ORDER ABOLISHES CONVICT STRIPES AT STATE PRISON

Extensive Improvements at
Penitentiary Planned
Also; Contingent
on Funds.

SALEM, Ore., April 8.—No convicts at the Oregon state penitentiary will wear the traditional stripes of their kind in the future. It was decided by the state board of control here today.

All uniforms will be of plain gray cloth, without the red and black horizontal stripes.

Stripes were abolished at the state prison a number of years ago, but were instituted again under the administration of Warden J. W. Little. Little required a few of the most hard-boiled characters about the prison to wear stripes as a special punishment. Jim Lewis, the new warden, told the board this morning that men wearing the stripes were proud of them, were often looked up to with envy by other inmates of the prison.

Tentative action was also taken by the board to remodel and repair several sections of the penitentiary, particularly the women's quarters where it is planned to tear out all partitions between cells and make a general dormitory room and a recreation room.

The board's action will go into effect if money can be diverted from the prison operating fund, for the purpose. A special fund approved by the 1927 legislature was vetoed by Governor Patterson.

A recommendation was made to the board by Henry W. Meyers, prison superintendent, to build three separate buildings for the prison plant. One would contain cells in which prisoners under sentence to hard labor would be kept, another would house the administration department, and the third would be the long-rented industrial building. Authorization of new buildings being executive in its nature, no action on Meyers' recommendation was taken.

house) of the Anderson-Meyer company, American exporters, was looted yesterday.

The admiral also reported the landing at Shanghai of 800 additional Japanese sailors as a result of an attack by Chinese snipers upon Japanese guards ashore.

The destroyer Bulmer, at Amoy, he said, had reported the seamen's strike settled and the American consular staff was allowed to return to the consulate today. The port was functioning as usual except for the postoffice strike which continues.

Soviet Office Guarded

Admiral Willams also reported that a police cordon and a detachment of Shanghai volunteers has been placed about the Soviet consulate at Shanghai. All persons entering or leaving the consulate are searched by these military guards, he said, but he gave no further explanation.

The execution of General Pi Chu Chen, former admiral of the Tanghai fleet and defense commissioner of the Tsin-tao area, was said to have occurred at Tsin-tao. Admiral Pi commanded the Shanghai defenses when that city was captured by the Chinese nationalists army.

Snipers Quieted

SHANGHAI, April 8.—Snipers operating from alley ways and roof tops fired on a party of Japanese patrolling the municipal road in northern district today, but the snipers were seriously wounded.

Shots were exchanged for about an hour, when the arrival of British and Japanese reinforcements caused the snipers to withdraw. Later sniping broke out in a new area of the same district. The Japanese replied and the firing ceased.

The Cantonese (Nationalist) generalissimo has ordered that no civilians would be permitted on the streets with arms in their possession. Last night several armed agitators near the west gate of the settlement were shot dead by troops when they refused to give up their arms.

Joint Protest Ready

PARIS, April 8.—The ministers of France, Great Britain, the United States, Italy and Japan, have been instructed by their governments, says the French foreign office, to hand a joint note of protest to the Peking government against the mistreatment of nationals of their countries.

WASHINGTON, April 8.—Statements by the French foreign office that the United States, Italy, Great Britain, France and Japan were preparing to present a joint note of protest to the Peking government over mistreatment of the various foreign nationals in China failed to find confirmation today

Turmoil at Tientsin

LONDON, April 8.—Surrounding of the Soviet consulate in Shanghai by police and white Russian volunteers, and a raid by Chinese police on the Dahl Bank and various Soviet trade missions in the French concession at Tientsin overshadowed other developments in the Chinese situation set before readers in this morning's newspapers.

At Tientsin the Chinese removed documents for examination and detained all persons connected with the missions pending the search. The French police had no share in the raid, but maintained order outside.

The Soviet consulate at Shanghai was surrounded about 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Sir Percival Phillips, correspondent of the Daily Mail, says the consulate had long been considered the "real headquarters" of the Bolshevik movement in southern China. He describes the building as housing a large staff of officials and many women connected with the Soviet government's various industrial, financial and shipping enterprises. Reuters correspondent says the consulate had been suspected for a long time as the center of local labor agitation and the headquarters of subversive politico-industrial movements.

