**MEXICAN REBELS**  
**LOOT TRAIN AND**  
**11 AUTOMOBILES**

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)  
 MEXICO CITY, March 21—Passengers on a railway train bound from Laredo for Mexico City had some anxious moments last night when a band of 300 rebels, commanded by Rodolfo Gallegos, attacked it, shooting promiscuously. By throwing themselves on the floors of the cars, the passengers escaped the bullets.

No one was molested as an individual and the rebels took nothing from the passengers.

Two pullmans and a first class coach were burned. Previously the rebels had placed four cases of dynamite on the tracks in an attempt to blow up the entire train, but the charge did not explode. The conductor was wounded and later died. A number of Americans were travelling in the pullmans, among them Mrs. C. E. Harriman and her two children. She is said to have voluntarily offered money to the rebels.

The soldiers making up the military escort aboard the train fought valiantly but were overwhelmed. The bandits loaded mules with loot from the express and mail cars and escaped. Reports that they had kidnapped six of the passengers, were denied when the train reached Mexico City.

As a consequence to the attack and the holding of eleven automobiles on the Mexico City-Cuernavaca highway yesterday, it is reported that military escorts on passenger trains and patrols along important roads will be increased. Federal forces are pursuing both bands of marauders under instructions to show no mercy.

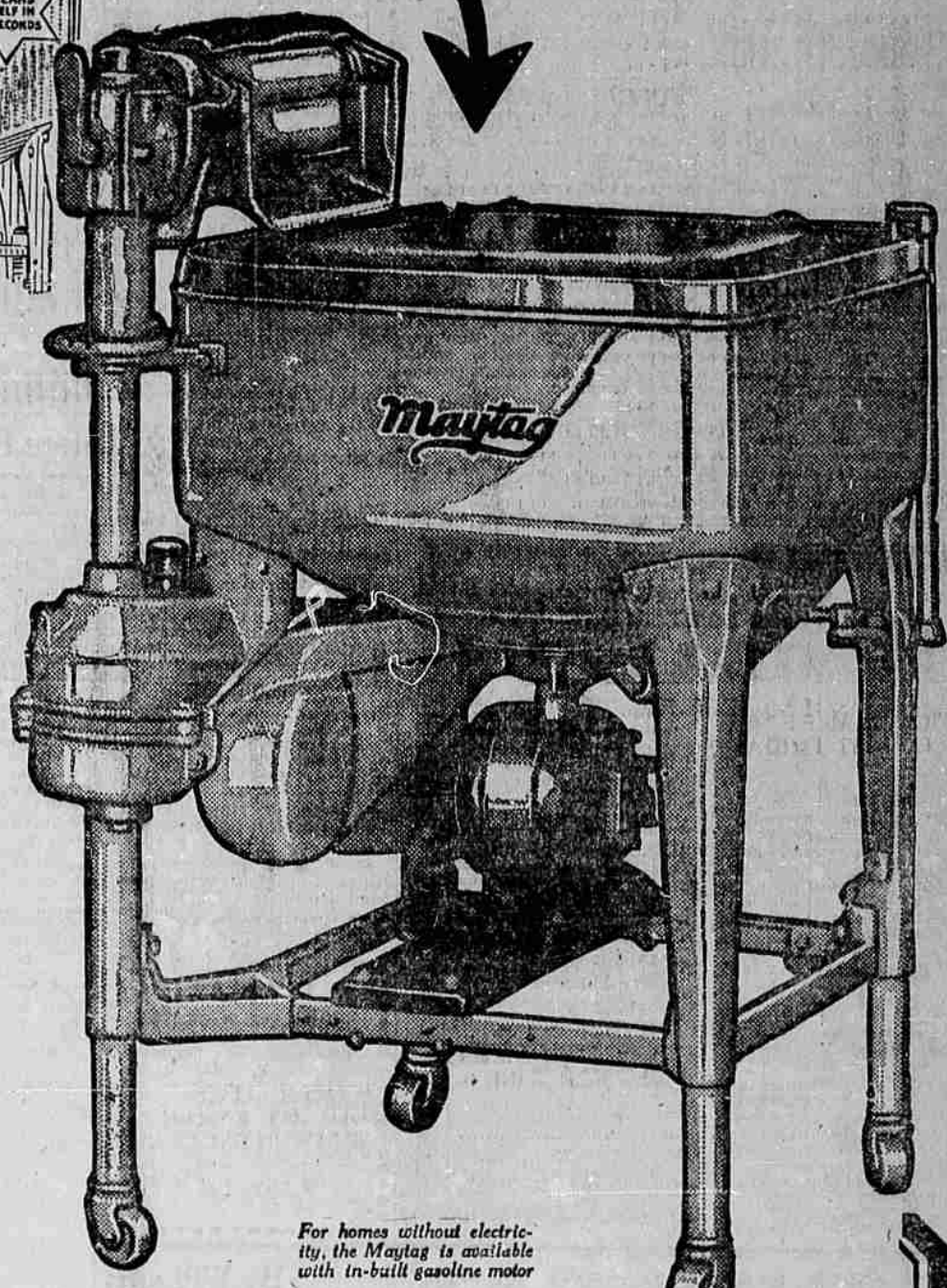
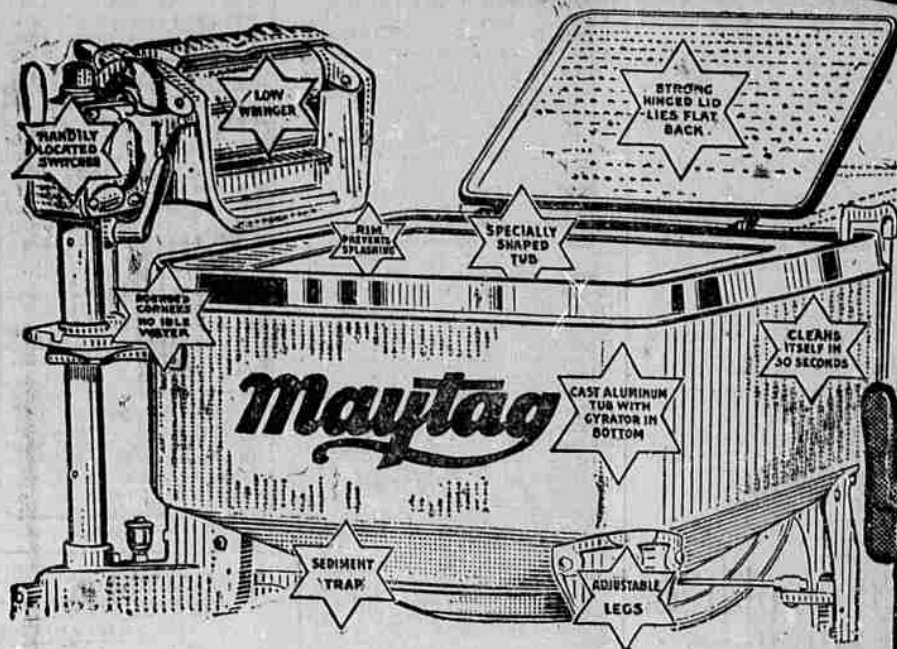
