Farmers Need More Money

One of a Series of Articles in the Confidence Promotion Campaign Sponsored by the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce.

Sure, so does your "old man." Douglas county is primarily an agricultural district, we are now producing many times more than we can consume locally, which means that we must sell our surplus to other districts that are not in position to raise to an advantage the products we can here. The more standardized products we have to sell the larger are the markets we can command.

Note the reference to "standardized products." No factory ever made an article for which there was no demand by the consuming public. No farming district ever succeeded that did not raise the kind of produce demanded by the great majority of the consuming public. Neither did any community ever succeed that had no adequate means of selling their products to the consuming public continuously.

A few years ago Wasco county farmers were facing bankruptcy. They were unable to sell their crops. They stopped to consider and with the aid of experts took inventory. The inventory showed over 135 varieties of fruit—52 varieties of apples—being raised in that district. They got busy. Committees were appointed to study and recommend the kind of fruits most greatly demanded by the consuming public. The list was reduced to 16 varieties of which only nine have been planted.

The study also displayed a deplorable lack of cooperation in marketing. Strong recommendations were made and adopted. Presto, Wasco is now producing what the people want (instead of what the farmers like to raise), and actually selling to those people.

Another case of a small county in Minnesota containing only eight townships of waste land becoming a great and profitable dairy section because the producers "got together," studied their possibilities and then diligently carried out the recommendations contained in their reports.

Douglas county has far greater potentialities than either of the above. Our need is for only one producer with vision and tenacity sufficient to start the ball rolling. Such a movement started by only a handful of sincere men would soon have others rallying to the cause, and in the course of a few years Douglas should have one of the greatest and widest known marketing organizations selling only standardized products to a demanding public.

Essentials for such an undertaking are: Cooperation, Vision, and Action.

the N. A. F. E. He got \$500 for work in organizing the Federated Fruit Growers, Inc., which took over the North American Fruit Exchange and later became counsel of the latter organization, he testified.

In his cross-examination Senator Reed invariably referred to the committee of 21 of the American Farm Bureau Federation which, according to testimony by Sapiro yesterday, had to do with a livestock cooperative.

The Federated Fruit Growers was set up under the auspices of the A. F. B. E. by a committee of nine under the chairmanship of C. E. Durr.

The committee of 17, mentioned frequently previously dealt with the grain marketing interests of the A. F. B. E.

A letter from Sapiro to Durr prior to organization of the Federated Fruit Growers stated the fee would be \$3,000 but the witness testified he got only \$500.

Sapiro said differences, not described, led to his resignation from the committee in June, 1922.

Judge Fixes Limit
Judge Raymond was ruling strictly today and held Senator Reed closely to matters touched upon in the direct examination.

"We must not continue to open up new doors for redempt examination or we never will see the end of this case," ruled the court.

He also held Reed and Sapiro to questions and answers and sternly rebuffed them when they deviated.

Sapiro testified his total income from the Federated Fruit Growers by whom he is still employed, was approximately \$20,250.

In the course of his cross-examination, Sapiro attributed the collapse of the Maine Potato Growers Exchange, which had paid him fees of \$19,300 to alleged libelous articles printed in Ford's weekly, the Dearborn Independent.

It was the third time of income Sapiro had attributed directly to the independent articles.

The cross-examination then turned to the Minnesota Potato Growers association.

It, like the Maine association, was organized by S. G. Robinson, with Sapiro as legal counsel and made a contract with the Federated Fruit and Vegetable Growers, Inc., from which Sapiro previously had testified he had received fees of \$20,250, and by which he still is employed.

BIG MOVEMENT DISCUSSED AT ROTARY LUNCHEON

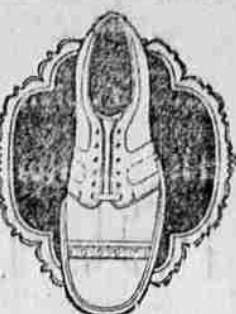

He does not know whether he and his two assistants are to be discharged, combined with the Roseburg staff or transferred to other work.

SERIOUS CLASH IMPENDING AT CITY OF HANKOW

the possible effect of the Peking raid, M. Linde said it was not impossible that the Soviet embassy would be removed from Peking to Hankow, the present seat of the Cantonese regime.

He denounced the raid as an act of vandalism which, if actually approved by the Pekin diplomatic corps, would set a precedent endangering the foundations of diplomatic prerogatives.

He believed, however, that the raid might be regarded as an act of responsible Chinese militarists and that hence there would be no reprisals. The only sizable weapon seized in the raid, he said, was a machine gun. All the foreign diplomatic missions were entitled to possess such weapons, he said, and do possess them.

M. Linde, who was formerly Russian affairs in Peking, said the Soviet club was located in the embassy and that this accounted for the discovery of Cantonese flags, as the club was decorated with the flags of various nations. He said he understood permission for the entry of the Chinese troops and police into the location quarter was obtained solely from the dean of the diplomatic corps and not from all the members of the corps. The latter would be impossible, since the Soviet embassy is on the same basis as the other foreign diplomatic representatives, but was not consulted.

Missionary Missing
PEKING, China, April 7.—An American Lutheran missionary, Dr. C. P. Friberg, of St. Peter, Minn., is missing in northern Honan province and is believed to be held by bandits. All the other members of the Augustana Synod mission are leaving China as soon as passage can be secured.

British warships have been ordered to evacuate the Upper Yangtze region, and all the remaining British residents of Chungking, Ichang, Chungsha and Changling have been removed to Hankow.

The American gunboats may also have to leave the upper stretches of the river, as labor trouble among the Chinese is hindering shipment of the coal on which they depend for fuel.

The situation in Hankow is described as steadily growing worse, with lawlessness increasing. American naval men are pressing the remaining Americans to hasten their departure; the Japanese are leaving, and the Germans and Russians are seeking transportation.

The Japanese at Ichang, up the river, are reported to have taken refuge on gunboats in the face of a threatening situation.

Soviet Meddling Evincing
PEKING, April 7.—Severance of relations between Peking and Moscow was regarded as a probability sequence of yesterday's raid on several buildings near the Soviet embassy in Peking.

The authorities of the Anku-chun, or allied northern armies, acting premier and foreign minister of the Peking government, at Marshal Chang Tso-liang's request, had drafted a protest to the Soviet charge d'affaires accusing the embassy of sheltering criminal plotters who were attempting to undermine the author-
