Exodus Now General.SHANGHAI, March 25.—All
Americans and Britishers in Chin-
kiang, which was captured by the
Nationalist forces several days ago, have
been evacuated on steamers or con-
gregated on the water front under the
protection of destroyers. All
American women and children
have been evacuated from Han-
kow.The British steamer Wenchow
stopped at Chinkiang today to take
off twenty American missionaries.
Widespread looting of foreign
houses is going on in Chinkiang.
The steamer Kungwo, bearing
refugees from Nanking and escorted
by the American destroyer Pres-
ton, was fired on this morning off
Chinkiang. The Preston returned
the fire.U. S. To Increase Fleet.
WASHINGTON, Mar. 25.—With-
in the last twenty four hours nine
American warships have been or-
dered to proceed at once to Chin-
ese waters to augment the squad-
ron of 21 fighting craft now there
under command of Admiral C. S.
Williams, commander in chief of
the Asiatic fleet.Three, the light cruisers Rich-
mond, Marblehead and Cincinnati,
are sailing from Honolulu and are
expected to take about 8 days to
make the trip. Each carries 450
men and 38 officers. Two airplanes,
12 six-inch guns, and 1 three-inch
anti-aircraft gun.The others, all destroyers, are
enroute from Manila. The distance
from that port to Shanghai is about
1,170 nautical miles and it is es-
timated that the ships by travel-
ing at a speed of fifteen to twenty
knots will arrive off the China
coast in three days.Destroyers Well Equipped.
The destroyers are the Veary,
Ford, Pillsbury, Edsall, Parrott
and Bulmer. Each is listed in the
navy department register as carry-
ing a normal complement of 194
men, 10 petty officers and eight
warrant officers. This comple-
ment, however, may have been in-
creased slightly in view of the ex-
isting situation.All of the destroyers carry four
inch guns and one 3-inch gun as
well as torpedo tubes and anti-
aircraft weapons.
The crews of these ships will
supplement the complement al-
ready in the China zone. At pres-
ent Admiral Williams has 2,178
blue jackets and about 200 marines
on board the 21 craft in addition to
1500 marines already landed.The three last destroyers leaving
Manila were the Edsall com-
manded by Lieutenant Commander L. E.
Lindsay; the Parrott by Comm-
ander R. W. Boynton; and the Bulmer
by Lieutenant Commander M. J.
Foster.Victors Behead Foe
LONDON, Mar. 25.—Hsu Lang-
hai, self-styled commander of the
defense force of Shanghai, is re-
ported by the Shanghai correspond-
ent of the Daily Express to have
been summarily executed at the
headquarters of General Pai Tsung-
hsi, Chinese commander, along
with 11 others.On instructions from Hankow,
the correspondent says, a so-called
"provisional government" com-
posed mostly of notorious communists
has been formed in the Chinese
quarter of Shanghai. Among those
making up the government, it ised Chen Yeh-Sien, who was edu-
cated in Paris and other well-
known extremists.This dispatch adds that moder-
ate nationalists, urgently appealed
to General Pai Tsung-hsi for help
in suppressing the local commun-
ists, Pai accordingly ordered the
wholesale arrest of the leaders of
the labor communes in Shanghai.
Armed raiders are reported to
have made an attempt to rush the
Italian post on Dalay road, but
were repulsed.Chinese Trade Unhurt.
WASHINGTON, Mar. 25.—In face
of the civil and military disorders
in China, the export trade from
the United States to that country
has continued to hold up, some-
what to the puzzlement of the of-
ficial observers of American trade
in Washington and abroad.The totals of American exports
to China actually increased in 1926
and the United States sold in that
country goods to a value of \$110,
205,614, as compared with exports
of \$94,412,159 in 1925, the previous
year. There was a slight falling off
in trade of January, 1927, with
China as compared with the same
month of 1926 but the returns of
a single month are not considered
of value in determining a trend.Chinese ability to continue pur-
chasing from the United States while
war on a large scale con-
tinues that nation, is only explain-
able, commerce department ob-
servers say, by the curious situation
within that country.In consequence American export-
ing to China as a matter of volume
has suffered little. As for the fu-
ture, the official observers are
somewhat in doubt but are inclined
to the view that any final settle-
ment and stabilization will result
in an expansion of Chinese trade.U. S. Marines Still Idle.
SHANGHAI, Mar. 25.—Brigadier
General Smedley D. Butler, who ar-
rived here today to take command
of the American marines, told
the newspaper men that there was
no immediate question of the mar-
ines taking over from the British
a portion of the defense line around
the international settlement.He received the correspondents
after conferring with the American
commander, Rear Admiral Will-
iams, and the British military
commander, Major General John
Duncan.General Butler said he was here
to carry out Admiral Williams'
orders, which, in conformity with
the American policy, would be lim-
