of "The Snake Wife," by Wallace
Smith.
John Ford, maker of "The Iron

again with his masterly direction.
This is a photodrama that shows

stream" is a romance of the rearing
river life, called Broadway,
with many fine touches of humor

CANNON "MAKEE SHOOT
BUT NO MAKEE BANG"

SHANGHAI, March 31.—Chinese
credited with invention of gun-
powder, have now produced "noise-
less cannon," say newspapers re-
porting tests of a gun designed by
Yang Yi-cheng.

The silence is not an attach-
ment but part of the original me-
chanism and the principles are
kept secret. Although the gun is
effective at a distance of 2.3 miles,
it is claimed, the explosion cannot
be heard more than 400 feet away.
"Makee Shoot—no makee bang"
is how the achievement was cap-
tured by a foreign language news-
paper which said Chang Tso-lin,
Northern generalissimo had pur-
chased the invention for the Pek-
ing government, giving the inven-
tor a bonus of \$10,000.

News and Views of Women

PARIS—French women are
crowding men in the dental pro-
fession. In 1914 only 15 girls dar-
ed enter dentistry, but about one-
third of the dentists recently grad-
uated from the official French col-
lege of dentistry were women.
Most of these dentists practice
in the provinces, where one would
expect less receptivity of new
ideas, but where men dentists are
now in a minority. One of the at-
tractive features of the profession
for women is that almost invari-
ably in France they conduct their
offices in their own apartments
and can therefore still admit that
"woman's place is in the home."

BOKHARA, Uzbekistan Soviet
Republic.—The ancient Oriental
customs by which brides are sold
by their fathers like cattle still
prevail throughout Turkistan. The
girl's will and wish in matrimonial
matters counts for nothing.

Muslim girls are kept in a har-
em, where from the time they are
12 until their fathers are ready to
sell them in marriage, they are not
allowed to see a single soul except
women members of the family.
Brothers, and friends, and even the
prospective husband are excluded.
The native Mohammedans of
Turkistan used to have numerous
wives, indicating by the number
their wealth, social prestige and
true Muslim piety, but now even
two wives are considered a luxury.

STRONG LANGUAGE MARKS MAYORALTY RACE IN CHICAGO

Issues in Three Cornered
Rivalry Cover Crime,
Vice and Foreign
Tendencies.

(Associated Press Licensed Wire.)
CHICAGO, March 31.—King
George of England, the League of
Nations, China and other interna-
tional subjects continue to vie with
municipal issues in Chicago's
strangest mayoralty campaign.

While former Senator James
Hamilton Lewis was taking up the
cudgels for mayor William E.
Dever last night, the Republican
candidate, William Hale Thomp-
son was invading the mayor's
home territory.

"Dever says he's for home rule,"
Thompson said. "He's a liar. He
brought in a stool pigeon for
King George for superintendent of
schools. Superintendent McAn-
drew wouldn't let the kids take up
nickels and dimes to save the tri-
gate Constitution."

Lewis, who spoke in Republican
territory, painted a picture of a
wide open town, which he said
would result if Thompson was el-
ected.

"Mayor Thompson's prophe-
cies promise to supplant your Chris-
tian homes and your godly churches
with rampant gambling dens on the
street corners, raping their cavern
mouths to consume your sons," he
declared.

The third candidate in the three
cornered fight, John Dill Robert-
son, Independent, backed by Fred
Lundin, former general of the
Thompson forces, continued to at-
tack both candidates.

"This is a fight against the vice
and crime rings which got under
Dever," was his contribution to
pre-election oratory.

While the candidates and their
partisans were engaged in a whirl-
wind finish, Chief of Police Collins
announced that 1955 squads com-
posed of five men each, would be
assigned to special guard duty elec-
tion day, April 5. Thirty-five ma-
chine guns will be distributed
among patrol squads.

ANTI-FAT NOSTRUM PAYS BIG PROFITS; VENDORS INDICTED

NEW YORK, March 31.—The al-
leged sale of epsom salts, chewing
gum and soap as fat reducing rem-
edies has resulted in the indict-
ment of Willis E. Learned of
Westfield, N. J., and Earl F. Cal-
lan, on charges of using the mails
to defraud.

"The Learned enterprise," As-
sistant United States Attorney
Webster told the federal grand
jury, made an annual profit of
\$500,000 through the national sale
of apocryphal patent medicines sup-
posed to possess almost magical
reducing powers. The chewing
gum was described by the United
States attorney as "only something
to chew on" and the soap as "just
a good soap."

Learned was alleged to be the
owner of the business while Cal-
lan was described as the manager.

show her guilt, her face is black-
ened and she is placed on a
donkey, with her face towards its
tail, and led through the bazaars
of the town. A public erier pre-
cedes the donkey and informs all
and sundry of her offense.
