5 INDIAN GIRLS OF KLAMATH ADMIT FIRING DORMITORY

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., April 6.—Five young Indian girls, between the ages of 11 and 17, have confessed to setting fire to the girls' dormitory building at Klamath Agency, government officials admitted today.

An official investigation has been asked for from Washington, D. C. The girls are being held until instructions are received from the Indian department.

The fire, which razed the dormitory and endangered the lives of the occupants, occurred last Wednesday night. Cause was first given out as defective chimney flues.

Mrs. Taylor, matron in charge of the dormitory, acting on information gleaned several days after, began an investigation that ended in the confessions of the five girls. Names of the girls have been withheld.

The fire was started in the basement of the dormitory building. The girls gathered newspapers together, touched a match to the papers and fled.

Twenty Indian girls in the building were forced to flee from the burning building in their night clothes. The entire government force at Klamath Agency fought the flames and kept it from spreading to adjacent structures.

DICK TEST WILL BE GIVEN FRIDAY
A Dick test to determine susceptibility to scarlet fever will be given Friday afternoon between the hours of 2:30 and 5 o'clock at the County Health Office. This test will determine whether or not a person is subject to scarlet fever. Dr. Thompson desires particularly to test the school children who were given immunization treatments recently in order to check up on the success of the immunization work. The tests will be read Saturday afternoon.

The county court met today in the regular monthly session, spending the greater part of the day settling the usual accumulation of bills. Several matters pertaining to road damages were also brought to the attention of the court for settlement.

FORUM SESSION WAS SNAPPY ONE EVER HELD

still reside in the Melrose district, spoke concerning the livestock industry here. He is from the animal husbandry department of U. A. C. and is thoroughly familiar with the industry in the state. He is a staunch booster for Douglas county, believing that conditions here are ideal for all forms of livestock, especially sheep. He said that this section could put June lambs on the market without fear of competition from any other section. The abundance of feed in the spring will make this possible, he said. Climatic conditions are ideal also, he declared. He advocates the raising of more hogs and said that every farm in the county should carry a few hogs.

Henry Doolittle, local banker, speaking on the decline in bank resources and deposits shown in this year's financial statement compared with the statement a year ago, offered a very logical solution for this difference. He said that the statement this year was called for by the controller much earlier than usual and that coupled with the law changing the first payment of taxes to May has much to do with the showing of the banks. The broccoli crop is not all harvested which also has much to do with the situation. The statements of the Roseburg banks show a decrease in loans and this reduction indicates a healthier condition existing in individual affairs, he said. He expressed confidence in the future of the county, declaring that the business outlook for the year is good and he predicts a readjustment of affairs which will more than offset the change in the local railroad payroll.

Poster Butner explained the difference in the various brands of optimists abroad this day and age, but stated that he believed Roseburg has the right variety necessary to prosperity. Speaking of this valley as a broad producing center, Mr. Butner said that there was no spot in the world that could compare with it. He declared that he was waging a strenuous fight to reduce the high cost of transportation and in conclusion said, "I am still going to fight for lower freight rates because I am an optimist and believe I will win out for the growers of this section."

Art Moore, manager of the lime quarry at Carnes, spoke very interestingly concerning his plant and the operation of it which is a year produced over 60,000 tons of rock. He expects to take 1300 cases of the rock for shipment to Oswego this year and said that indications point to continual operation of the plant for many years to come. The construction program for 1927 is very promising, he said, which insures at least a ten-month operation of the quarry this year. The plant pays in freight each year to the Southern Pacific about \$109,000 and has a local payroll of \$55,000. It is needless to comment on the value of this quarry to Douglas county and it is considered by many as one of the best assets we have.

On account of the limited time several other speakers could not be heard, but they will probably appear at a later date. On next Wednesday, the Umpqua Chiefs will have charge of the program.

A fine musical program was presented today by an orchestra composed of W. E. Ott, Myrtle Hercher, Roy Evans and Claude Crocker.

The committees that have been soliciting subscriptions for the strawberry carnival will make their report and it will be possible, following the reading of these reports, which will show the money immediately available, to enter into the discussion of detailed plans for the coming festivities.

NOTICE
To exterminate Ground Squirrels and Other Noxious Rodents Within Special Rodent District.

Notice is hereby given that the County Court of Douglas county, Oregon, has, by order duly made and entered, declared the following described areas, to-wit:

Beginning at a point known as the southeast corner of section 10, township 28 south, range 4 west of the Willamette Meridian; thence along southern boundary line 6 miles to the southeast corner of section 30, township 28 south, range 5 west; thence northerly 3 miles to the northeast corner of section 27, township 27 south, range 5 west; thence east along southern boundary line 3 miles to the southeast corner of section 19, township 27 south, range 4 west; thence north 2 miles to the northeast corner of section 18, township 27 south, range 4 west; thence east 3 miles to the southeastern corner of section 10, township 27 south, range 4 west; thence south 6 miles to the southeast corner of section 10, township 28 south, range 4 west of the Willamette Meridian, and place of beginning.

To be a special rodent and predatory animal district, and every person, firm, co-partnership, company and corporation owning, leasing, occupying, possessing or having charge of or domain over any land, place, building, structure, wharf, pier or dock within said area, which is infested with ground squirrels or other noxious rodents, must at once or as soon as the presence of said ground squirrels or noxious rodents shall come to his, their, or its knowledge, and, in any event, not later than thirty days from the first publication of this notice, which is April 6th, 1927, proceed and continue in good faith to exterminate and destroy such rodents by poisoning, trapping or other appropriate and effective means.

The following poison for the extermination and destruction of such ground squirrels is hereby recommended, to-wit: Strychnine (Alkaloid) used on either barley or wheat, (barley preferred), mixed according to the following formula and manner, to-wit:

Barley, clean grain 16 quarts; Strychnine (Alkaloid) 1 ounce; bicarbonate of soda (baking soda) 1 ounce; thin starch paste 3-4 pint; heavy corn syrup 1 pint; glycerine 1 tablespoonful; saccharin 1-10 ounce.

Mix thoroughly the 1 ounce of powdered strychnine (Alkaloid) and 1 ounce common baking soda. Sift this into 3-4 pint of thin starch paste and stir to a smooth creamy mass. (The starch paste is made by dissolving 1 heaping tablespoonful of dry glass starch in a little cold water, which is then added to 3-4 pint of boiling water. Boil and stir constantly until a clear thin paste is formed.) Add 1 pint heavy corn syrup and 1 tablespoonful of glycerine and stir thoroughly. Add 1-10 ounce of saccharin and stir thoroughly. Pour this mixture over 16 quarts of clean barley and mix well so that each grain is coated.

From March 1st until May 31st will be the most effective time to poison and destroy the digger squirrels as they have recently emerged from their hibernation and will take the bait readily.

The County Agent, cooperating with the County Court has prepared a quantity of the poison bait prepared and same is now on sale to the farmers or persons interested at actual cost, and this bait may be had by applying at his office in the Federal Building, Roseburg, Oregon, or at other central points in each community.

If any of the persons mentioned in paragraph 1 hereof shall, within thirty days from the first publication of this notice, fail to begin, in good faith, to exterminate, eradicate and destroy as aforesaid or by any other effective means, any ground squirrels or other noxious rodents, the County Court of Douglas county, Oregon, will appoint a person or persons to proceed with the extermination and eradication of such rodents upon the land or place as aforesaid, and the costs thereof will be assessed to such land.

This notice is published pursuant to Chapter 5, General Laws of Oregon, 1925.
