S. P. MAY NOT ALTER SCHEDULE TRAIN SERVICE

That the Southern Pacific may not revise the train schedule announced as becoming effective April 17 is being persistently rumored in railroad circles. While no official confirmation has yet been given, it is known that the leading officials, including all who met to make up the original schedule are now in session at San Francisco and that the new schedule is under discussion.

Following the announcement that the railroad company would cut off two through trains in Southern Oregon and would add a local there was a storm protest from various cities, claiming that the proposed train service would not accommodate the communities and that the schedule was such that service would not be satisfactory. The matter was taken up with the federal government, and it is understood that the interstate commerce commission has ordered the schedule held in abeyance until some investigation can be made. A public announcement is expected soon.

The American Express Company has been planning on a change in personnel in its local office, as a result of the change, but the order affecting the office has been held up until it is determined whether or not the train times are to be changed.

Under the new schedule there would not be as many day trains as at present, and it was proposed by the company to lay off Art Mahoney, veteran truck driver and to combine the office of Manager and a deliveryman. George Case, now night manager, under the present arrangement, would take the day office shift and the unpaid expenses at night. The change will not be made, however, if the train schedule does not change.
