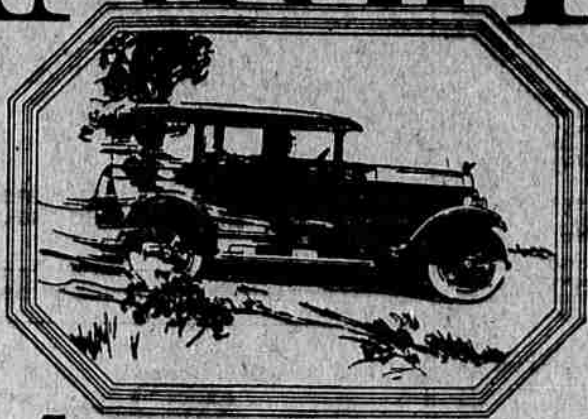

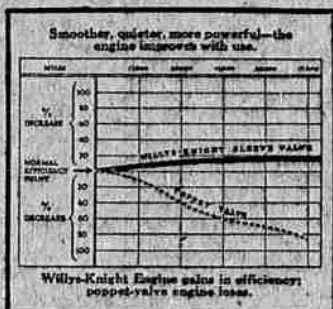

OPEN FISHING FOR SIX-INCH TROUT APRIL 15

Season Lasts Until 30th
of November; 10 Inches
Limit After That.

ALL YEAR IN UMPQUA

Diamond Lake Angling to
Begin June 1; Hook and
Line Caught Fish
Can't Be Sold.

April 15—next Friday—is the opening day of the new season. Six-inch trout are legal catch from that day until November 30. Resident anglers' licenses and juvenile licenses cost \$3 and \$1.50 in their own counties. Non-residents will pay the same fees added in their states. Instead of the \$5 fee required last year.

And this is what the new game laws say of six-inch trout in district No. 1: Open season from April 15 to November 30, both dates inclusive; bag limit in streams, 20 fish, or 20 pounds in any one day, and 60 fish, or 40 pounds and one fish, in any seven consecutive days; provided, it is unlawful to have in possession more than 60 fish, or 40 pounds and one fish, at any time.

Diamond Lake Rules
The open season in Diamond lake will be from June 1 to November 30, but it is unlikely that many will fish there as early as June, for reports from Diamond lake April 1 indicated ice still covered the lake and snow was six feet deep over the ice. There the bag limit will be five fish, or 15 pounds and one fish, in any one day and not to exceed 35 fish, or 30 pounds and one fish, in any seven consecutive days.

Bag limits in all lakes in game district No. 1, except Diamond lake, shall be 30 fish, or 15 pounds and one fish, in any one day, and not to exceed 60 fish, or 30 pounds and one fish, in any seven consecutive days.

10 Inches After No. 30
Trout over ten inches are legal catch all year in waters of the Umpqua river from its mouth to nine miles above Tillamook on the south branch, and to Lone Rock bridge on the north branch.

Bag limits for these fish are 30 fish, or 20 pounds, in any one day, and 60 fish or 40 pounds, and one fish, in any seven consecutive days, provided it shall be unlawful to have in possession more than 60 fish, or 40 pounds and one fish, at any time.

List These Don'ts
Then there are certain "don'ts" that every angler should know. Among them are: Don't angle between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise; don't use anything other than hook and line; don't use more than one line or line and rod; don't sell, barter or exchange any fish caught by hook and line; don't angle within 200 feet of any highway; don't wantonly waste fish; don't fish on lands without the owner's permission; don't trap, spear, gaff, hook or snag fish; don't take trout under six inches; don't ship fish without written permit.

