WHAT DOUGLAS MAKES---MAKES DOUGLAS GROW

PARTY LEADERS COOLIDGE GUESTS AT WHITE HOUSE

Senator Willis Says Only
Earthquake Could Keep
the President From
Another Term.

WASHINGTON, April 12.—President Coolidge called into a break fast conference at the temporary White House today a group of republican leaders representative of nearly all sections of the country, and including Chairman Butler of the republican national committee and other party wheel horses.

While the guest list included a significant number of men experienced in the way of politics, it was insisted that nothing in particular was talked about. After the conference Chairman Butler accompanied the president to the White House in his limousine.

The guests included Senator Curtis, Kansas; Stuart, Utah; McNary, Oregon; and Keyes, New Hampshire, representatives of the New York, New York, Ohio, and Tennessee, Massachusetts, New York, Maine; Everett Sanders, secretary to the president; C. Buscom Slomp, the president's former secretary; and R. H. Creager, republican national committeeman for Texas.

Senator Willis, who has just toured the country, declared "only an earthquake" could keep Mr. Coolidge from another term. Governor Smith of New York will be the democratic nominee, he predicted.

"President Coolidge can carry Iowa right now against any republican candidate, including Mr. Lowell, the senator continued. "He will carry every state in the west beginning with Pennsylvania against Governor Smith who probably will get New York and some of the southern states."

Senator Willis predicted that Governor Romney of Ohio would be Smith's running mate and that this ticket would lose Ohio against Coolidge by 250,000. The republican ticket also would carry Kentucky, Tennessee and Missouri, he said.

Law enforcement would be the issue in the campaign, the senator said, and the republican party must meet it squarely.

"Any party that goes into the

next campaign proposing repeal of the 18th amendment," he declared, "will be wiped out of existence for twenty years," he said.

Senator Willis questioned the authority of Frederick Land, who headed the Iowa delegation which recently visited Frank O. Lowden, to offer Iowa's support to Mr. Lowell for president.

She then said that once, when the colonel was asleep and Campbell was sitting in the next room, she slipped out and kissed Campbell on the top of his bald head.

RECORD HARVEST OF WINTER WHEAT IS ANTICIPATED

PORTLAND, April 12.—Present indications appear to warrant for the 1927 harvest, a forecast of the largest per acre yield of winter wheat for the past several years in Oregon and the Pacific northwest.

F. L. Kent, statistician, United States Department of Agriculture, said today.

In the western part of the state (which area produces only about 20 per cent of the state total wheat crop) "drowning out" has been greater than usual, and there was also some damage from freezing out. But in the eastern part of the state, snow covered the ground during the short spell of low temperatures, and the unusually favorable soil moisture condition more than offsets the slightly unfavorable condition in the western part of the state.

Winter wheat looks so good in the eastern part of the states of Oregon and Washington, that some enthusiastic observers are forecasting a total Pacific northwest (Oregon, Washington, and Idaho) wheat crop of 125,000,000 bushels. This production, however, hardly seems probable in view of the fact that the large production of 1923 was only 118,000,000 bushels and none of the total wheat crops of the three states since 1923 have been in excess of 50,000,000 bushels.

It is reported that considerably more than the usual amount of spring wheat has been or will be seeded by the "stubble in" process, and on early spring plowing, as a result of the present favorable soil moisture condition. Should favorable summer moisture conditions prevail, this acreage might be a considerable factor in the 1927 crop. But ordinarily, these systems of seedling are not considered good farm practice.

Since the United States report on winter wheat abandonment is regularly made as of May 1st each year, no forecast of probable 1927 production has been made as of April 1st. Condition of the Oregon crop is estimated at 95.9 per cent of normal, compared with 96 per cent a year ago, and the ten year average is 96.6 per cent. It is anticipated that the condition of the Oregon crop will show improvement during April. The lower figures are reported for this year at present.

Three private crop reporting concerns in Chicago have placed their forecasts of the 1927 winter wheat crop at about two per cent more than the same estimates a year ago.

