gangland's heart by the shooting to death on the eve of the election of Vincent (Schemer) Drucci, beer baron of the North Side. Many "spontaneous" day in the country, rather than challenge the warning that police would "fire first, talk afterward."

report blanks should fill out under schedule "B" the following data: machinery, equipment furniture and fixtures. Under schedule "D" an inventory of merchandise as per March 1, 1927, should be given. Where a January inventory was taken, goods purchased and received between January 1 and March 1 should be added to the January inventory and the value of goods sold between January 1 and March 1 should be deducted from the total inventory of March 1. All other parts of the report, sections "A," "C," and "E," need not be filled out. The blanks returned to the assessor on Mr. Calkins is anxious that the information be given him immediately in order that the proposed adjustment may be made.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 6.—The local butter market is steady to strong today with storage holdings depleted and newly offered cubes readily absorbed. The two top cube grades, extras and standard are each half cent higher as a result of trading on the local dairy exchange yesterday afternoon.

The price of eggs remained unchanged for today in the face of a brisk demand to offset heavy receipts. Storage holdings continue on the increase.

No change in local price trends for wholesale meats and poultry was evident in today's early trading. Hogs alone show an uneasy downward tone with 16 to 16 1/2 cents for top.

Plentiful receipts of local rump ribs offered on the wholesale market at 10 cents per pound indicates that it is now definitely on the market in reliable amounts. It is still being supplemented with some California stock.

First grade broccolli at \$2 per crate found good demand late yesterday.

DISASTER ENDS WORLD TOUR OF ITALIAN FLIER

Immediately make an attempt to raise the ship's engine, which now rests on the bottom of Lake Roosevelt at a depth estimated at 60 feet.

The fire was believed to have originated in one of the motors. Commander de Pinedo was not aboard the plane when fire broke out, but a mechanic and at least one of the crew jumped overboard to save their lives. An employee of the Roosevelt Dam power house was burned in attempting to put out the fire with a hand extinguisher.

Commander de Pinedo paused after word had been given for the start toward San Diego to say good bye to Glenn Hill, manager of Apache Lodge. Before the fare well was finished the plane was a mass of flames. Only the skeleton of the big aircraft remains floating on the waters of Lake Roosevelt.

The commander was undaunted at the tragedy that had befallen his tour. Shortly after the blaze had burned itself out he said he would remain at Roosevelt Dam for a day or two, ascertaining the possibility of rebuilding the ship. Preparations to raise the engine from its resting place on the bottom of the lake already were under way.

PATTERSON NAMES MEMBERS OF GAME AND FISH BOARDS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

SALEM, Ore., April 6.—Members of the new state fish and game commissions were made public here late yesterday by Governor L. L. Patterson. The following men were named:

Fish commission—John C. Veach, Portland, retained; Chris Leinenweber, Astoria; Fred P. Kendall, Portland.

Game commission—F. N. Fleischner, Portland, retained; Matt Corrigan, McMinnville; L. A. Wright, Redmond; Ben Dorris, Eugene.

Veach tendered his resignation from the fish commission a short time ago, but Patterson has retained him in office by refusing to accept his resignation. His term of office expires on June 1. Fleischner has served on the game commission since its creation in 1921. His term will expire in February, 1930.

On the game commission Fleischner and Corrigan represent district No. 1, Wright and Lynch district No. 2 and Dorris is the member at large.

Corrigan succeeds W. H. Bauer, of Corvallis, Wright succeeds Harold Clifford, of Canyon City. Lynch succeeds James Maloney, of Pendleton and Dorris succeeds William L. Finley, of Jennings Lodge.

Terms of the new members will expire in February of the following years: Corrigan, 1928; Lynch, 1929; Dorris, 1931; Wright, 1932. Lynch and Dorris are both former members of the commission.

In announcing his selection Governor Patterson declared that the appointments had been made with a view to securing harmony on the two commissions.

Kendall was a former member of the fish commission, serving from 1921 to 1925.

It is unofficially understood that appointment of the new fish commission will shortly result in the return of Hugh C. Mitchell to the position of superintendent of hatcheries to succeed Ed Clanton. Mitchell formerly occupied that position but left to become connected with the United States bureau of hatcheries.

It is also reported that Carl D. Shoemaker will be appointed temporarily to the position of master fish warden.

TOCSIN OF WAR AWAKENED U. S. TEN YEARS AGO

and which he will preserve. "The president also signed a proclamation formally declaring a state of war between the United

States and Germany."

That let loose the mobilization orders for the army, navy, marine corps, coast guard, national guard and all reserves. Already the recruiting officers were swarming with eager volunteers.

The ten years since that day—years of battle, of victory, of restlessness and fermenting post-war differences—have brought to the grave all three of the men whose names are written on the war resolution—Wilson, Marshall and Clark. Only a bare handful remain to struggle with the fretful aftermath of war.

Surviving Notables

Soldierly Pershing, his years of active service ended, presides now over the commission on American graves in France, busy himself with affairs of that legion of the army—that was, who will never be mustered out or come home.

Clemenceau, the tiger of France, heavy with years, dreams away the days in peace, remote from public affairs; "Papa" Joffre, the rock of sturdy courage on whom France rallied in the bitter first days of battle, pipe in mouth, takes his ease, careless of his great honors in the placid contentment of his home.

Haig, England's dashing cavalryman who saw it through from Mons to the Marne and back again to Mons and victory, is now a country gentleman, Lloyd George, the little Welshman, England's war premier, sits with politics at home that are small beside the great stakes he played for in the war with all the might of England at his command.

Not far away, as the crow flies, William of Germany, lives his latter days in exile and seclusion.

Name by name, the years have taken toll of them. Only those two master soldiers, Hindenburg and Foch, go on in the heat of great post-war problems, Hindenburg as president of the war-born German republic; Foch still France's most trusted son in the hour of battle and peril.

PNEUMONIA SPILLS END OF WOUNDED DIVORCE

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., April 6.—Death of Mrs. Nellie Clark, shot Sunday night by her ex-husband, Frank Clark, is expected hourly.

Suffering with pneumonia, Mrs. Clark is sinking slowly. Her attending physicians gave up hope for her recovery. She was shot through the left lung, the bullet passing entirely through her body.

Her ex-husband is being held in the city jail on an open charge. In event of her death, a murder charge will probably be filed against him, authorities state.

INDIAN WOMEN BREAK JAIL AT PENDLETON

PENDLETON, April 6.—Mrs. Joe Hayes and Mrs. Lizzie Smith, Indian women, held in the city jail on charges of intoxication, escaped last night by removing bars over the transom of the cell door. It is thought that they had outside assistance. Dan Collins, who is alleged to have given the women the liquor, is facing an open charge of possession, but should the women be apprehended, he will face the federal charge of selling intoxicants to Indians.