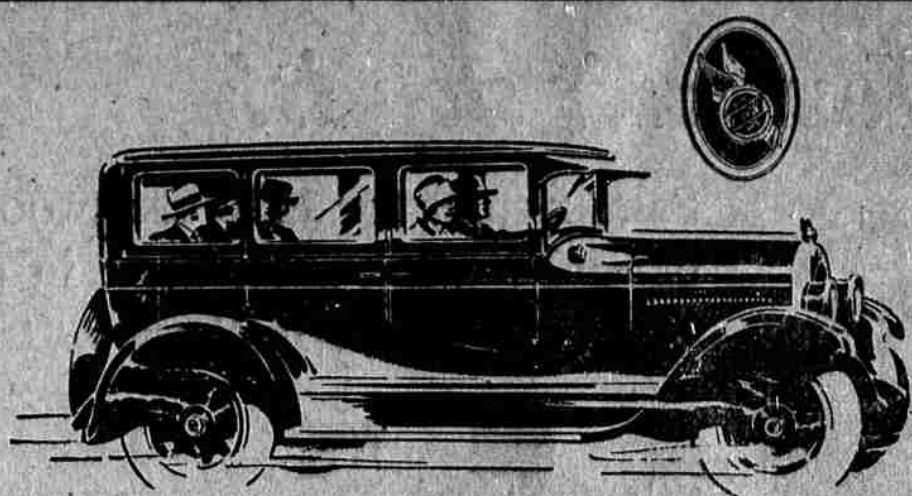
And don't forget to have your license with you, to show it to wardens who may ask, and do not resist wardens.

CAST OF SENIOR HIGH TO ENTER DRAMA CONTEST

This tournament is modeled somewhat after the plan of the community fair started by Cornell University and is the first of its kind to ever be held in this state. The tournament dates are May 4, 5 and 6. Roseburg Senior High School will send a cast which will put on the one-act play, "Trifles." The members include Thos. Hartfield in the part of Geo. Henderson; Milford Howard as Mr. Peters; Bill Knight as Mr. Hale; Pauline Bubar in the role of Mrs. Peters; Dalphine Hughes as Mrs. Hale. The play is being coached by Lloyd Reynolds.

The entertainment on Friday evening will include a comedy, "You Know I Know Shake," a monologue skit, a moving picture and musical numbers.

EASTERN OREGON FARMERS FAVOR LARGE POWER UNIT

Wheat farmers in the dry-land area of eastern Oregon invariably find it to their advantage to use large units of either tractor or animal power, thereby permitting a maximum amount of work to be done with a minimum of man labor and more nearly at the proper time, the Bureau of Agricultural Economics of the United States Department of Agriculture has found in a survey of the use of tractors and horses in that region. Whether to use tractors and horses or to depend entirely upon horses is an unsettled question in the region, many farmers preferring to use horses alone while other favor the use of both horses and tractors.

The farms are relatively large. They require the use of large machinery and much power for many operations, and where tractors are used the 40-horsepower horse-power size of the crawler or track layer type is most in favor. The tractor competes with horses in the heavier operations, such as plowing, disking before plowing, and harvesting on the other hand, horses are used as a general thing for the lighter operations, such as spike-tooth harrowing, weeding and drilling, and on some farms for all field operations. From 6 to 25 horses are used on the various tillage and harvesting implements in use in the area.

The average tractor in eastern Oregon accomplishes an amount of work in plowing equivalent to the work of 25 horses for the same period of time. In disking before plowing the equivalent of 35 horses; and in harvesting and threshing with the combine the work of 25 horses. Full details of the study have been published in Department Bulletin No. 1447-D, Cost of Using Horses, Tractors and Combines on Wheat Farms in Sherman County, Oregon. Copies may be obtained free from the United States Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C., as long as the supply lasts.

OXFORD, Eng., April 12—Barbed wire enclosures have been thrown about St. Hilda's College for women in an effort to keep out

2 Laymen on New Jersey Supreme Court

Personnel Rule Established
in 1844 Still Effective
Decisions by Ballot.

TRENTON, N. J., April 12—Joseph L. Dear of Jersey City shares with George Van Buren of Hackensack the distinction of being the only laymen on the bench of the highest court of the state—the only court in which laymen sit. They receive \$40 for each day spent in court.

Although the constitution of 1844 empowers governors to appoint laymen to any court of the state, they have always been appointed to the Court of Errors and Appeals. This court renders its decisions by ballot rather than by

few courts in the United States which does so. The procedure is a relic of colonial days, when the court was made up of the governor and his council of county representatives.

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FARM POINTERS
