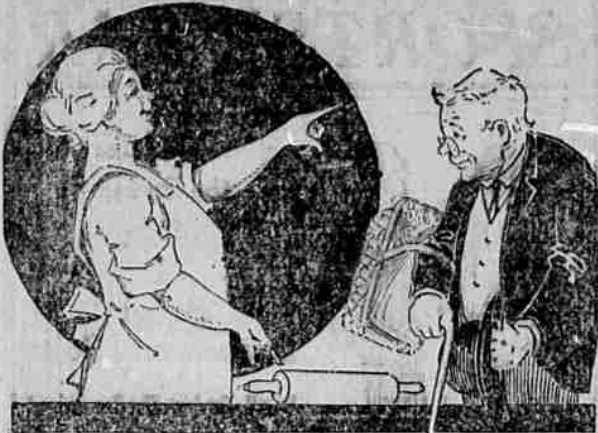

MEASLES EPIDEMIC IS WIDESPREAD

While the contagious disease situation in the county is indeed serious, yet it is not any more so than in former years. County Physician Thompson declared today. At the present time there is a widespread epidemic of measles, but there are not as many cases as in 1924, so that the epidemic is not extraordinary. Aside from smallpox, which was the worst epidemic for many years of that disease, there has not been a great deal more contagion than usual. For the month of March there were 63 cases of measles, 31 cases of smallpox, 2 cases of chicken pox, 5 cases of mumps, 8 cases of whooping cough and 1 case of scarlet fever. In 1925 and 1926 the epidemics of measles were not large, but in March of 1924 there were 82 cases or 19 more than during the past month. The health unit is working hard to control the epidemics by means of quarantine and is watching the cases very closely.

Anzac Against Spaniard Tonight

NEW YORK, April 1.—Paulino Uzendun, wood chopper of the Pyrenees, will attempt tonight to show his way through Tom Heeneey, New Zealand heavyweight obstacle in the path of the Spaniard's drive to the finals of Tex Rickard's elimination tournament.

The bout is scheduled for ten rounds at Madison Square. Paulino is a decided favorite due to his fierce attack that cut down Knute Hansen, Dickson Dane, in the colorful basque's first start here. In Heeneey, however, Uzendun will face a rugged slugger of his own type, capable of absorb-

ing punishment while driving forward with both fists flying.

Neither boasts flashy boxing ability or more than ordinary defense. Paulino probably will weigh about 196 pounds, Heeneey slightly more.

The winner of the match, probably the last heavyweight skirmish of Rickard's indoor campaign, has been promised either Jack Delaney or Jack Dempsey as an outdoor opponent at the Yankee Stadium, Jimmy Maloney and Jack Sharkey, matched for May 13 at the same arena, are the only other outstanding figures left in the tournament.

SAPIRO AND REED CLASH AGAIN AT LIBEL SUIT TRIAL

DETROIT, April 1.—Aaron Sapiro, who is suing Henry Ford for a million dollars damages for alleged defamation of character, was on the witness stand less than 15 minutes today before he clashed again with Senator James Reed, chief Ford counsel.

Turning angrily to Judge Fred M. Raymond, the senator said: "Your honor, this witness is continually wrangling over fine points and finding fault with my questions rather than attempting to answer them."

Reed had asked Sapiro as to speeches made in Texas in 1920 in behalf of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton association.

"You were still there in 1921?" asked Reed.

Sapiro picked him up instantly. "You mean I was there again?" he asked. "Your question indicated I was there the whole time."

"All right, all right, sir, have it your own way," the senator replied and turned to the judge to protest.

Sapiro was upheld by the court in this instance as justified in not answering Reed's first question.

The Ford attorney started his third day of cross-examination by going into the organization of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton association. Sapiro testified there were bankers and heads of other agricultural associations on the pre-organization committee, but no warehouse men that he could remember.

"You started in to get a million bales of cotton contracted for?" said Reed.

"That was our goal," Sapiro said. "Many seats were vacant again this morning and the press tables which have been crowded with out of town correspondents, were almost deserted. Sapiro said he had received no money for speeches explaining cotton contracts. That he admitted he related advances he hoped would be realized by the association and attempted to persuade farmers to join."

