GUY FITCH PHELPS IS REFUSED HELP IN ANTI-CATHOLIC DRIVE

PORTLAND, Ore., April 2.—Refusal to endorse Geo. Fitch Phelps and the program of anti-Catholic propaganda in which he is now engaged under the Protestant Evangelization council, was decided upon by the executive committee of the Portland Council of Churches at its meeting Thursday noon.

The action, according to leaders, was due to the view of members of the executive committee that an anti-Catholic program is an individual matter and not one in which the church council is interested. The committee further pointed out that endorsement of a movement such as promoted by Phelps would depend upon considerable unanimity as to the spokesman, a requirement which in this case was said to be lacking.

The request to the council was for endorsement of Phelps and his campaign to certain of the broadcasting stations of the city as the basis for broadcasting courtesies.

NO ITALIAN PRUNES IN SALEM DISTRICT, 1927, REPORT STATES

SALEM, Ore., April 2.—There will be no Italian prunes in the Salem district this year, according to a statement by County Horticultural Inspector Van Trump who has been making the rounds of the orchards, and declares that virtually no blossoms are appearing and what do are very weak, with no natural color and no stems to speak of.

He says that the blossoms as fast as they are opening are dropping off and indications look exceedingly dark here for the Italian crop. The inspector, however, states that the petals look very good with prospects of a good crop, but the petals are a very small percentage of the total crop here.

Last year there was an enormous prune crop in the Salem district but Van Trump estimates that the growers salvaged only about 40 per cent of it, because after early fall rains the prunes ripened very rapidly and dropped off so fast that picking could not keep up with the drop.

Van Trump says among the Italians there are better prospects for some fruit on the younger trees than on the older ones. Italian prunes represent one of the bluest tree fruit crops in the district.

COOLIDGE REVOKES OIL LEASE ORDER

MADE BY HARDING

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, April 2.—President Coolidge has revoked the Harding executive order of May 31, 1921, under which Albert B. Fall as interior secretary made the leases of naval oil reserves which has led to both criminal and civil actions in the courts.

The Harding order was attacked repeatedly as illegal during the trial of E. L. Doheny, the California oil man whose lease of the Elk Hills reserve was upset by the supreme court and has been a focal point in civil suits arising out of the leases.

The two California reserves constitute the Elk Hills naval reserves, and number three in Wyoming is the Teapot Dome reserve leased to Harry F. Sinclair, whose case still is before the courts.