Oregon rice condition is placed at 100 per cent of normal, compared with 95 per cent a year ago, and the ten year average of 94 per cent.

United States rice condition is estimated at 86.4 per cent of normal, compared with 89.2 per cent a year ago, and the ten year average of 86.3 per cent.

Climatic conditions have been unfavorable for spring work, and the season is generally regarded as being behind the average season. This is particularly true in view of the early season a year ago, when April 1 development was easily three weeks ahead of this year's growth on the same date.

SACCO-WANZETTI CASE PUTS GUARD AT U. S. EMBASSY

LONDON, April 12.—Scotland Yard, says the Daily Express, has ordered special uniformed and non-uniformed police to guard the American embassy in London, while Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti are awaiting execution in Massachusetts. These precautions are being taken because of the possibility of a bomb attack.

OAKLAND, Calif., April 12.—Four boys declared to have confessed thefts of autos in Bellingham, Seattle and Olympia, Wash., in Portland, Eugene and Ashland, Oregon, and in West, Redding, Oakland and Salinas, Calif., were held in the city jail here today while police investigated their stories. Their preliminary examination has been set for April 14.

The boys were arrested at Salinas for Oakland police Saturday. They gave the names of Jack Hartley, John Sherlock and Earl Babette, each 18 years old. They said they stole an automobile in each of the foregoing cities enroute down the coast.

FRED SOUTHWICK GOES TO DALLAS AS FIRE WARDEN

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BATH TUB CARROLL GIVES UP BATTLE TO AVOID PRISON

NEW YORK, April 12.—Earl Carroll, theatrical producer, presented himself at the federal building today to surrender to officers waiting to take him to Atlanta penitentiary to serve a year and a day for perjury committed in connection with his "bath tub" party more than a year ago.

Carroll went directly to the office of United States Marshal Hecht. The doors were locked and newspaper men were denied admittance.

When Carroll's case was called before Federal Judge Hand, his lawyer, Samuel Falk, arose and said "he surrenders." The producer was not brought before the judge, being kept in the marshal's room.

News and Views of Women

NEW YORK—Royalties on her previous novels may be large. But they will not prevent Mrs. Mazo de la Roche from being excited by the award made to her today of \$10,000 for her most recent novel "Jalna" which was chosen by the Atlantic Monthly as the most interesting novel written last year. Nearly 1100 manuscripts were submitted to the contest judges.

Mrs. de la Roche is a Canadian, living in Toronto. She is the author of three published novels and several one-act plays. Her literary career began when at 15 she wrote her first short stories for American magazines.

Mrs. de la Roche is the first Canadian author since Sir Gilbert Parker to win such laurels in the United States, for as a prize winner, the novel will undoubtedly become a best seller. The prize money is in addition to royalties on that Mrs. de la Roche, who has had a difficult struggle for years to make an adequate living from her writings, will at last achieve comfortable financial circumstances.

GLASGOW, Scotland—What will happen to bachelor members of the house of commons when the woman vote becomes greater than the male vote?

Sir Robert Horne, who represents the Hillhead district of Glasgow, is among the unmarried members of parliament who are facing this problem.

At present men and women voters run neck and neck in the district. There are 14,109 women and

14,063 men who are qualified voters. But if the women ever get the ballot on the same terms as men, women voters will far outnumber men. In fact, political leaders believe there will probably not be a constituency in the British Isles where there will not be more women than men voting when they are put on equal footing.

At present there are 12,667,303 men electors and 9,587,121 women electors in Great Britain. There are nearly 2,000,000 more women than men in England.

RALEIGH, N. C.—College courses for men in baby tending and dish washing "will cut down the nation's divorce toll."

Mrs. Jane S. McKimmon, head of North Carolina's home demonstration corps, is the woman who suggests this addition to educational curriculum.

Lack of training for family life is responsible for a great many divorces granted each year," she explains. "I would not have the men do all the house work, but I would teach them how, simply to give them an insight into problems which women have to face each day."
