act had caused this precaution.

Sentence Due to Murder. The crime for which Sacco and Van Zetti were sentenced was the murder of Frederick A. Parmenter, paymaster at the shoe factory of the Sater & Morrill company in South Braintree, and Alexander Berardelli, his guard, on April 15, 1920.

The men were shot down at the door of the factory and their assailants escaped in an automobile with several thousand dollars, the factory payroll.

Sacco and Vanzetti were arrested on May 5, 1920, and indicted for murder on September 11, 1920.

Meanwhile Vanzetti had been convicted of the attempted robbery of a shoe factory paymaster in Bridgewater and sentenced to the state prison for 12 to 15 years. Both men came from Italy many years ago.

They admitted that they were radicals. A Sacco-Vanzetti defense committee spent several hundred thousand dollars in paying counsel and other expenses. There were remonstrances in many cities in Europe and South America on the part of sympathizers with the two men. American embassies were the particular target of several bombing and other disorders.

EPISCOPAL MISSIONER DISCUSSES APOSTLES CREED

In continuing the Episcopal Mission Sunday, Archdeacon Black, who is conducting the services, compared the average American creed, which he has been talking on in these services, with the Apostles Creed. He brought out that in the Apostles Creed we believe not only in a God but in a God whose attributes include personality.

The Apostle's Creed ascribes personality to God in "God the Father" and "our Father, the Archdeacon said, God is not a cold scientific being, but a living, loving, sympathizing person. Not limited to personality as we in our small human way understand the term but at least including our conception of personality.

It is through Christ, he said, that we came to a clearer understanding of God's personality and through the Bible and men's experience that we are enabled to know Christ, coupled with the fact that Christ has chosen to know us. Archdeacon Black emphasized that we are not compelled to grope in the dark seeking to know Christ but that Christ is standing outside the doors of our hearts knocking for admittance. We have simply to unlock the door, make an effort to open the doors and Christ will do the rest. He made the assurance that the Christian religion is not abstract but through sincerity is a concrete thing in our lives which with God's help becomes an actual living power.

HUNTER OUTWITS WOLF WITH \$30,000 RECORD

BILLINGS, Mont., April 11.—"Old Snow Slide," responsible during the past ten years for the killing of livestock valued at approximately \$30,000, has after eight months of strategy fallen victim to a skilled hunter, Barney Brannin, government employee, captured the former menace.

The wolf's death came as a result of poison bait—a trap which he had avoided for years. Although he used three different horses in seeking to capture "Old Snow Slide," the wolf came to recognize the scent of their tracks as well as those of Brannin. In order to outwit the animal Brannin resorted to the plan of leaving his horse on the traveled highway and then make a covering of sheepskins which he placed over his shoes before leaving the trail to go out and prepare his bait.

MRS. MCGEE WEEPS AS SHE GOES TO TRIAL 2ND TIME

HILLSBORO, Ore., April 11.—Mrs. Eva McGee, widow of Dr. W. G. McGee, wept as she entered the Washington county court room this morning for the opening of her second trial on a charge of slaying her husband with poison. Her first trial in Tillamook last November resulted in a disagreement of the jury. She has been out on bail since the first trial.

Showing signs of mental strain, Mrs. McGee wiped tears from her eyes as she took her seat in the court room. After the opening preliminary selection of a jury was begun.

The state charges that Dr. McGee, who for years was a physician at Nehalem, Oregon, died August 17, 1926, as a result of poison doses administered by the wife in medicine. He had been ill for some time and was cared for at a rooming house which Mrs. McGee conducted in Tillamook.

BICYCLIST IN 39TH YEAR WINS SIX-DAY RACE; 13TH FIRST

NEW YORK, April 11.—Reggie McNamara of Newark, N. J., "Iron Man" at 39 years of age, was hailed today as the world's greatest six-day bicycle racer and one of the best the gruelling game has ever seen.

After winning at Madison Square last month when paired with Franco George, McNamara left at once to race in Paris. He and his Belgian partner, Aerts, won yesterday. It was McNamara's 13th victory and his 52nd six-day race.

He won at Paris in characteristic style, coming from behind in the last half of the race. In his last race here he again proved himself worthy of the name "Iron Man" by riding lap after lap with a broken rib.

MILTON RESIDENT, 64, HANGS HIMSELF

PENDLETON, Ore., April 11.—A man by the name of Smith, 64, committed suicide in Milton this morning by hanging himself. His body was found this morning in a rooming house with towels tightly knotted into a rope about his neck. Little is known of the man, who was a transient, and it is said he had recently come to Milton from Georgia.

OREGON NEWS

Paul A. Dormitzer, Coos county lawyer, is under arrest at Astoria, charged with issuing worthless checks on a Marshfield bank.

The newly organized state game commission, at its first meeting at Salem last Saturday, elected Harold Clifford, of Canyon City, state game warden to succeed E. F. Averil. The change takes place May 1.

State Treasurer Thomas B. Kay, who is in very poor health, has gone to California in obedience to the order of physicians. On his return from the rest period he will inspect the soldiers home in West Roseburg.

Mrs. William F. Galloway, 89 years old, a pioneer of Tillamook county, was burned to death in her home at Tillamook Saturday when flames barred her way to safety and trapped her in the burning building.

The total property tax levied in Oregon this year amounts to \$17,805,536.82, an increase of \$2,959,443.21 over 1926, according to a report issued Saturday by Earl L. Fisher, state tax commissioner. Taxes are levied on the rolls of 1926 for the year 1927, as last year's taxes were levied on the rolls of 1925. The increase in total property taxes throughout the state this year amounts to between 6 and 7 per cent, according to the statistics. This is made possible despite the constitutional 6 per cent limitation by numerous special levies that were authorized by vote of the people in some districts. The statistics are exclusive of levies made for fire patrol.

TOWN SPENDS \$40,000 TO LURE PHYSICIAN

OXFORD, Md., April 11.—This little village on the banks of the Tred Avon river is going to have a resident physician if it has to spend \$40,000 to get him.

The population of Oxford is about 900. The villagers found a young physician who was convinced that there were enough disease germs in the village to enable it to support him. But when the young physician discovered that Oxford has neither water nor sewerage system he feared to risk his reputation with too many germs, and so fled himself back to the city.

Oxford now has authority from the state legislature to issue bonds for \$40,000 for a water supply system and a sewage disposal plant. When the improvements are installed the village will cost about once more for a physician.

MARKETS

PORTLAND, Ore., April 11.—Monday's wholesale market for meats and poultry opened with a steady tone all around with prices maintained even with Saturday's close in the day's early trading.

Trading opened a little late and early receipts were customarily light.

The market for good heavy hogs continues very firm due to the Easter season, even though receipts are quite plentiful.

Butter and eggs are unchanged from price ranges reported Saturday. Receipts of eggs are continuing heavy but with hundreds of cases being stored daily, the market shows a good demand for the balance and the price level is regarded good for this season.
