MANY SETTLERS COMING TO STATE DURING SUMMER

PORTLAND, Ore., March 18.—Despite the lingering days of winter, the first two weeks of March have passed with excellent activity in land settlement. Inquiries concerning farm opportunities have numbered 1516 during the period, according to the Land Settlement Department records for the Portland and State Chambers of Commerce. Of these inquiries 447 were received from people who had been referred to the department by those who have already profited by its service, being either new or prospective settlers on Oregon lands.

Twenty-seven settlers for the period were reported so far by local chambers of commerce. These families brought to their newly adopted communities investments which amounted to \$67,000.

Questionnaires were received from 128 other prospective settlers families stating they expected to arrive in Oregon during the next few months. Their available capital according to these signed statements will approximate \$532,400.

A group of Colorado farmers contemplate driving to Oregon by automobile in April or May according to word from Jas. R. Cole of that state. Mr. Cole himself expects to leave from \$5000 to \$8000 in a farm, and his friends have capital to invest in poultry and dairy farms.

Oregon's fame as a bulb growing state has reached M. J. Grant in Illinois and he expects to give up his work as a porcelain enameeler and give his efforts to growing bulbs and onion growing in Oregon.

After reading literature which had been furnished by the land settlement department to his brother-in-law, Walter M. Davis of Lake county, Ohio, written last August he expects to be in Oregon where the Willamette valley greatly appeals to him. He desires a ten-acre tract in which he will probably invest about \$5000, giving his attention chiefly to poultry and fruit.

BARLEY AND SPUDS LEAD IN GREATER CROP PLANTINGS

WASHINGTON, March 18.—Planting intentions of farmers on March 1 were for 1.6 per cent more acreage of spring wheat than harvested last year and 1.8 per cent more corn, the department of agriculture announced today.

Intentions as to other crops were:
Oats 3.2 per cent more.
Barley, 11.3 per cent more.
Flax seed, 11.3 per cent less.
Tame hay, 1.8 per cent more.
Potatoes, 14.9 per cent more.

FORMER ELGAROSE MAN IS DEAD

Word was received here this afternoon of the death of C. J. Poliakson, a former resident of Elgarose, at the home of his son, J. W. Poliakson in Corvallis. Mr. Poliakson was near 80 years old and a native of Sweden. He had been in poor health for the past several years. The body will arrive here and the funeral will be held at 10 o'clock Monday morning at the Elgarose church.

COMPENSATION LAW AIDS TWO OREGON FAMILIES

SALEM, Ore., March 18.—Two men in this state were killed in accidents subject to the workmen's compensation law during the week ending March 17, according to a report issued by the industrial accident commission here today.

There were a total of six accidents reported to the commission during the week. Two men killed were George Hinkle, working on the highway near Sutherlin, and John Olson, a faller, employed by a lumber company operating in the vicinity of Cochrane.

WEDDED SIXTY YEARS

LA GRANDE, Ore., Mar. 18.—Mr. and Mrs. Frank Earnoy, Utah, Oregon home owners, celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary at their home near La Grande yesterday. Both came to Salt Lake City by male teams, he arriving in 1864 and she two years later. They came to the Grande Ronde valley in 1876. Mrs. Earnoy is 76 and her husband 84 years of age.

HUNGRY COYOTES LOSE TIMIDITY IN KLAMATH COUNTY

HILBERLAND, Ore., Mar. 18.—Driven by hunger and cold from the snow covered hills of Klamath, and famished coyotes are brazenly raiding livestock corrals and pig pens on farms in the Hilberland district, east of Klamath Falls.

A calf recently was pulled down and devoured by the predatory beasts on the Bodnar ranch. Another calf was killed by the pig pen on the Beck ranch. Mrs. B. Beck called for help and rushed into the yard. The coyote leaped

casually past her dragging a small porker.

The heavy winter of Klamath has rendered the farm homes of Klamath more susceptible to the raids of predatory animals. The beasts, naturally cautious, have forgotten their native born cunning in the greater urge of hunger.

W. A. ADAMS, FAIR OAKS MAN, DIES

William Anthony Adams died at his home near Fair Oaks Thursday night at the age of 63 years. Mr. Adams was born in Canada and came to this country about 14 years ago, settling on a farm in the Fair Oaks vicinity, where he was well known. He is survived by a wife and the following sisters and brothers: Mrs. W. H. Luce, of Portland; Mrs. John Morris, of Walkersville, Ontario, Canada; and James Adams, of Detroit, Michigan. The funeral will be held at the Fair Oaks Church under direction of H. C. Stearns of the Douglas Funeral Home Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock, the services under auspices of the Christian Church of Oakland. Interment will follow in the Fair Oaks cemetery.

ACCUSER OF DRY OFFICERS DRAWS SHORT JAIL TERM

PORTLAND, Ore., March 18.—James Staton, confessed bootlegger, who pleaded guilty to a charge of contempt of court for failure to appear as a government witness more than a year ago in a federal liquor conspiracy case, was sentenced today by Federal Judge R. S. Dean to serve 15 days in jail. He already has been in jail since October 8, following his arrest in Georgia.

Staton created a sensation recently by charges that Dr. J. A. Linville, former federal prohibition director for Oregon, and Frank B. Mitchell, Dr. Linville's adviser, had been involved in bootlegging operations; but a federal grand jury which investigated these allegations declared them groundless.

