WESTERN TEAMS LEADING IN HIGH SCHOOL TOURNEY

CHICAGO, Mar. 30.—Better marksmanship by the basket shooters from London, Ky., high school team gave them a 29 to 23 victory over Safford, Arizona, in the first round winners in the national interscholastic championship basketball tournament here today.

Final: Huron, S. D., 25; Lincoln, Neb., 16.
The east-west struggle which dotted the opening rounds of the national interscholastic basketball tournament here were decided in favor of the westerners in the opening round of competition at the University of Chicago. All but one southern squad in the first day's play of 13 hours yesterday, went down to defeat, the Vienna, Ga., team standing out in its sole victory for the south as a foe to be reckoned with in the later rounds.

Vienna today meets another of the teams which stood out prominently in the first day, Winfield, Kansas, one of the heaviest and most finished teams of the 43 which began the elimination series yesterday morning.

Seventeen of the teams went into the second round today with a virtual bye in the first round, while the 13 losers began their consolation round for trophies, similar but smaller, to those going to the victors in the championship series.

Today's 14 hours of basketball will reduce the field to 16 teams, which will start the third round at noon Thursday, and the quarter finals Friday afternoon. Semi-finals and finals will be played Saturday.

KEY ROUTE FERRY HITS FRISCO SLIP; PANIC AND DAMAGE

SAN FRANCISCO, March 30.—Three thousand passengers were made panic-stricken, two women faint and between \$30,000 and \$50,000 damage was done today when the new Key Route ferry boat, Peralta, became unmanageable and crashed with terrific force into its San Francisco slip.

Telephone service to Oakland was disabled when a submarine cable was snapped by the crash.

Fifty huge piles were splintered like matchwood when the boat struck. The craft suffered little damage. A strong high tide, was blamed for the accident.

HENRY FORD GETS ROLL IN HIS CAR; NOW IN HOSPITAL

DETROIT, Mich., Mar. 30.—Henry Ford is in the Henry Ford hospital for treatment for injuries received in an automobile accident last Sunday, and has undergone a minor operation, it became known today.

Reports were that the motor magnate was returning home alone in one of his small cars from the Ford administration building at Dearborn when a machine from the rear side-swiped Mr. Ford's car, forced him over an embankment, the machine rolling over three or four times near a bridge on the river Rouge.

Mr. Ford extricated himself and made his way alone to the lodge at the gate of his estate where he was met by a gate keeper and led to his residence.

The small coupe which was overturned has been used for years in short drives about Dearborn by Mr. Ford. It has been his custom frequently to drive alone in the small car after nightfall in returning from his Dearborn plant to his estate.

The motor magnate is 64 years old. Although slight in build, he has always been known to have a sturdy and wiry constitution and is never known to have been seriously ill. The last accidental injury he received previous to the automobile accident Sunday night was when he sprained an ankle while skating on the River Rouge seven years ago.

Mr. Ford had been expected this week to appear as a witness in the \$1,000,000 libel suit brought against him by Aaron Sapiro.

FOUR MEN KILLED WITHIN AN HOUR, CHICAGO'S LATEST

CHICAGO, Mar. 30.—Four men were shot to death here last night, within an hour, making eleven children fatherless.

John Palumbo, 39, a contractor and his assistant, Jack Prete, were killed in their homes by Joseph Clemente, 39, who had lost his job and thought his family would starve.

A fourth man, Frank Palumbo, was shot and killed in his automobile by unidentified assailants. He is not related to John Palumbo.

Police found Clemente entrenched behind a pushcart in the yard of a relative. Clemente fired a volley, missed, and raced for a shed. Two volleys from police guns struck him. He was dead when police found him inside the shed, where he had dragged himself.

U. S. TIMBER SALE POLICY TO STAND. JARDINE DECLARES

SALEM, Ore., March 30.—There will be no change in the present policy of the United States Department of Agriculture with regard to sale of federal timber reserves in Oregon, it is stated in a letter received today by Sam A. Koser, secretary of state, from W. M. Jardine, national secretary of agriculture. The letter is in reply to senate joint memorial No. 12 passed by the state legislature at its 1927 session.

"After careful consideration of the memorial, I do not feel I could consistently make changes in the existing policies for the sale of national forest stumpage in Oregon," the letter reads.

The memorial as passed by the

legislature declared that "the terms of sale of government timber are made so attractive that operators have built railroads through miles of privately owned timber to reach government tracts purchased and in some instances have left their own timber standing intact while they log off the reserve supply." This practice, the memorial stated, is unfair to private timber interests.

Secretary Jardine declares in his reply that only between 5 and 6 per cent of the timber cut in Oregon comes from federal reserve areas, and that as a rule private interests in the vicinities affected desire the cuts to be made.

A copy of the memorial also was sent President Coolidge, but was referred by him to Secretary Jardine.
