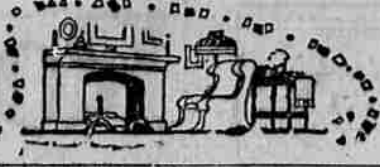

Emilie Lancel Has Had Varied Career

Folk are always curious to know what anyone in the public eye has done—quite naturally, for is that not a sort of guarantee of what they can do?

It is of interest to know that Miss Lancel who will be heard in concert on Monday evening, April 4th at the First Methodist church, made her debut as a dramatic reader at the age of sixteen. The program included readings of Robert Browning, a group of humorous selections, and the whole of Tennyson's "Maud." The rendition of these works was heralded as marked by genius and a splendid career on the dramatic stage was predicted. But besides this talent Miss Lancel had a God-given voice and it was natural that she should turn to opera where her dramatic and emotional powers would be a tremendous asset. At twenty she made her debut as "Nancy in 'Marta' with the American Opera company. She had had several seasons in grand opera, singing such roles as "Clelia," "Azuena," and "Hercules," but the roles that have made her name are "Carmen" and "Dahlia." Miss Lancel's way of giving such roles as "The Habanera," "The Card Scene" from Carmen or "Dahlia's" "My Heart at the Sweet Voice" has been praised by critics in Paris and London, as well as in America.

Since her recent return from abroad, where she toured the capitals of Europe, she should turn, Miss Lancel has elected to become an interpreter of songs and has deserted the operatic stage for a concert career.

She now sings the poems of the great poets instead of reciting them. Miss Lancel is very positive in this—she will not sing a poem until it has beauty and merit. "How can I sing words that do not mean anything to me? And how can I make them mean anything to my audience if they do not inspire me?" Thus declares this sincere priestess of song.

At the slightest hint of encouragement and co-operation from the weather department, the New Yorker struts her stuff. In the middle of the day when the sun is most pronounced you see the smart suit of oxford, kasha, or colorful tweed, worn with the fox scarf.

And incidentally, to introduce a plaintive minor note right here, the spring scarf is apt to be double, that is made of two silver foxes instead of one, as if one were not enough to wreck any normal bank account.

One's duty of course is clear. The tall woman positively owes it to herself to wear the double neck-piece, joined in the back, with a lovely pelt to distribute on each shoulder, but certainly a short woman can look terribly overdone in too much fur, particularly in the springtime.

smoothly and closely without once suggesting tightness, just achieving that admirable svelteness which was formerly almost an exclusive product of the Parisienne. Such Chanel and Lanvin coats as I have seen have my complete approbation.
