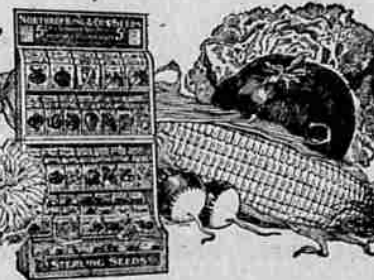

MARINES RESCUE 2 MORE TANKERS FROM CHINESE

LONDON, Mar. 17.—Advice from the far east indicates that the United States navy again has been active in looking out for American interests in China.

A dispatch to the Westminster Gazette says American marines at Shanghai recaptured two Standard Oil tankers which the Chinese had seized. The Daily Express Shanghai correspondent in reporting the taking over by northern forces of the Kiangnan dock yards, where several American vessels are being built, says Rear Admiral Williams of the American fleet immediately dispatched a warship there. General Pien-Chen, the local commander of the northern forces, took a regiment with him when he seized the dock yards with the ostensible purpose of repairing several northern vessels.

Dispatches indicate a widening breach between the Soviets and Chang Tso-Lin, the Manchurian war lord, and the possibility of an armed invasion of southern Manchuria.

Terror in Shanghai
They also tell of heavy fighting west and northwest of Shanghai between the northern and southern forces and of a reign of terror in Shanghai growing out of daily murders of workmen who oppose calls to go on strike.

The labor unrest in Shanghai is accounted by the machinations of the 150 "expert intimidators" from Hankow, who are carrying out propaganda for a general strike if and when the Cantonese forces arrive to take over that city.

Nanking Not Taken
Nanking still remains menaced by the Cantonese troops who are reported at grips with the Shantungese forces along the west shore of Lake Taihu, which lies about 160 miles west of Shanghai. This apparently is a continuation of the operation which has as its objective the encircling of Nanking by the Cantonese.

Along the Whangpoo river Shantungese troops of General Chang Tsung-Chang, defender of Shanghai, are said to be seeking scores of junk and other river craft, seemingly indicating that some important move is being prepared for the vicinity of Shanghai.

The House of Commons has backed up the government in sending defense corps to Shanghai. By a vote of 241 to 26 the house last night rejected a laborite amendment opposing the policy of the government. The vote was equivalent to a vote of confidence in the government.

Dog Rations Cut

LONDON, Mar. 17.—A dispatch to the Daily Mail from Shanghai says urgent demands by General Chang's forces has had a disastrous effect on European owned dogs. These have been compelled to go on short rations in consequence of the Shantungese commissariat buying all available supplies of dog biscuits in Shanghai to feed the army.

The only ray of comfort in the somewhat depressing situation, the correspondent adds, is that despite the loss of Hangchow, which is the center of the umbrella industry, Chang's quartermaster general succeeded in placing an order for forty umbrellas for his troops.
