchange; Sutherlin, Sutherlin Fruit Growers; Oakland, Farm Bureau Exchange; Chapin, Furniture Store, and Douglas County Flour Mill; Days Creek, Mrs. E. E. Totten; Tiller, General Store; Gladstone, C. O. Garrett; Brookway, I. B. Nichols Store; Olalla, Fred Byron; Melrose, Carl Lindsay; Yoncalla, Davie Feed Store; Anlauf, T. B. Roberts; Glendale, General Store; Riddle, Cooke & Winkler; Canyonville, Blattner Pharmacy; Milo, Jack Higgins; Canyon Pass, General Store; Camas valley, B. B. Richter; Roseburg, Chas. Howell; Looking Glass, A. B. Nickens & Son.

The months of March, April and May are considered best for placing this poison bait, as the ground squirrels are emerging from their winter quarters and are hungry and take the bait very readily. A squirrel killed during that time is equal to ten later in the season.

Special assistance will be given the farmers of Douglas county during the month of March. We are advised that J. F. Brannon from the Portland office of the Biological Survey will be in the county during that time, and it is hoped that every farmer will cooperate with him in an effort to make the rodent campaign a general cleanup on the grey digger squirrel.

Boys and Girls Club Work. Very good interest is being shown in this phase of the Extension work in several communities in the county. Two schools have young people enrolled in four clubs each.

The Glendale school has members enrolled in sewing, cooking, sheep and home beautification clubs. The club members in this school have the hearty support of the teachers in the school, the Grange, Parent-Teacher association and other organizations of that community.

The Elgarose school has members enrolled in sewing, handwork, bachelor sewing and cooking clubs, and the prospects in this school are good for some future work in poultry and calf clubs, several of the children being interested in these projects. These young people have the assistance of their teachers and all the residents of the community.

The Women's Sewing club of the Dixonville section is lending their support to the supervision of three girls' sewing clubs. Mrs. O. C. Brown, Mrs. F. B. Lane, and Mrs. R. H. Breddove each acting as local leader for a group of girls.

Crops Well Planned. The Extension Service program for Douglas county for 1927 calls for additional work in farm crops. Particular attention will be given towards developing the production of more legume crops, pasture improvement and other forage crops.

Several grasses give promise in pasture mixtures, and Ladino clover has proved a wonderful forage plant in certain types of soil.

HOREMANS WINS THIRD STRAIGHT; HOPPE IS VICTIM

WASHINGTON, Mar. 8.—Drawings for today's matches in the world's championship 18.2 ball pool tournament led old timers to forecast a probable reestablishment of the triple tie for first place which was broken last night when Edouard Horemans, Belgian, forged to the front by defeating Willie Hoppe, present titleholder.

The loss was Hoppe's second of the tournament and dropped him to sixth place. Horemans has not lost a game in three matches. Welker Cochran of California and Jake Schaefer of Chicago, who have won two and lost none, were favorites to win in today's game. The former meets Felix Grange of France in the afternoon, while Schaefer faces Hoppe tonight.

Horemans was in great form in checking up a 400 to 233 victory over the champion last night. He went out in nine innings and had a high run of 134. Hoppe, shooting apparently under pressure, could click but 73 without missing.

The other contest yesterday resulted in the sixth straight defeat for Kinry Matsuyama of Japan, Grange winning 400 to 194.