CANTONESE ARE CLOSING IN ON LAST BARRIERS

General Strike Called.
SHANGHAI, March 18.—The General Labor Union today issued a communique calling a general strike to begin tomorrow at noon and continue until the Nationalists (Cantonese) occupy Shanghai.

The communique calls on the workers to maintain order and avoid becoming involved in any mob action, and notifies the public that the strike is purely of a political nature and intended to show sympathy with the Nationalist cause in the fight against the northerners.

Detachments of Shantungese (northern) troops have been ordered along the Shanghai-Nanking railway to attempt to prevent the workers from leaving.

The fall of Nanking is daily expected. It is regarded as significant that the Shantung forces are not offering serious resistance to the Southern army.

Invaders Make Gains.
Terrorism is increasing here. Another murder occurred today. No arrest was made. The latest successes of the Southerners in closing in on Nanking include the capture of Wukiang, twelve miles from Soochow, and Lishui, southeast of Nanking.

The fact that the Shantung forces are not seriously resisting the southerners is considered as tending to confirm the belief that the present "fighting" on the part of the Shantung troops of General Chang Tsung-Chang is largely with the purpose of driving a harder bargain in negotiations with the Southerners for Chang's withdrawal from the Yangtze valley.

In a dispatch to the London Daily Mail from Shanghai, Sir Percival Phillips asserts that there are signs that Nanking is steadily being surrounded by the Cantonese. He adds that it seems certain Lishui, 25 miles southeast of Nanking, has been captured and that the Cantonese apparently are moving down the Yangtze toward Nanking, a pivotal point for operations against Shanghai. The Cantonese also have effectively cut the Shanghai-Nanking railway a short distance from Soochow.

Sir Percival, who is noted as a war correspondent, is of the belief that General Chang Tsung-Chang, commander of the Shantung forces, defending Shanghai, and General Chang Kai-Shek, generalissimo of the Cantonese army, have reached an agreement in an effort to set up a new government to hold Shanghai.

Soviet Bear Growls.
A peremptory demand has been made by Soviet Russia on the Peking government for the immediate release of the Russian steamer Panmat Lenina and of Mine, Borodin and three Soviet couriers arrested on the vessel.

To the Peking government's charge that the Soviet has violated international obligations, by aiding the Nationalist movement and the assertion that in the diplomatic mail pouch of the "diplomatic couriers" who had no diplomatic passports, were found plans for action in the Yangtze Valley and about Shanghai, the Soviet government retorts that these documents were placed in the pouch by "white" Russian officers serving with the northern Chinese armies.

Charges that "barbarous indignities" were meted out to the three couriers, who were kept handcuffed, are made in the Russian note.

GOV. WHITFIELD OF MISSISSIPPI DIES

JACKSON, Miss., Mar. 18.—Governor Henry L. Whitfield of Mississippi died today. He succumbed to cancer of the bone, which first attacked the left leg causing an amputation on November 30.

At the death of Governor Whitfield, Lieutenant Governor Dennis Murphree, of Pittsburg, automatically became chief executive of the state.

Governor Murphree, who, it is expected, will be administered the oath of office in a few days, is 41 years old, newspaper publisher and former state senator.

At Pittsburg, Governor Murphree published the Pittsburg Monitor. He is married and has four children.

Most of the victims were soldiers. The disaster is attributed to the soldiers' demand that the vessel undertake to navigate this dangerous stretch of river at night, contrary to usage.

Mob Loots Britishers.
PEKING, March 18.—Coolies belonging to the "Avenging Society" clashed with British marines at Chungking yesterday and seized naval stores being conveyed from a British gunboat to the British consulate ashore.

(Chungking is in the inland province of Szechwan, on the Yangtze river, some distance west of the recent trouble zones in China.)

The marines, who were unarmed, were accompanied by British Consul Pratt. They gave chase when the coolies seized the stores, and the latter dropped them. When the marines picked up the goods again, however, a mob of Chinese attacked them with sticks and stones and the British were forced to abandon the supplies.

The British suffered no serious injuries. Consul Pratt protested to the Chinese authorities.

FUNERAL MR. ENSIGN TO BE HELD SUNDAY

The funeral of W. H. Ensign, who died at his home at Sutherlin, March 15, will be held Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the Methodist church of Sutherlin under the direction of the Roseburg Undertaking company. Interment will be made at the Fair Oaks cemetery.

Mr. Ensign was an artist of rare ability and many of his paintings are now being exhibited in eastern cities. He was well known at Sutherlin. Mr. and Mrs. Shown, of Pocatello, Oregon and Mr. and Mrs. Blackwell, of Los Angeles, arrived yesterday and another daughter is expected here today. A sister, Miss Mary Ensign, of St. Louis, Mo., will arrive Saturday.

ANOTHER COPCO LINEMAN TAKES TOO MANY VOLTS

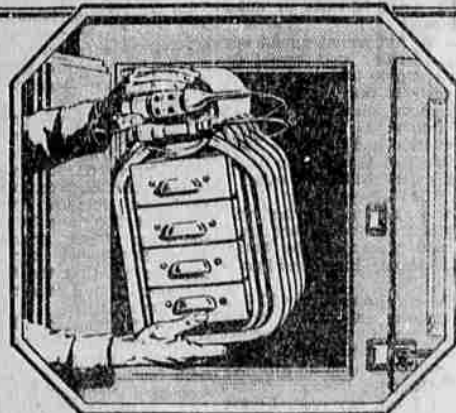
