FEDERAL ARMY IN NICARAGUA CLAIMS DECISIVE VICTORY

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, April 12.—General Viquez, reported to the Conservative president, Adolfo Diaz, today that the Conservatives were victorious in all their engagements yesterday. He said they forced the Liberals to abandon all their positions on the hill tops and retreat toward Esquipulas and the south, with the loss of 16 machine guns, two three-inch cannon and sixty cases of ammunition. General Viquez expressed the belief that the Liberals were forced by hunger to abandon their positions and retreat toward the jungle. He estimated that the dead numbered 100 in two days' engagements.

SAPIRO ENTERS ELEVENTH DAY ON REED GRILL

Connection With 2 Oregon Cooperative Groups Is Related in Court.

\$10,000 BILL HALVED

Subpoena Finally Served on Ford's Secretary. One on Ford Also, It Is Claimed.

DEBOTO, April 12.—Aaron Sapiro resumed the witness stand today for his eleventh day of cross-examination in his million dollar libel suit against Henry Ford.

There was a tense atmosphere in the court room with the attorneys and the witness highly formal, following yesterday's criticism by Judge Raymond of the manner in which the examination was being conducted. Immediately following the court's lecture, Sapiro moved for a mistrial but the judge denied the motion with further criticism.

Senator James A. Reed, chief of Ford's counsel, today questioned the witness regarding the Oregon Growers' Cooperative association and its subsidiary, the Oregon Growers' Packing association, from which Sapiro got \$5000, after his original bill for \$10,000 was disputed.

Reed tried to show that Sapiro acted for the cooperative concern and the commission company at the same time, making the contract by which the commission company became sales agents for the cooperative.

William Henry Gallagher, Sapiro's counsel, insisted that the defense prove each step in its cross-examination and nothing was accepted that could not be legally established as a fact.

Ford's Secretary Served

Attorney Gallagher said today that a subpoena had been served on E. G. Liebold, general secretary to Ford, after many weeks of trying to reach him.

"The subpoena was made returnable tomorrow," Liebold was served by a process server after a long chase down the street this morning, Gallagher said.

The process server came to him yesterday offering to bet he could reach Liebold and was given the chance.

He found Liebold yesterday afternoon but when he sought to serve the paper, guards with Liebold adjourned his arrest until Liebold had fled, Gallagher said.

This morning the process server caught Liebold as he was emerging from his Highland Park home and after the foot race served the paper.

Gallagher said that while Liebold would have to be in court tomorrow morning there would be no change in his plan to demand Ford as the next witness after Sapiro left the stand.

Subpoena Job Difficult

It developed that Thomas S. Warshaw, who frequently acts as an agent for attorneys, served the subpoena upon Liebold.

He was waiting in an automobile this morning when Liebold came out of his home, and chased him two blocks. Liebold's motor was said to have been stalled, and the pursuit continued another block by foot.

The serving of a subpoena upon Henry Ford was mounted today by Francis Fitzgerald.

He said that after weeks of effort he found Ford seated with Major R. W. Schroeder and others in an automobile at the Ford Airport.

"I walked over to his car and said, 'are you Henry Ford?' and he said, 'h-m-m-m,'" said Fitzgerald. "I am here to serve a subpoena on you from the federal court," I said and tossed the subpoena on his lap. He said 'no, no, no' and a guard picked up the subpoena and threw it out of the car."
