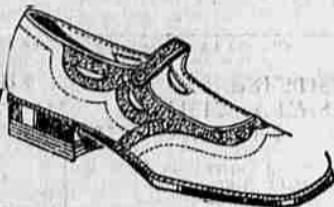

EVIDENCE BEGINS IN MCGEE TRIAL

(Associated Press Special Wire.)

HILLSBORO, Ore., April 13.—C. W. Barrick, district attorney of Tillamook county, presented the state's charges against Mrs. Eva N. McGee today in her second trial on the charge of slaying her husband, Dr. W. G. McGee, Nehalem, Oregon, physician, who died last August.

Facts upon which the state will rely, as outlined by Barrick, were practically the same as those brought out in her first trial, at Tillamook, in which the jury disagreed. Purchases of poison by the wife while Dr. McGee was ill at her rooming house recovering from an accident; changes in the beneficiaries of life insurance policies; and arrangements for the funeral two days before the death of Dr. McGee, were the main points stressed by Barrick.

Walter Toomey, of McMinnville, of counsel for Mrs. McGee, followed Barrick, attacked the state's charges.

The jury was completed late yesterday. It includes eleven men and one woman.