Report of Raid

Sir Percival Phillips' version of the action is that the building was surrounded by a cordon of European and Chinese municipal police, white Russian infantry and detachments of local volunteers. All persons who entered or left the building were stopped and questioned and all Chinese visitors were searched.

This surprising action of the municipal authorities, he said, undoubtedly was a sequel to the raid at Peking. When the consular staff called the attention of M. Linde, Soviet consul, to the presence of armed constables, he telephoned a protest to the municipal authorities, but the police remained on duty.

At 5 p. m., Sir Percival adds, Russians with fixed bayonets were posted on the Whangpoo road at the entrance to the consulate and around the garden, skirting the bridge and creek where Japanese and American sailors always are on duty, while Chinese police cut off access to a little landing stage, which is frequently used by visitors to the consulate at night from the Astor Hotel opposite.

British constables, accompanied by Russian interpreters then held the main door facing the German consulate and began questioning all clerks leaving after the day's work.

The Dahl (Soviet) Bank, he says, was similarly guarded during the night.

One report from Shanghai says that Herr Salzmann, correspondent of the Vossische Zeitung of Berlin, was stopped and searched by the police as he was leaving the consulate. He protested angrily remarking:

"You'll regret this when you see the telegram I am sending to Germany."

OUTLOOK FOR LAND SETTLEMENT VERY PROMISING

PORTLAND, Ore., April 8.—Looking forward to more intensive activity in Land Settlement in Eastern Oregon, W. G. Ide, Manager of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce, has just completed a trip of ten days throughout the north eastern part of the state.

At La Grande, Mr. Ide addressed the Realty Board and also a regional meeting of the chambers of commerce. He participated also in enthusiastic conferences at Enterprise, Wallawa, Vale, Ontario, Baker and The Dalles, where an enlightened interest was manifest in land settlement work for the coming year.

The government has already begun work on the Vale Irrigation Project, two large dredges being in operation. The first units are expected to be completed this season. This project is now ready for some new settlers. The Owyhee project was also inspected by Mr. Ide in company with W. H. Doolittle of Ontario. The farmers in the districts around Vale and Ontario are feeling most optimistic for 1927. Their crop prospects are excellent and there is a general improvement throughout the entire district. The cooperative creamery located at Payette, which serves this district, shipped 3,000,000 pounds of butter in 1926 mostly to Los Angeles market paying to the producers an average of 48 cents per pound for butter, bringing about a million and a half dollars to the dairymen during the year.

Hermiston was included in the itinerary, conferences being held here with the business men and the county agent who are cooperating. With the abundance of water from the McKay Creek Reservoir, the irrigation districts around Hermiston, Irigon and Boardman will be wonderfully supplied with water for the entire season. Wheat conditions in Umatilla county are the best in a number of years, according to Mr. Ide.

In Wasco county a trip was made from The Dalles over the cherry orchards for the inspection of the new well irrigation system. A very notable improvement was found to be manifest in the cherry

orchards as a result of water being put on in August, 1926, after the crop was taken off. The budding on the trees is heavy and the growers expect at least a 20 per cent increase in size and quality, in addition to a very great increase in yield.

Conferences with reference to placing poultrymen in the orchard districts of Wasco county were participated in by members of a chamber of commerce officials including W. S. Nelson, Ray Kelly and L. Barnum.

New settlers are coming into Eastern Oregon in increasing numbers. Mr. Ide found in his investigations, at Enterprise, one of these newcomers, Charles Phillips has purchased a farm of 170 acres. Mr. Phillips, formerly a prominent farmer of Lexington, Nebraska, unloaded three carloads of settlers' effects in Enterprise the middle of March. He has brought 95 head of registered shorthorn cattle, including some of the best breeding animals in the United States, together with 31 head of purebred shorthorn sheep, and also 100 pure white, White Leghorn hens. This new family is much pleased with Oregon as their new home and are looking forward to having some of their former neighbors join them. One of these neighbors, James Pickering, has already located in Jackson County through the efforts of the Land Settlement Department of the Portland and State Chambers of Commerce.
