**MISSION MEETINGS
ARE STARTED AT ST.

The first of a series of Mission meetings being held at the Episcopal church was well attended last evening.

In making announcements Archdeacon Black who is conducting the meetings called the congregation's attention to a question box which is being maintained for the purpose of answering or trying to answer all sincere questions pertaining to religion. He also asked that those desirous of intercession of prayer to make it known by using the forms provided for that purpose and placing these slips in the same box.

The Archdeacon used as his subject on which to talk "The American Creed." He mentioned the great number of creeds, or more correctly termed, confessions of faith, now in existence and stated that people are coming to realize these creeds, rightly, to determine if their belief can through a reasonable process of thinking still adhere to them. The Missioner gave the thought that we must in selecting our creed glean the truth from the chaff, casting aside those things that through reason are found to be such.

The Missioner admonished people, if they could not find a creed that they could believe in, to build one. He asked the congregation to examine themselves asking, Have I a creed? This evening's discussion will be carried on from that point.

Archdeacon Black besides bringing truths before the people in a sane sensible way that is inspiring is a lovable character which at once places him inside the reserve walls of people's hearts.

FARM REMINDERS

That potato wilt is readily transmitted from one season to the next in infected seed potatoes has been demonstrated many times. As an example one season's test showed approximately 30 per cent infection of veritillum in tubers grown from seed potatoes known to be infected by this same fungus when planted. The tubers produced by one lot of rather badly wilted plants showed 40.2 per cent infection with veritillum when cut and after digging, and another lot gave a crop containing 49 per cent infection.

Lime-sulfur solution as locally prepared is subject perhaps to greater variation in composition than most sprays. When a poor grade of lime is used or the operator is careless in boiling the solution, the lime-sulfur may be low. The orchardist is advised to test the lime-sulfur solution with a Baumé hydrometer and make dilutions for spraying.

Nearly all garden and truck crops are attacked by slugs. They attack the plants mainly at the surface of the soil. They may feed down some distance below the ground and also injure the heads of cabbage and lettuce. The ugly feeding punctures they make afford a ready entrance for decay and often whole plantings are ruined.

The best season for poisoning is early in spring soon after the squirrels are out and active, although late in May and June when the females and young are above ground they can be readily poisoned. As with all other species of ground squirrels found in Oregon poison is most economical and efficient.

We Need More Payrolls

One of a Series of Articles in the Confidence Promotion Campaign Sponsored by the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce.

Practically everyone in the county with one accord is convinced that we need more payrolls, that is, small or large businesses or factories in which more people are regularly employed at permanent and adequate wages.

"But why more payroll?"

"Because more payroll means more people. More people mean more improvements, more taxpayers, more consumers for our farm products, more retail purchasers and possibly the greatest advantages being the labor for these added people means more money coming into the county."

"But how can we get more payroll?"

"By bringing more industries here. By adequate means of preserving and marketing our farm products."

"Where can we get more industries?"

"That's the question. I was afraid you would ask that, because it is so very easy to say 'We Need Payrolls' but when we try to figure where to look for industries we have another story."

"You might laugh when I tell you that industries grow on trees. Sure they do. But those industry bearing trees are fertilized by Advantages, Cooperation, Financial Inducements, Accessible Raw Material, Distribution, Skilled Labor Supply, Factory Sites."

"Any community that can offer a healthy mixture of these ingredients can readily go to the orchard of industry bearing trees and reap a good harvest."

"Now the question to be answered is, 'What advantages or inducements have the cities of Douglas county to offer prospective industries?'"

"Well, we have great possibilities—"

"Sure, great possibilities are not immediate assets."

"There's our great timber resources."

"Yes, that would partially satisfy factories of wooden articles only."

"How about cheap power, purest of soft water, several strong banks, railroads, highways, cheap factory sites, all year working climate, good city government, strong civic and service clubs, the best of schools, churches, etc.?"

"Those advantages are all very good. The next step is to find prospective factories that would appreciate our great advantages and assist them in financing their enterprise, obtain a factory site, assure them of a good supply and permanent outlet for their manufactured product at a profit."

"Then, and not until then, can we induce industries with payrolls to locate in Douglas county."

COURT PREPARES PUBLIC STATEMENT

there is not included therein the item of interest on the funds while held by the County. This item alone will represent a very considerable amount and would bring the total net excess of assets over disbursements to considerably over \$100,000.00.

