The bride said that on her way to her new home she would stop at Los Angeles and try to persuade her former husband to give up their four-year-old daughter, Mary Hay Barthelmess, who, under terms of her mother's divorce decree, spends six months a year with each parent.

Barthelmess met Miss Hay when she was dancing in the Ziegfeld Follies in 1920 and he was acting in "Way Down East." They were married the same year. Miss Hay left the stage after her marriage.

HOOPER RULE ALTERED; DRIBBLE ONLY ONE BOUNCE

NEW YORK, April 11.—Criticism of the action of the joint basketball rules committee in restricting the dribble in the amateur game to a single bounce came from many quarters today.

Dr. James Naismith, who invented the game 35 years ago, declared the rule change is decidedly a backward step. The dribble, he said, has been one of the most spectacular features of the game.

"The dribble in the game as played in the west has not brought on excessive roughness," he said, when told the committee made the change "to eliminate roughness and to encourage team play."

Dr. Naismith is professor of physical education at Kansas University and is a life honorary member of the committee.

Dr. Forrest C. Allen, coach of basketball at the same university, said he believed the committee had been unnecessarily alarmed about contact in the game and is wrong in trying to do away with it. "Take away legitimate contact and combat from any game," he said, "and you take away much of its virility."

Johnny Murphy, basketball coach at the University of Rochester, himself a veteran player, declared the change would rob the game of much of its spectacular and individual play and would give the taller player a distinct advantage. Low Andrews, coach at Syracuse University, also felt the change would slow up the game. The new rule was adopted unanimously by the committee in annual session here Saturday.

FOREST HIGHWAY PROGRAMS APPROVED FOR 14 STATES

Apportionments from the \$4,500,000 forest highway fund authorized for the fiscal year 1928 which begins next July 1 have been approved by the Secretary of Agriculture for highways in or adjacent to National Forests in fourteen western States and Alaska. It is announced by the Forest Service, United States Department of Agriculture.

The programs for the various States were determined following conferences attended by the State Highway Commissioners, Bureau of Public Roads, and the Forest Service.

The State quotas of funds to be made in many instances balance remaining from the apportionments made for the current fiscal year in addition to the allotments

available from the \$4,500,000 fund for the coming fiscal year. The amounts programmed for each State will be devoted to location surveys and maintenance of existing roads as well as to actual construction work on various important projects in the forest highway system. The apportionments were made in accordance with regulations for carrying out the provisions of Section 23 of the Federal Highway Act.

The amounts programmed for the fourteen Western States and Alaska, after setting aside contingent funds and amounts estimated as required for administration and equipment, follow:

WILDERNESS AREAS CAN STILL BE FOUND IN NATL. FORESTS

The day of the "great wide open spaces" is not yet past, nor is it in any immediate danger of passing, according to the Forest Service, United States Department of Agriculture.

Consternation on the part of many nature lovers and outdoor enthusiasts over the invasion of forest areas by highways and summer resorts led the Forest Service to undertake a study to determine just how much of the areas of the National Forests could still be

classified as wilderness. The results showed that approximately one-third of the gross acreage of the National Forests is still sufficiently "untamed" to come under that class, and that there are large areas which are in no immediate danger of the encroachment of gasoline fumes, bathing and other marks of civilization.

In making its study of the wilderness areas, the Forest Service adopted the widest possible margin of safety to minimize the possibility that some person might lay a finger on a part of the map classed as wilderness and assert that he had driven his automobile to that point. The minimum size of a real "wilderness" area was taken as comprising 10 townships, 360 square miles, or 230,000 acres. It was determined that at present there are 74 areas, ranging from 360 to 10,859 square miles in extent, which, so far as can be determined, are without roads. The grand total area is 85,750 square miles, or an average of 1,159 square miles per area. If the proposed Forest Road system, as at present planned on paper, were 100 per cent completed, there would still be 61 areas ranging in extent from 360 square miles to 5,000 square miles, with a total area of 52,920 roadless square miles, and an average of 868 sections per area. These figures are exclusive of Alaska.

"The situation is not so bad as some had feared," says L. F. Kuehn of the Forest Service. "At present one-third of the gross acreage of the National Forests, exclusive of Alaska, is in roadless areas of more than 230,000 acres in extent. After all the roads our field officers have planned to date have been constructed, there will still be approximately one-fifth of the gross area of National Forests in roadless areas of 10 townships or more."

TAGS TO IDENTIFY AIRPLANE CLASSES

WASHINGTON, April 11.—Airplanes from now on must carry license tags similar to those on automobiles. In line with recent legislation by congress, the commerce department today issued regulations governing markings for aerial traffic.

The letter "C" in front of the license number will signify a commercial plane, the letter "S" a plane belonging to a state, the letter "X" an experimental plane and a straight number a private plane.

Air pilots will be divided into four classifications ranging from the grade of private chauffeur to the highest distinction of "transport pilot," a term applied to the driver of a big machine for long distance carriage of goods and people. Besides there is a commercial pilot grade and a "limited commercial pilot" grade, the latter permit going to a pilot competent to take up passengers for short trips around an air field.
