Sapiro, city born and bred, alleged that his reputation and income as an organizer of farmers' cooperative organizations was injured to the extent of the amount claimed, \$1,000.00.

Hanley fought against the admission as evidence of a great stack of records and copies of each issue of the Independent since it came into possession of the Ford family.

Mr. Gallagher said the fact a man was wealthy was no grounds for charging malice but wealth or reputed wealth gave weight to a man's words.

"If Henry Ford were guilty of malice for publication of articles he could be sued and judgment rendered," said Gallagher. "If the publishing company were guilty it could be sued and damages collected. And if both were guilty of malice a verdict could be obtained against both."

"You intend to prove a joint and individual malice?" asked Judge Fred M. Raymond.

"Yes, a joint and individual malice," said Gallagher. "Henry Ford and the Dearborn Independent are one and the same of policies."

The judge said he would reserve decision until a specific occasion arose.

The jury returned and Mr. Cameron took the witness stand.

Mr. Cameron identified a bound volume of the Dearborn Independent containing the first issue under Ford's ownership.

An article on the first page, he said, was his to some extent. He had worked it over, he said. At that time, he said, he had never seen Mr. Ford.

Gallagher called for other bound volumes of the Independent which Mr. Cameron identified. Ford's copositions from 254 farmers, scattered from Oregon to Georgia and California to Maine, await introduction as evidence in the suit.

If the 40,000 typewritten pages were pinned end to end they would reach from Federal Judge Fred M. Raymond's court room to the Highland Park plant of the Ford company seven miles away. The sworn statements represent the utterance of witnesses for both sides.

STATE ORDERS MERCHANTS TO FILE RETURNS

judgment may seem just and necessary, to the end that all property in this state shall be listed upon the assessment rolls and valued and assessed according to the provisions of law, and equalized between persons, firms, companies and corporations, and between the different counties of this state, and between the different taxing units, so that equality of taxation shall be secured according to the provisions of law.

"Section 2. The state tax commission is further authorized to examine and test the work of county assessors at any time, and to have and possess all rights and powers of such assessors for the examination of persons, and property, and for the discovery of property subject to taxation, and if it shall ascertain that any taxable property is omitted from the assessment list, or not assessed or valued according to law, it shall bring the same to the attention of the assessor of the proper county in writing, and if such assessor shall neglect or refuse to comply with the request of the tax commission to place such property on the assessment list, or to correct such incorrect assessment or valuation, the tax commission shall have the power to prepare a supplement to such assessment list, which supplement shall include all property required by the tax commission to be placed on the assessment list and all corrections required to be made. Such supplement shall be filed with the assessor's assessment list and shall thereafter constitute an integral part thereof to the exclusion of all portions of the original assessment list: inconsistent therewith, and shall be submitted therewith to the county board of equalization.

"Section 3. The tax commission shall have power to direct and to order any county board of equalization to raise or lower the valuation of any taxable property and to add such property to the assessment list. The tax commission may require any such board of equalization to reconvene after its adjournment for the purpose of performing any order or requirement made by the tax commission and may make such orders as it shall determine to be just and necessary. If such board of equalization shall fail or refuse forthwith to comply with any order or requirement of the tax commission, the tax commission shall have power to make such correction or change in the assessment list, and such corrections and changes shall be a part of the record of the proceedings of the said board of equalization. Provided, that in all cases where the tax commission shall raise the valuation of any property or add property to the assessment list it shall give notice for the same time and in the same manner as is now required in like cases of county boards of equalization."

Has Full Power

It may be easily seen from the foregoing that the county assessor has little power in his office and that he is practically a servant of the tax commission.

The law also contains a section that requires every public officer to comply with the tax commission's orders and if he shall neglect or refuse to comply immediately after the order has been received the commission may apply to a judge of the circuit court of the county in which the officer is located and obtain an order to compel compliance with the instructions or provisions, the court's order being final authority.

These returns will be compared with the government income tax returns to determine if fraudulent reports are made. A penalty of a fine of not less than \$100 nor more than \$1,000 is provided as punishment for furnishing a false return.

The law was passed by the legislature upon presentation of statements that big business concerns are escaping their just share of taxation. It was claimed before the legislature that many business houses are turning in low assessments, through the information given the deputy county assessors and that they are thereby escaping taxes which they rightfully should be paying. Because of this situation the legislature passed the law requiring the filing of statements which will show the full assets of each business, together with the earning power, so that the commission may accurately determine the actual value of each business. From these figures it will be possible, it was thought, to place business houses upon the proper basis for taxing purposes.

The blanks will be in the hands of all merchants of the county by the end of this week, Assessor Calkins says, and returns must be made within 20 days after the receipt of the blank. The reports are to be kept confidential by the assessor and the tax commission and will not be open to public inspection.

DEWEY JONES OUT

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 21.—Dewey Jones, brother of Bert (Oregon) Jones, who figured in at least three breaks from the Oregon penitentiary and who was shot to death in a break August 12, 1925, has been issued a conditional pardon and released from prison. It was learned today.

Dewey Jones, with his brother was sentenced to serve twenty years on a charge of assault and robbery, was released at the prison January 20, 1923. Pardon was granted March 10, this year, recommended by prosecuting attorney, trial judge and parole board. Superintendent Lillie said today that unlike his brother, Dewey has always been a model prisoner, never having given prison authorities the least trouble.

SINCLAIR COUNSEL FILE MOTION FOR ANOTHER TRIAL

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, March 21.—Harry F. Sinclair, millionaire oil operator, today formally asked for a new trial on the charges of contempt of the senate for which he was convicted by a District of Columbia supreme court jury.

The motion for a new trial was filed by George P. Hoover and Martin Littleton, counsel for the oil man, and Justice Hix set March 25 for argument.

Twenty alleged errors in the conviction of Sinclair on the charge of having refused to answer questions while a witness before the senate oil committee were cited in the motion. Chief among them was the denial of an instructed verdict which was declared to be "contrary to law."

If the motion is denied, Sinclair will be sentenced, the penalty being a fine of from \$100 to \$1,000 and a jail sentence of from one month to one year. He then may appeal to higher courts.

VOLCANO WARNS OF COMING DISASTER

NOGALES, Ariz., March 21.—A dispatch to the Herald from Tepic, Nayarit, Mexico, says that geologists there forecast a new calamity which may far exceed the destructive toll of last year's floods in that vicinity.

Imminent eruption of the Ceboruco volcano is in prospect. The volcano, said dispatches, is in a state of action at this time producing numerous tremors, which according to seismologists, presage severe eruptions.