Reduce Taxes 27 Per Cent

For the year 1926 there was levied a general tax levy of twenty-two and three tenths mills (.0223). Of this general tax levy a trifle over six mills was levied for the purpose of retiring bonded indebtedness and accrued interest. The use of the funds to be derived by the County from sources other than direct tax, as above set out, will, therefore, permit of a reduction in the general tax levy of Douglas County of six mills (.006) or a reduction of twenty-seven per cent (27 per cent) in general taxes throughout the County. It may be added that this reduction in tax levy was taken into consideration in computing the funds to be received yearly under the O. & C. advancement act.

A recapitulation of the above figures follows:

The total amount required to pay bonds and interest \$1,114,835.00

Estimated Jail and Court House Appropriation 200,000.00

Total \$1,314,835.00

Amount now due on O. & C. Act \$49,255.32

Amount due on O. & C. Act 1927 to 1935, inclusive 541,712.06

Amount due on Forest Rentals and auto licenses 1927 to 1935, inclusive 320,000.00

Total Receipts available for retiring bonds, \$1,710,968.38

Excess Receipts over disbursements \$6,133.38

Attention is called, also, to the fact that if the County is not required to pay the claim which has been advanced in favor of the State, there will be additional cash excess in favor of the County of \$300,000.00 from funds now due, and a further amount of approximately \$16,000.00 due the County each year under the O. & C. Act, or total additional receipts in favor of the County by the year 1935 of \$450,000.00.

The Court feels that there will never, in all human probability, be a time in the history of the County when the necessary construction can be done as safely as present. The O. & C. fund permits this construction to be done and reduction in general taxes of more than twenty-five per cent (25 per cent) to be made at the same time, whereas, at any other time, the cost of construction would have to be met by an increased tax.

WATERWAY PERMIT TO GIVE PORTLAND BETTER CHANNEL

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

WASHINGTON, April 8.—The City of Portland, Oregon, was granted authority by the board of army engineers today to close the east channel at Swan Island in the Willamette river by construction of a fill causeway across the upper end of the channel.

The request of Portland that the government deepen the Columbia river to provide the city with a channel to the sea 35 feet deep was considered by the river and harbors board today but the decision was withheld.

Recently the board heard additional testimony from a Portland delegation, headed by Senator McNary of Oregon, after it had reached a tentative decision to leave the depth of the river channel at 20 feet and to widen the channel from 300 to 500 feet, instead of the 600 feet requested.

Senator McNary and the delegation explained that Portland at present is being

own expense had prepared a 35-foot channel through the Willamette river to its junction with the Columbia river and declared that the thirty foot depth of the Columbia was insufficient to allow deep draft vessels to reach the port. They contended that without the commerce of the largest vessels of the Pacific coast the port could not maintain its competition with other western cities.

Employers and Workers Drawing Closer.

Human Unit System Displaced by Democratic Principles, Church Council Finds.

WASHINGTON, April 8.—(A. P.)—A spirit of cooperation between employer and employee is increasingly evident in the industrial world, says the federal council of churches' handbook, made public today.

"Employee representation has grown until approximately 1,000 concerns with a million workers are using democratic methods in solving the problems of industrial relations as they arise in the daily operation of mills and mines," the statement continues. "In several of our more important industries employing about four millions of workers employers and regular labor unions are now working with reasonable harmony and efficiency."

"The day of the docile organization or human units is gone," it declares. "Must stand for an industrial order which is democratic in its ideal, human in its methods and cooperative in its spirit."

Discussing employee representation, the handbook, which is published every two or three years, states that Portland at present is being

holds that "labor's solidarity is not sacrificed by any of their regulations and it concedes the principle of recognition to organized labor."

HOME POINTERS

(From School of Home Economics, O. A. C.)

The standard portion for soft custard is 4 eggs to 4 cups of milk. Six eggs to 4 cups of milk are used for baked custard to be turned out of the mold. Being beaten with a Dover egg beater until smooth, curdled custard is corrected. Lumps will be prevented if the cornstarch is blended with the sugar or some of the liquid before it is added to the scalding milk.

When care is used in preparing cheese dishes so as not to cook the cheese too much, it will not be stringy and curdled.

Quantities to buy for serving six people: vegetables are 6 pounds of unchilled green peas, 2 pounds of carrots, 2 pounds of string beans, and 1 pound of rice.

Letting is attractively shredded by rolling the leaves and cutting with scissors.

One cup of butter equals 1/2 pound. Forty-eight to fifty-six cups of coffee can be made from 1 pound. One cup of walnut meats equals one-fourth of a pound. One cup of granulated sugar equals one-half pound.
