COURT ORDERS AMENDMENTS IN SAPIRO'S SUIT

gone?" asked William Henry Gallagher, chief of Sapiro's counsel. "I never discussed details with Mr. Ford," was the reply.

Racial Plot Alleged.
An article that appeared in the Independent April 12, 1924, was introduced by the plaintiff which said the cooperative organizations on the coast were prospering until the Jewish activities began to be felt.

Gallagher said the excerpts were being introduced to show that Sapiro was accused of being a member of a Jewish conspiracy, that terms regarded as libelous were used and that there was malice involved in printing the statements. Pictures appearing in the publication were passed around for the inspection of the six men and six women jurors.

"Did you know at the time you printed statements regarding the fruit and prune growers of California they had completed a four-year contract and then signed a seven-year contract?" asked Gallagher.

"No, I did not," was the answer. "Did you know that the directors were elected by the members and the officers then chosen by the directors," asked the plaintiff attorney.

Stewart Hanley of Ford counsel objected and during a lively exchange they were asked to address their remarks to the bench. Judge Fred M. Raymond said he was sure more rapid progress could be made. The question was not answered.

Sharp Items Read.
Cameron said the Independent had not investigated Dunn's stories, that courts had held farmers were not responsible for the debts of the association.

One of the paragraphs introduced by Gallagher said: "If this strain of payment to Jewry for the permission to work 10 or 12 hours a day on his farm or in his orchard, puts the farmer flat on his back financially, a group of bankers stands ready to make any necessary loan—at the regular rate of interest. This loan is not made to the farmer on his land or on his reputation or on his character, or on his note, but to the whole association. This means that every man or woman in that association, every member of every branch of that association, is responsible for the money so loaned."

Another said: "A costly, cumbersome, usually inefficient and always extravagant organization is functioning for the benefit of the promoters of said alleged conspiracy, for the lesser lights of Jewry who surround them and for the gentiles who for money or for other reasons have become human camouflage for the operations of the organizers of the new form of cooperative marketing."

Gallagher introduced a headline over four pictures, one of which was of Sapiro, which read: "All little pals together, to save the American farmer." The other pictures were of A. D. Laakso, Bernard Baruch and Eugene Meyer Jr. A sub-head over the article said, "the story of the Sapiro boys."

DEFEATED CHINESE TURN SHANGHAI INTO SHAMBLES

Shanghai International settlement under the American chairman, Sterling Fessenden, today issued a long manifesto reiterating its intention to use all the resources at its disposal to retain control of the situation.

After tracing the history and development of the rich and prosperous foreign settlement, the council says it is only awaiting appointment by the Chinese community of three Chinese members of the council, which will complete the alteration in its constitution suggested some time ago, to proceed to the consideration of the outstanding problems requiring the advice of representative Chinese. When the Chinese councillors

take their seats, the council will comprise five Britons, three Chinese, two Americans and two Japanese. The council considers the present time unsuitable for the powers to think of any drastic change in the administration of Shanghai. It also urged the powers to insist on due respect being accorded to the treaty obligations entered into between one self respecting nation and other self respecting nations, until the time arrives when these obligations can be reviewed in their proper perspective.

Pending the outcome of the struggle now being waged in China, the council appeals to moderate minded Chinese and foreigners to support the measures being taken to protect the international settlement.

U. S. Marines On Alert

SHANGHAI, Mar. 22.—The United States marines today were alerted in their shore billets and actively participating in the maintenance of order inside the settlement boundaries, hence they have not thus far experienced clashes with the Chinese such as the British have held at the barriers.

However, there has been some excitement, since the areas they patrol are within range of rifle fire from the Chinese sections.

Today several spent bullets from the fighting in the native Chapel district fell in the regimental headquarters, established on Szechuan road, but there were no casualties.

The Americans have the important task of protecting the vital services against attempts by agitators to cripple them.

The marines are on the most friendly terms with the British troops who hold the adjacent areas. There are also some Japanese troops occupying Japanese-owned factories within the American area.

HONGKONG, March 22.—The Indo China Navigation company's steamer Hopsang, on her way here from Shanghai, has been pirated in Bias Bay, near here, according to a message received today. No details were given.

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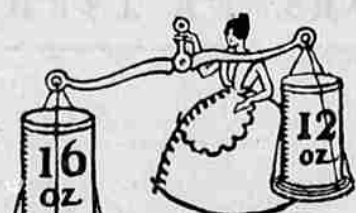
