PITUITARY GLAND OF WHALE EXPECTED TO YIELD SECRET

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
BERKELEY, Calif., March 29.—In the belief that the pituitary gland of the whale holds the secret of the source and structure of all animal life, the University of California is sponsoring a whaling expedition off the coast of Mexico to collect the necessary glands for experimentation.
The whaler, Lausang, specially equipped, is operating off the San Clemente Islands, making about two kills a day. Unlike other whaling expeditions, this one is interested only in the pituitary glands of the cetaceans, and their carcasses are set adrift as soon as the tiny organ at the base of the brain is extracted and put away in a mysterious barrel.
When the barrel is filled the expedition will have finished its share of the task, and the glands will be turned over to Dr. Max S. Dunn, of the University staff. Dr. Dunn and his staff will attempt to separate the constituent elements of the glands and find the agency or force which causes tissues to live and grow to levitation proportions.

PORTLAND, Ore., March 29.—Trading in butter and eggs at the local dairy exchange resulted in a one cent drop in today's prices for the best grade of butter. The new price on cube extras is 41¢ cents. Standards declined a cent to 41¢ and prime firsts are down half a cent to 41¢ also.
The trading in eggs raised today's prices for extras to 24¢, 1 cent higher. The only other change in egg prices is with current receipts which dropped a cent to 19¢ cents.
Today's early trading in country meats showed a steady trend in prices. Receipts tended lighter for hogs and veal. Hogs steady at 15¢. Veal generally selling at 17¢ down with an occasional choice offering getting 18¢.

PANAMA CANAL VULNERABLE TO ATTACK FROM AIR
(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
PANAMA, March 29.—The canal with which the Panama Canal could be raided by air at night was demonstrated last night when ten airplanes successfully "evaded" land batteries and searchlights and approached within effective bombing distance of the canal locks on the Pacific side. Flares released by the planes indicated that they had been successful in outmaneuvering the searchlights.
During the exercises, which lasted two hours, four planes theoretically were shot down.

PER CAPITA COST OF OPERATING STATE INSTITUTIONS TOLD

Interesting information in connection with the various state institutions of Oregon, exclusive of the institutions of higher learning, is contained in a statement made public by Secretary of State Sam A. Koser. This statement shows that during the month of February the maintenance cost per capita for inmates at the State Blind school was \$46.34 a month, that at the Tuberculosis hospital \$45.40, the State Deaf school \$44.58, the Boy's Training school \$37.90, State Soldiers' Home \$38.35, State Employment Institution \$40.63, Girls' Industrial school \$34.16, Oregon State Penitentiary \$29.39, Oregon State hospital on February 23 was 1.85¢, a gain of 19 for the month; at the State Penitentiary 59¢, a gain of 33 for the month; at the Feeble Minded Institution 83¢, a loss of 1; Boys' Training school school 21¢, a gain of 13; Tuberculosis hospital 18¢, a loss of 1; State Blind school 47¢, no change; State Deaf school 12¢, a gain of 1; Girls' Industrial school 75¢, no change; Eastern Oregon hospital 35¢, a loss of 5; Soldiers' Home 106¢, a loss of 3 and in the State Employment Institution for the Blind 55¢, a gain of 1. That the per capita maintenance cost for these various institutions for February closely approached the average per capita cost for the year as shown from the records of 1926 is indicated by the following averages for last year, Oregon State Penitentiary \$27.75; Oregon State Penitentiary \$26.59, Feeble Minded Institution \$16.35, Boys' Training school \$26.55, Tuberculosis hospital \$46.16, State Blind school \$46.53 (eight months), State Deaf school \$41.64 (eight months), Girls' Industrial school \$33.24, Eastern Oregon hospital \$16.57, State Soldiers' Home \$39.09, State Employment Institution \$49.22.

The opinion denying the petition deals almost entirely with the question of what constitutes deliberation and premeditation sufficient to make a killing murder of the first degree. The court holds that "it is the uniform language of the cases that deliberation and premeditation is one for a moment, as well as for a week or a year, will render an intentional murder in the first degree."
The court further holds that the question of premeditation and deliberation is one for the jury, and is not one that can be reviewed by the courts if the jury had proper instructions.

CONSUMPTION OF GASOLINE KEEPS PACE REGISTRATION

Figures prepared by Secretary of State Sam A. Koser indicate that the consumption of motor vehicle fuels in Oregon is keeping step with the registrations of automobiles. Thus early in 1927 the records of the State department show that the first month of this year has outstripped the corresponding period of 1926 in sales of motor vehicle fuels. In January of 1927 there were sold in Oregon 6,513,713.5 gallons of gasoline or 125,418.8 gallons more than in the same month of 1926. Sales of distillate were 49,533.1 gallons, a loss of 12,707.4 gallons, but total taxes paid under all existing laws for January of this year were \$196,

CORVALLIS WANTS HIGHWAY SIGNS ON WEST SIDE ROUTE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
PORTLAND, Ore., March 29.—Urging that the west side highway be given the same sort of Pacific highway signs that the commission has given the east side road, a delegation from Corvallis appeared before the highway commission today. The men from Benton county declared that since the highway commission put up signs reading "Pacific Highway" running from Junction City north on the east side road, the west side has lost most of the northbound tourist travel.
It was urged that both roads be given equal official signing, the commission to place signs reading "Pacific Highway—east side", and "Pacific Highway—west side", on the roads.
A Lincoln county delegation headed by County Commissioner J. Dunne asked the highway commission to improve the road between Newport and Waldport, 15 miles, at once. William Duby, commission to place signs reading the state will start this work just as soon as possible.
The last section of grading on the Roosevelt highway between Newport and Astoria will be contracted for this afternoon.
It is the difficult 4.4 miles of road between Garibaldi and Rockaway. Fourteen bidders contested for this job.
The last unimproved gap in the Roosevelt highway in Curry county will also be closed within a few months if one of the five bidding contractors is awarded the work.
This section, 28.2 miles long, is between Mayers Creek and Chetco river and the surfacing work has been divided into two units.
Another important grading job opened was the Tillamook county line-Grande Ronde section of the Salmon river cut off to the Roosevelt highway.
Nine bids were opened for this job.
Four bids were received for nine bits of paving on the Albany-Corvallis highway and the Pacific highway in Benon, Clackamas, Marion and Linn counties. Eight bids were opened for grading approaches to the Rogue river bridge at Gold Hill.
Five bids were received for resurfacing material for the La Grande-Minam section, 10.3 miles of the La Grande-Wallowa Lake highway.
Four bids came in for building a ferryboat for the Rogue river at Gold Beach. Three bids were read for construction of a comfort station at Emigrant Springs Park near Meacham.

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CONTRACTS LETS ON THREE BRIDGES

The county court met today for the purpose of receiving bids for the construction of three small bridges. Two of the bridges are in the Glendale vicinity, over Windy Creek and Lawson Creek. The other is near Myrtle Creek over Frozen Creek. The contracts were let to O. M. Olds of Mt. Angel who bid \$1,095.30 on the Windy Creek bridge, \$550.50 on the Frozen Creek bridge and \$563.40 on the Lawson Creek bridge. These are to be supported on tiling.
