

## DISTRICT MEETING KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS HELD AT ASHLAND

The Southern Oregon District Convention of the Knights of Pythias, which includes the lodges of Roseburg, Grants Pass, Medford, Ashland and Klamath Falls, was held last Friday night at Ashland with nearly two hundred Knights of Pythias present from all sections of Southern Oregon. It was a big success in every way.

At seven o'clock the Knights marched into the banquet room where a sumptuous chicken banquet was served by the ladies with W. Leonard in charge of the Knights. Very enjoyable musical selections were furnished by Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Dickey, leaders of the popular Dickey Orchestra.

Nearing the close of the banquet, Past Grand Chancellor H. G. Wortman, of Medford, introduced Grand Keeper of the Records and Seal Walter G. Gleason, of Portland, who then gave a very interesting talk on the Oregon-Washington Pythian Home at Vancouver, Washington and also gave exceptionally good reasons why a Pythian Sisters Temple should be organized in Ashland.

The Knights then returned to the hall and the convention was called to order by Chancellor Commander M. P. Dunn, of Ashland, after which District Deputy Stanton Rowell, of Grants Pass, took charge. Next in order was routine business after which it was decided to hold the next convention at Grants Pass in September.

Knight Gaston, of Grants Pass, was elected Secretary and Knight E. F. Robinson, of Medford, was elected Treasurer, the only elective officers of the convention.

This was followed by the initiation of the much heralded Walter Gleason Page Class with the following selected team of Talmans: Lodge No. 31, of Medford, exemplifying the work; Acting Chancellor Commander, James Stewart; acting Vice Chancellor, George J. Kunzman; acting Prelate, E. W. Jaqua; acting Master-at-Arms, Charles G. Good; acting Master of Work, H. C. Hoebe.

At the close of the initiation the Pages were allowed to remain and hear the following splendid papers: "What Activities Outside the Lodge Room should a Lodge Take On?" by A. E. Whitman, Superintendent of the Phoenix school, representing the Talmans Lodge No. 31, of Medford; "How Can a Lodge Attendance be Increased?" by Dr. Clair K. Allen, representing Alpha Lodge No. 47, of Roseburg; "Pythian Sisters an Asset to the Lodge," by C. H. Ernst, representing Theta Pythian Lodge No. 50, of Grants Pass; "How to Build the Membership of the Lodge," by E. J. Temper, representing Klamath Lodge No. 99, of Klamath Falls; "Value of Ritualistic Study as a Hold on Membership," by H. E. Briggs representing Ashland Lodge No. 117, of Ashland.

This was followed by an interesting talk by Past Grand Chancellor H. G. Wortman, of Medford, followed by short talks from the candidates after which Grand Keeper of Records and Seal Walter G. Gleason gave a splendid informal talk on "Friendship," in which he emphasized that every man should be a friend of boys, small boys as well grown-ups. Mr. Gleason is a boy enthusiast, having five of his own. He also brought home the fact that as individuals as well as a lodge we should avail ourselves of every opportunity to promote the interests of boys.

He emphasized the fact that it is the over privileged rather than the under privileged boy who requires our special attention, for the latter is invariably good at heart, whereas the former is often in trouble and difficulties. He said that we should withhold unkind words which so often have ruined someone's character. The unkind word spoken becomes a liability which can never be redeemed and elicits the Northwest National Bank incident of the City of Portland as an example. In contrast with the uncharitable act of slanderous rumors he cited an act of true friendship exemplified in the instance when the two boys were lost on Mt. Hood how all the City of Portland responded, not only with funds and provisions, but with their very souls in the hunt for the lost boys. Mr. Gleason closed with an urgent appeal of what a fine world this would be if everyone would manifest the same spirit of friendship for his fellow-man at all times as he does in times of flame and flood.

A motion prevailed that a roll call be taken at every regular session in the district. A motion was also passed that each lodge conduct a literary contest among school children offering prizes for the best composition on "Americanization" and other human interest subjects.

Chancellor Commander George J. Kunzman, of Talmans Lodge, of Medford, stated that the real results of the Walter Gleason Page Class was not shown by the number of candidates, but that the real fruits of the class will be shown throughout the year, especially in the fall when the next convention is held.

Royal Visitor R. G. Beach, of Fuhat Burkan Temple No. 224 D. O. O. K. announced that the next meeting of the Temple will be held April 14 at Medford with a different kind of a program that will be well worth coming to see and hear.

Grand Chancellor E. J. Ballgren, Grand Vice Chancellor Robert G. Morrow and Grand Prelate Doc P. Patterson had planned on attending, but were prevented by illness. There were twenty-seven Knights and two Past Grand Chancellors present.
