"The Voice Returned"

THE "Great Blizzard" of 1888 had blocked railway traffic and disrupted mail and telegraph service. Through the drift-piled streets of Boston groups of men and women made their way to the public telephone stations, anxiously inquiring whether the long distance lines to New York were still in service.

CONTRACTOR SAYS WIFE'S AFFECTION WORTH \$30,000

PORTLAND, Ore., April 7.—T. J. Gerde, a contractor, filed suit today for \$30,000 from Leo S. Frudenfeld for alleged alienation of the affections of his former wife, Helen Gerde.

Gerde alleged he lived happily with his wife and daughter until March 1926, when Frudenfeld began showering Mrs. Gerde with his attentions. He charged that Frudenfeld took Mrs. Gerde to dances, grilles and road houses and lavished expensive and valuable gifts upon her.

In September last year, Gerde alleged, Frudenfeld induced Mrs. Gerde to sue for divorce. She was granted a decree in January of this year.

HEALTH LAW TEACHING TOPIC OF EDUCATORS

SPOKANE, Wash., April 7.—How health laws may be taught high school students in class rooms and laboratories of other courses was explained by Dr. Edgar Bailey of the University high school, of Berkeley, Calif., to the health education section of the Inland Empire education association yesterday.

Making of health charts and graphs in mathematics and study of ventilation in physics classes were among the means suggested, although she said it was not necessary to "sneak up from behind" in teaching high school students to be healthy as is the case with younger pupils.

Dr. Estelle F. Warner, physician for the child health program in Marion county, Oregon, and Miss Anne Simpson, director of health education for the same county, spoke of a health program there which has resulted in enrollment of 1290 pupils in health standards, under direction of 500 teachers.

REORGANIZATION OF BOY SCOUT WORK OUTLINED

SPOKANE, Wash., April 7.—Reorganization of Boy Scout work in the four Pacific northwestern states through extension of trained supervision over additional counties, is expected to be completed by May 1. It was announced here today by John H. Piper, regional executive of this territory.

Additional counties in their respective areas have been organized and attached to headquarters at Nampa, Coeur d'Alene and Boise, Idaho; Butte and Helena, Montana; La Grande, Roseburg, Klamath Falls and Portland, Oregon, and Aberdeen and Spokane, Wash.

George S. Felker has been assigned to this territory from national Boy Scout headquarters to assist Mr. Piper and W. L. Hayward in the reorganization work, a great part of which has already been accomplished. Completion of the work will result in addition of another trained field worker in the Spokane area and two more in the Portland area, Mr. Piper said.

LINEN PANTS MAKE BOW IN WESTERN FOOTBALL

LOS ANGELES, April 7.—Comes now something new in the way of gridiron foot—airplane linen pants. And, if the paraphernalia proves satisfactory, the University of Southern California gridgers may adopt it as their regular uniform.

The new pants were introduced here yesterday when Morely Drury, backfield star and captain of the Southern California football team, appeared on Board Field, where the Trojan gridgers are spring conditioning, clad in an outfit made of airplane linen.

The new covering is expected to prove an asset in the silk affairs caused by Syracuse and Notre Dame last season, and, at the same time, be as durable as the mole-skins now in use. Drury pronounced himself as satisfied with the pants.

BEAUTIFUL TABLE MADE FOR SCOTTISH RITE CLUB ROOMS

A chess and checker table built by the Roseburg Lumber and Manufacturing Company for the Roseburg Scottish Rite Masonic bodies, to be used in the Masonic club rooms, has been placed on display in the Zigler-Craven hardware store window. It is one of the most beautiful pieces of furniture to be seen in the city and is a wonderful specimen of what can be done by the skilled workmen of one of the city's most important manufacturing plants.

The table was designed and built by Chris Hessness, one of the expert artisans in the employ of the company. The materials used are southern red gum wood, ebony, white holly, Philippine mahogany and maple.

The graceful but substantial table is built of gum wood, highly polished, while the squares of the checker and chess board are inlays of ebony and white holly. Around the square is a border of mahogany with a narrow inlay border of ebony and holly.

On each of the four sides of the square are the Scottish Rite emblems wonderfully inlaid in holly, ebony and mahogany. Even the inlaid letters are of ebony. The work is very skillfully done and the table is indeed a beautiful thing. It will be displayed for a short time and then placed in the Masonic club rooms for the use of the members of the order.

CHILD SHOWS EFFECT OF BRUTAL MISTREATMENT
NEW YORK, April 2.—Roberta Jane Pratt, 6-year-old adopted daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Everett S. Pratt of Des Moines, Iowa, at present guests of the Hotel Plaza, was taken from her foster parents today by Justice Levi and turned over to the children's society.

Upon complaint from a guest at the hotel, Vincent T. Pisarra, an agent of the society, together with a doctor, investigated the case, reporting that the child had been maltreated.

An affidavit was submitted today showing that the child's legs and lower back were scarred by 21 half healed burns and bruises.

The woman guest told Mr. Pisarra that the child had told her she had been forced to sleep on the floor; that she had been given only water and Graham crackers for food once a day and that she was burned about the legs by a heated curling iron.

The case is to be taken up again before Justice Levi in children's court Monday.

BULLET WOUND IS FATAL TO KLAMATH FALLS DIVORCEE
KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., April 7.—Mrs. Nellie Clark, 29, died last night from a gunshot wound through the left lung incurred Sunday night when her ex-husband, Frank Clark, attacked her and her escort, C. W. Stephens.

Clark is being held in the city jail on an open charge. A first degree murder charge will probably be placed against him today, authorities said.

Stephens narrowly escaped death or serious injury when a second shot fired by Clark ripped its way through his trousers and missed taking effect in the upper part of his left leg by a fraction of an inch.

Clark admitted the shooting but claimed that he had not intended

Stephens' action in wrestling the gun from Clark's hand prevented the action. An inquest will be held this afternoon. Formal charges will not be filed until after the verdict is returned by the coroner's jury.
