LOGGING ROAD TO BE BUILT TO CAMAS VALLEY TIMBER

John C. Davies, Port Orford
cedar operator, of Marshfield, has
recently purchased 100 acres of
timber land in west Camas Valley,
beyond the Dean Place, and has
already started operations, several
loads of equipment having al-
ready gone in.

The tract cradles approximately
a million and a half feet of excel-
lent Port Orford cedar, No. 1, ex-
port logs, which are bringing a
fairly stiff price in the market now.
E. M. Beckham, of Bandon, is
representing Mr. Davies, at Camas

Valley, and is also field man for
Takiguchi and Co., Japanese ex-
porting firm at Seattle. It is
planned to haul the logs from the
timber to Dillard or Greens Sta-
tion, where they will be shipped
by train to Portland, whence they
will be loaded on trans-Pacific
freighters direct for the Orient.
Contract for the logging road,
which will be some three miles in
length and will join the highway
near the Camas Valley post office,
was let today and work begins at
once. Logging will start in about
ten days.

Mr. Beckham states that the
work will probably require all
summer, and that some 20 local
men will be employed in the
woods.

MEXICAN REBELS MAKE VICTORY PAY IN FIERCE CLASH

(Associated Press Special Wire)

MEXICO CITY, March 28.—Sixty
rebels were killed and 100 captured
and 24 federal soldiers were
killed and twenty wounded in a
fierce combat at Cerro Picachas,
state of Jalisco last week, it is
reported in dispatches from Ar-
ransas. The accounts say that
seven hundred strongly fortified in-
surgents fought 2,000 federal
troops until their ammunition was
exhausted. Then the rebels of the
rebels were rushed and they were
dispersed.

In a clash between two Agrarian
factions at San Diego village, state
of Hidalgo, Saturday, three were
killed and 28 wounded. The dis-
turbance developed during an in-
vestigation into the affairs of
Francisco Ocariz, chief of the local
agrarian committee, a representative
of the national Agrarian
commission.

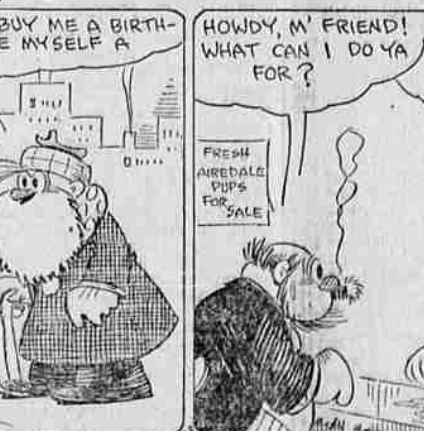

PULP MILL WILL BE CONSTRUCTED AT REEDSPORT

According to news from Reed-
sport work is to be started there at
once upon the installation of a 50-
ton sulphite pulp mill. An appli-
cation for water rights has been
filed by Russell J. Hubbard, a mill
executive of Reedport, the appli-
cation requesting permission to
take sufficient water to operate a

50-ton mill as the first unit with a
later increase of output to 100
tons. Between four and five mil-
lion gallons of water daily will be
required.

The plans and specifications are
now being prepared and it is es-
timated that the plant will be in
operation within six months. It
will furnish employment to approx-
imately 75 men.
