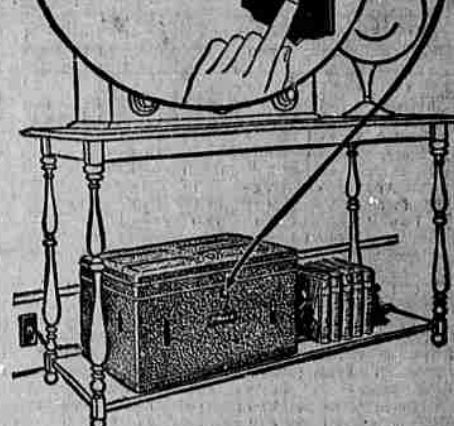

AMERICANS FIND

RICH TREASURE IN
RUINS AT PANAMA

Gold and Jewels Believed
Part of Booty Cached
by Harry Morgan,
Buccaneer.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
NEW YORK, March 12.—Rich treasure supposed to have been buried in Old Panama to avoid seizure when the city was raided in 1671 by Sir Henry Morgan, British pirate, is being discovered beneath the ruins of the city, the New York Times says today in a copyrighted dispatch from Panama City.

A ground radio apparatus, the Times said, led searches to the treasure in a subterranean tunnel beneath the ruins of San Jose Church, destroyed when the old city was fired by Morgan.

Golden ornaments and chains tarnished by long burial, and precious stones, including emeralds, rubies, diamonds and sapphires, as yet unvalued, have already been recovered.

Wallace Bain, an American, and George Williams and Fred Kothly, Englishmen, are carrying on the excavations under a concession for four year treasure searching granted by President Chirial, of Panama.

The treasure was turned over to a special inspector appointed by the president and will be held in the vaults of the National Bank for final division, according to the concession.

The treasure recovered so far is, said not to be considerable, but the radio apparatus is said to indicate additional treasure sites. Panama was one of the richest cities in Spanish America before it fell to the famous pirates.

RALPH WILLIAMS

BACKS FRISCO FOR
PARTY CONVENTION

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
PORTLAND, Ore., March 12.—Ralph E. Williams, vice-chairman of the republican national committee, who was back home here today after two months in Washington, New York and Chicago, said he was in favor of holding the republican national convention of 1928 in San Francisco.

The "farthest west that a republican national convention has ever been held was that in Minneapolis at which Benjamin Harrison was renominated for president. It is time that the Pacific coast should get a republican national convention," he said.

He said San Francisco, Detroit, Chicago, St. Louis and Cleveland are contending for the convention.

When asked by an interviewer whether President Coolidge would ask for renomination, Williams laughed and remarked:

"I knew you were going to ask that question. No one seems to know except the president himself and he isn't whispering about it to a soul."

"But even his keenest critics do not believe that any act of his as president is influenced in the least degree by a desire to become a candidate to succeed himself."

Williams declared that W. M. Butler, of Massachusetts, chairman of the national republican committee, is not going to resign.

"He is going to continue as active chairman until the next convention, as his term is not up till then. After that I cannot say."

OREGON FIRE LOSSES

SALEM, Ore., March 12.—Fire losses in Oregon outside of Portland during the month of February totaled \$155,940, according to the report of the state fire marshal.

western Oregon. Outstanding opportunity for increasing acreage of cash grain crops is with seed flax for which there is a guaranteed minimum price of \$1.85 a bushel on contract. This offers promise in the Willamette valley and in Jackson, Josephine, Douglas, Baker, Union and Walla Walla counties.

The potato situation does not indicate any substantial increases in the general market. The number of potatoes for shipment from Oregon, Washington and Idaho is normal although latest estimates do not account for the increased production in the states, unless there was an unusual number of calls.

The seed market for clovers and vetches remains strong, with little change in the rye grass seed market.

LAWRENCE, Kansas.—A National guard troop of cavalry at Haskell Institute has a fifty ten-minute silent drill, going through 1192 movements without command or signal. Members of 29 Indian tribes from 20 states are in the troop.

NEW YORK.—More girls than boys drop out of colleges, a survey at Columbia and Barnard shows. The principal reason for the difference is marriage, but more boys than girls quit because of deficiency in studies.

WASHINGTON.—Among other exceptions taken to the White House spokesmen's economy claims, Representative Byrnes of Tennessee, democrat, notes that it costs \$342,000 a year to operate the presidential yacht Mayflower.

LONDON.—Word that Rudyard Kipling is writing for the movies comes at the same time as news that the government plans to compel theatres to have at least 75 per cent of British films in their attractions.
