THE IMPORTANCE OF THE CHURCH DISCUSSED

Archdeacon Black in his Mission service at the Episcopal Church last evening summed up the topics gone into during the series of Mission meetings being held. They bring: "The Average American Creed," "The Apostles Creed," "Friendship With Jesus," "Sin a Disease," "The One Obstacle to Friendship With Jesus" and "The Cure for Sin."

His subject last evening was "The Church." He stated that the Church was the instrument or means by which we gain friendship with Christ.

Christ, the Archdeacon said, found the Christian Church after His resurrection and named it as being His body. We as members are cells in that body, some dead and some alive.

It was pointed out that we retain life as cells in the body of Christ through contact with the church and thereby gain experiences of God.

An experience of God, he went on, is a realization of the glory of God. His wonderful majesty, purity and love. It is a flood of illuminating light into the darkness of our souls overwhelming us with the disclosure of our awful guilt and through the experience lifting us up into the higher realms of a God given peace. The men of old, he said, had these experiences of God through their devotion to God and later by their personal companionship with Christ.

At Christianity, the Missioner said, has since its institution broadened and deepened we are enabled through his growth to know God better than the disciples of old. Having the two thousand years of experiences of men in Christianity before us for study added to by the aid of the life-giving blood of the church we can with a sound conviction develop a happy state of peace and love and service that will bring the much needed experiences of God.

It was announced that the last Mission service of this series will be held Thursday evening.

In the first two games of the season the Yank's bats swung so effectively against the veteran Athletics that the Huggins clan today looks down upon the other teams of the league, the only club thus far to chalk up two in the winning column. The Yanks got 16 hits off four Athletics pitchers yesterday.

Some world-beating pitching was exhibited in the comeback of the champion Cardinals in Chicago where Jess Haines, hero of last fall's world series, held the Cubs to two hits in nine innings. The Cubs were shut out 5 to 0, evening the count for the first two games.
