7 STATIONS TO TAKE PART IN BROADCASTING PROGRAM

SAN FRANCISCO, April 4—Seven radio broadcasting stations of the Pacific coast prepared today to take part in the dedication program of the national broadcasting program.

The elaborate program will be broadcast from three points, first at 8 p. m. from the Hotel St. Francis, San Francisco, then from Bohemian Grove, 99 miles from San Francisco, and lastly from a Los Angeles studio.

Stations linked in the novel arrangement are KPO, San Francisco; KGO, Oakland; KFI, Los Angeles; KGW, Portland; KOMO and KFOA of Seattle and KHQ of Spokane.

NORTHBOUND AIR PLANE LOST IN CALIFORNIA

FRESNO, Calif., April 4—No trace had been found early today of the missing northbound air mail plane carrying Pilot Eddie Neher and a passenger, A. Shaller, San Francisco office manager for the Pacific Air Transport company, attaches of the airport here said.

Missing since 4:10 yesterday morning when the plane flew over Livingston, Merced county, the plane, its pilot and passenger, were the objects of a search joined by planes from San Francisco, Fresno and other points.

Fear was expressed by officials of the air transport company that Neher had been driven westward from Livingston by a storm reported there and that he had been forced down in the rugged coast range mountain country. Reports from Oakland said a plane was heard flying over the bay, giving rise to a belief that Neher may have unknowingly piloted his plane out to sea or into the bay.

MANDELL TO RISK TITLE AGAINST FIELDS TONIGHT

(Associated Press United Wire.) LOS ANGELES, April 4—Two of the country's clearest lightweight gladiators—Sammy Mandell of Rockford, Ill., the champion of that division, and Jackie Fields of Los Angeles, considered his most formidable contender—will climb into an outdoor ring at

Wrigley Field here tonight for a 12-round no-decision battle.

With the boxing styles of both champion and challenger of similar mold, critics looked for a fracas colored by the masterful cleverness and dazzling speed of the two. Mandell probably holds a slight edge in boxing skill but in speed the two ringmen virtually are counter parts.

CIVIL WAR ROMANCE HAS CULMINATED IN WEDDING

MINNEAPOLIS, April 2—An interrupted romance which survived for nearly sixty years of separation bloomed anew today as a Civil war veteran of Minnesota started on a honeymoon with the girl he had left behind more than a half century ago.

James M. Templeman, adjutant of a local post of the G. A. R., was married Wednesday at Cedar Rapids, Iowa, to Dora Dennis Wray of West Liberty, Iowa. He is 81 and she is 78 years old.

They revealed that after the Civil war Templeman became engaged to Dora Dennis. The engagement was broken off, neither could remember why. They met last September at a G. A. R. encampment and the second engagement followed.
