## WASHINGTON STATE INDIANS SEEKING REDRESS IN COIN

TACOMA, Wash., March 25.—Three Indians who were present at Medicine Creek in 1854 when a treaty was signed between western Washington tribes and Governor Isaac I. Stevens, territorial executive, testified in behalf of the Puyallup tribe in a hearing today at Puyallup, six miles from here, on the tribe's claim for more than \$3,000,000 for violation of rights.

The three old Indians are Tom Milroy, about 90 years old; Wapato John, about 88 years old, and Lucy Staghman, about 85 years old. They claim that Governor Stevens duped the Indians into accepting the treaty by high sounding words and the promise of a present.

## MRS FRED LOCKLEY DEAD

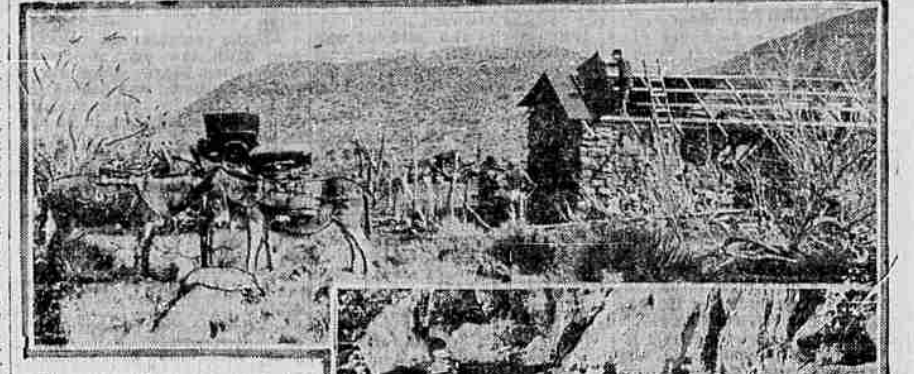
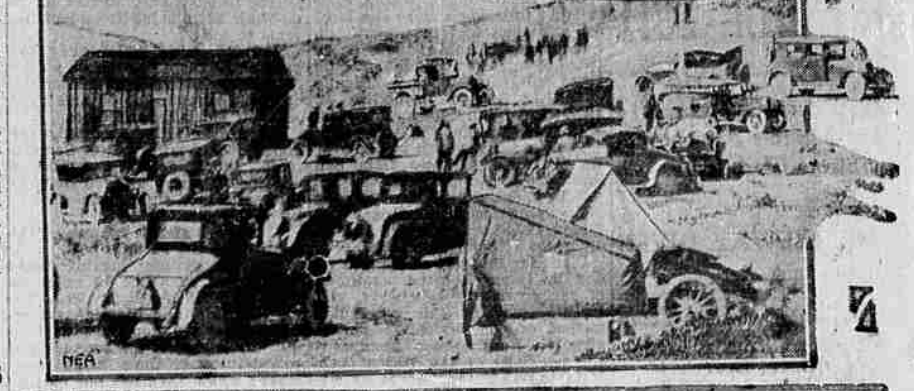

## U. S. SELLS TO ONE FACTION; ANOTHER SOON CAPTURES

MEXICO CITY, March 25.—Pedro Zepeda, envoy in Mexico City of the Liberal Nicaraguan government, declared today that the alleged purpose of the Department of State in sending war materials to Nicaragua—to maintain law and order and protect American lives and property—would be carried out by the Liberals once the Conservatives were crushed. Only the forces of Diaz (the Conservative president), he said, were responsible for sacking and looting incidents.

The Department of State, he added, has shown lack of knowledge of the Nicaraguan situation. War materials furnished to Diaz by the American War Department, he said, was being rapidly captured by the Liberals.