Fees for work performed in Texas from 1921 until 1926 totaled approximately \$37,380, Sapiro testified.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., April 1.—Life and death hangs in the balance this afternoon while an improvised sled, bearing Dan Walters, chief sawyer for Potts mill at Aspen Lake, slides over the snow through a blinding storm on a 15-mile dash to McCollum's mill where help awaits.

His left leg, just above the ankle, cut off late this morning by the saw he tended, Walters, popularly known as "Coffee Dan," was in a serious condition from loss of blood and shock when he was bundled into the sled in preparation for the long trek out of the wilderness to civilization.

A party of men from the Klamath forest protective association and a physician left late this morning for McCollum's mill, where they will await the arrival of the injured man and his rescuers who have braved the hardships of a storm in the attempt to save the well known lumber worker.

How the accident occurred was not learned. Over the telephone line which connects the Potts mill with the Klamath Forest Protective association, came word this morning of the accident and request that help be on hand to greet the sled and its burden.

It is believed, however, that the accident was unavoidable as Walters was known to be an experienced sawyer.

TEXAS DEPUTIES SLAIN IN SEARCH FOR FUGITIVES

BOLDER, Texas, April 1.—Two deputy sheriffs were slain by desperadoes on a lonely road near here early today.

The bodies of the men, Pat Kenyon and A. L. Terry, were found near the automobile. Two pistols lay beside them.

Police arrested Hugh Walker and Ed Bailey, who had been at liberty on bond in connection with the killing of Coke Buchanan, a policeman. They are searching for Whitey Walker, also out on bond in connection with the Buchanan killing, which occurred two weeks ago.

The deputies were killed without a shot at their attackers who fired only three bullets. Officers believe the slayers followed the deputies in an automobile and fired the fatal shots when the two officers stopped and alighted to investigate the suspicious presence of their pursuers.

RUNAWAY S. P. R. R. TANK CAR STRIKES AUTO, KILLING TWO

LOS ANGELES, Calif., April 1.—Two men believed to be S. Saleby and Tom Samaja, of San Fernando, were killed early today when a runaway Southern Pacific railway tank car crashed into their automobile at a crossing in San Fernando 15 miles northwest of here.

Efforts of a brakeman who boarded the tank car when it became detached from a train and who attempted to check it, were unavailing. When the car crashed into the automobile it was traveling at an estimated speed of sixty miles an hour.

The bodies of the two victims were found in a field about 100 yards from the crossing.

remarked upon as having been cleared up, there has been no further reference to them. It was stated that Mr. Ford suffered a concussion, period of unconsciousness and slight hemorrhages from the bladder and lungs.

It was understood today that the Ford organization's private investigators continued their efforts to find the big automobile which crowded Mr. Ford off the road at one of the only two spots on his route home from his laboratories where such an accident could have been more than trivial.

Their head, however, was authorized for the statement that he accepted the crash as an accident.

On the other hand the initial statements from two sources close to the manufacture that it was believed there had been a deliberate attempt to kill him, stood unchanged.

Effect On Libel Suit.

As the \$1,000,000 libel suit of Aaron Sapiro of Chicago against Ford sped to the point at which Ford was to have taken the witness stand, interest was heightened in the turn his enforced inability to testify would cause.

Sapiro's counsel remained adamant in his expressed intention to demand that the court force the defense to proceed with his case and Senator James A. Reed of Missouri, head of the Ford counsel, and his associates continued their reticence concerning their stand.

Mr. Ford did not attend the court sessions, but his counsel met the demand of Mr. Sapiro's lawyer that he testify with the statement that he would be available when wanted.

For third class districts all prizes went to pupils of the Green school, Jarvis Robertson winning first place for the boys and Laura Burroughs, Vesta Simmons and Gertrude Landers taking the prizes offered in the girls' division.

Because of the special merit of an essay sent in by Velma Jones of Loon Lake, a reward is being given her.

Mrs. Ackert has received a request from the state library that all of these historical stories be preserved at the state library and are being sent there to be placed among the collection of stories of pioneer days.