ited to employing the marines in
the protection of American lives
and property. The marines would
do what was necessary to that end.He said he made no request for
further reinforcements. He jesting-
ly remarked that his first task
would be to learn the names of the
rapidly changing list of Chinese
war lords. He spent most of the
day inspecting the marine disposi-
tions.Y. W. C. A. Reports
NEW YORK, Mar. 25.—A cable-
gram received today from Shang-
hai by the national Y. W. C. A.
council said that "a case concerning
the fate of Ranking was uncer-
tain" but that three Y. W. C. A.
secretaries stationed there were
reported on their way to Shanghai.The message declared four se-
cretaries in Hangchow and So-
chow also had been instructed to
go to Shanghai.The Nanking secretaries are:
Miss Anna Faith Williams of Park
Hill, Yonkers, N. Y., a daughter of
Dr. John E. Williams, vice-presi-
dent of Nanking university, who
was reported killed in the shelling
of the city yesterday; Miss NellDavis of Long Beach, Calif., and
Miss Josephine Brown of Grand
Island, Neb.Miss Jean Perkins of German-
town, Penn., and Miss Margaret
Chisholm of England are stationed
at Sochow while Miss Margaret
Mack of Colorado Springs, Colo.,
and Miss Mildred Owen of Topeka,
Kansas, are the Hangchow secre-
taries.Shanghai Disorderly.
SHANGHAI, March 25.—The
Shanghai situation was still caus-
ing foreign authorities much anx-
iety and the defense cordon was
being strengthened today. Sand-
bags and breastworks were placed
at vulnerable points.Attempts of the southern forces
to clean up the native district of
Chapel were only partly success-
ful. Hand-to-hand struggles be-
tween Cantonese regulars and
armed civilians continue and there
has been looting by the Cantonese.
One party of southerners broke in
the Roman Catholic church and
decapitated the statues and hurled
them into Sochow creek.The strikers are slowly dribbling
back in response to the calling off
of the general strike. The customs
employees resumed work yesterday.NEW LEXINGTON, Ohio, March
25.—His voice choked with emotion,
Dave Williams, a coal miner, was
reached by the Associated Press
over long distance telephone today
at Shawnee, Ohio, and told of the
death of his brother, Dr. John
E. Williams, vice-president of
the university of Nanking.Dave Williams was at work in
one of the lower levels of the mine
where he is employed, when the
Associated Press called him at
Shawnee. Coming out of the shaft
he answered the telephone and
when told his brother had been
killed in the shelling of Nanking
he could only sob, "oh!"Apparently with great effort he
composed himself. His first ques-
tion was "how are the rest of the
family?"He was told news dispatches to-
day did not disclose whether the
other Americans in Nanking were
safe.His voice breaking from time to
time, Dave Williams told how his
brother had left the little Ohio
mining town of Shawnee more than
twenty years ago to study for
the mission field."He graduated from Marietta
College at Marietta, Ohio, and
then went to New York and stud-
ied for a while," Williams related."Then he came back to South
Salmon, Ohio, and taught in a
primary school for a while. He met
Lillian Caldwell and they were
married. Soon after—that was
twenty years ago—they went to
China and began their work in the
foreign field.""He seemed to get along pretty
well, and was promoted several
times. His last post was vice-
president of Nanking university."SHANGHAI, March 25.—Dr. J.
E. Williams, vice-president of
Nanking University, is known to be
among the dead from yester-
day's shelling.To Go to Medford—

Uncle Sam Employs
Only Finest Artist.

The portraits and other freehand decorations on government notes are the work of the finest artists in the country, says Everybody's Magazine. Few, indeed, are the men who can turn out such fine engravings. Different vignettes of the same bills are the work of different men, each a master in his line.

The counterfeiter thus finds out every note several types of engraving, and he must be an exceptional artist to be able to duplicate them all.

In general, it has been found that landscape scenes are more susceptible of imitation than some of the other types of vignettes. Accordingly, a note never bears a landscape scene. With it will always be found a portrait, historical scene, allegorical interpretation or some other type of engraving.

There are artists outside those in the government employ who can perform the same class of work with the same degree of excellence. However, they are assured such a large financial return through bone, endeavor that there is no motive for them to turn criminal.

When the work is that of a forger, the task is harder. Some skilled engravers have come into this country and set up counterfeit plants which baffled detection for a time. Albert Leon, who eluded the government men for two years, was a Russian refugee. In his native land he had made counterfeit paper rubles for the Nihilists. It was only natural that he should turn to spurious money making in the United States.

Dowries for Blondes
