ROUND-UP ADDS FIFTY-SEVEN TO THE BOY SCOUTS

Receive Many Inquiries.
The land office is in receipt of many inquiries concerning the lands and it is expected that there will be many more applications received before the point of preference rights for ex-service men expires. H. A. Canaday, register and receiver of the local land office states that many of the men seeking to homestead the grant lands apparently do not have the funds to pay the filing fee on the agricultural tracts, and consequently are particularly interested in the log-ged over tracts. He believes, however, that after the drawings are made and the men are assured that they will be able to secure land immediately upon application that there will be more entries, and from now on until June 13 he expects that there will be an increasing number of applications submitted.

A great deal of the land now being offered, although classified as being agricultural, is not suitable for farming. The greater part of it is mountainous with more or less gravelly soil, so that only a small portion can be used for raising crops. Much of it, however, is good for grazing purposes and a number of stockmen will endeavor to secure tracts contiguous to their present holding after the lands are thrown open to filings by the general public.
