Careless Boy Blamed

The fire that destroyed the Santa Maria was the result of a lighted match slipped into the oil filled waters of Roosevelt lake by a careless boy. The famous plane, after thousands of miles of dangerous flying over the Atlantic ocean and the jungles of South America, came to her end in a calm desert, nestled between the Marzai and Sierra Ancha ranges. The oil which caused the fire had been spilled during refueling. Captain Del Prete and Ship's Mechanic M. Paechett, who were on the plane, leaped overboard. There was no chance to get to the ship's fire extinguishers and within a short time the heavy motors broke down on the supports and sank to the bottom of the lake, leaving the blazing skeleton of the ship to burn out a few minutes later.

Commander De Pinedo took his loss with outward composure. Efforts to find the youth who threw the match into the lake have so far proved futile.

Fascist Sees Foo's Hand

ROME, April 7.—Some of the leading Rome newspapers today expressed the opinion that destruction of the Corcoran and the Pinedo seaplane at the Roosevelt Dam in Arizona yesterday was caused by anti-Fascist agents. At the same time they voiced appreciation of the action of the United States in offering the Italian flier another machine.

The principal comment is printed by the Popolo di Roma under the heading: "Odious gesture of anti-Fascism abroad against the wings of Pinedo."

While Italian aeronautical circles were pained and shocked at the news of the plane's destruction, the paper says, they were not surprised, because "official circles are fully informed of the

unmentionable anti-national activities being carried on in America by a few exiles."

"This infinitely vile act of sabotage, which tried to crush the greatest enterprise human daring ever undertook," it continued, "was so clearly to be foreseen that its delay until this moment is remarkable."

U. S. Planes Aid
SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., April 7.—Four United States navy air planes under command of Lieutenant Commander A. E. Montgomery, started from the North Island navy air station today for Phoenix, Ariz., where they are to meet Commander Francesco de Pinedo, Italian aviator, and his companions, and bring them to San Diego tomorrow.

U. S. ATHLETES GOING TO HOLLAND IN 1928

NEW YORK, April 7.—The United States will send a team of 300 to 350 athletes to the 1928 Olympics at Amsterdam, Holland, chartering an ocean liner that will be used as a hotel while the games are in progress.
