Guy Cordon in Portland—
"Our contention is that the state is not entitled to any part of the Oregon and California land grant appropriation," says Guy Cordon, district attorney for Douglas county. "If the state's contention is correct, the state will step in and take about \$1,500,000. We argue that the state has lost nothing, for the respective counties paid the state tax from year to year and therefore has no claim on any of the money that the congress has appropriated for the counties. This question has been debated ever since the appropriation was made and, of course, it will have to be determined in the courts. It is a clearcut issue and everyone wants to know what is what. From the viewpoint of the counties involved, the state is not entitled to a nickel, but of course, state officials think and claim otherwise. It would be a nice contribution to the state if it could get the money, but we don't consider the state is warranted in making the claim." The secretary of state has started the case by calling on Marion county to turn over to the state a percentage of the money which that county has been allowed by the federal government. The case will be taken to the supreme court as quickly as possible.—Morning Oregonian.

STORM ON MEDITERRANEAN TAKES LIVES AND CRAFT

PARIS, April 14.—An undetermined number of lives has been lost and four vessels wrecked along the coasts of Spain and Morocco in consequence of the great storm which started Tuesday over the Mediterranean.

Hundreds of fishing smacks are missing, and it is believed many fisher folk have been drowned. Dispatches through Spain this afternoon estimated the material damage at \$10,000,000.

Several buildings were swept off the Gibraltar coast and the piers and village there are inundated, the population being forced to flee.

MRS. CARRINGTON FREED FROM CANE WELDING SPOUSE

CHICAGO, April 14.—Mrs. Anna Walsh Snyder Carrington of New York, grandmother and ex-actress, today was granted a divorce from Colonel Edward C. Carrington on grounds of cruelty.

A property settlement agreement was reported to have given Mrs. Carrington \$100,000.

The end of the sensational trial in which Colonel Carrington and his wife, who is 42, and his brother, Campbell, about 50, all grand parents, and divorced, were the triangle, came with the decision of Circuit Judge George Fred Rush, after comparatively brief arguments.

Reports of an agreement having been reached out of court yesterday, when the trial was in adjournment, were followed by withdrawal of charges of infidelity by both sides when the hearing was resumed today.

With only the allegations of cruelty by Mrs. Carrington and that of desertion by the fiery colonel, who, at different times had named both his brother, who he named as co-respondent, and his wife, the trial was resumed with the Colonel on the stand.

He denied that he ever had been unfaithful to his wife, and admitted that he had been often away from her on hunting and fishing trips and had been high tempered, but insisted he had not been cruel to her.

George L. Schein, counsel for Mrs. Carrington, in his plea to the court, emphasized an incident when he said the Colonel had bit his wife's thumb when he tried to take a letter from her and also of the occasion when he struck her with his cane.

WITNESS TO ALLEGED WILL FREED OF PERJURY

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
PORTLAND, Ore., April 14.—Circuit Judge Hewitt today directed a verdict of acquittal for Frederick G. Elder, carpenter, who was accused of perjury in connection with his testimony in the John Ezra Spier will contest before Circuit Judge Taxwell last September.

Elder was charged with perjury for testifying before Judge Taxwell that he saw Spier sign his name to a will in which Mary Louise Conley, reputed step-daughter of Elder, was named sole beneficiary. The state contended that Spier's signatures on the will were traced from a book containing his signature. Under the statute, as construed by the judge, the prosecution was compelled to present a witness to the alleged tracing. The state's case, however, was made up of circumstantial and documentary evidence only.

Judge Hewitt declared that the case should be appealed and that if the supreme court sustained his interpretation of the statute, steps should be taken to change the law.
