COUNTY ASSESSOR STARTS WORK OF DIVIDING FUND

The county assessor's office is starting the task of segregating the O. and C. money to the various districts which will benefit under the terms of the appropriation. The figures given by the government in their audit provide for a total appropriation to the county of \$1,471,640.66, or approximately \$23,000 less than the county had put in its claim for. The assessor's office must now figure the appropriation to be made to each district that receives special road

or special school tax on O. and C. lands. The general county fund will receive \$1,021,298.37, according to present figures. Of this sum the state is trying to grab over \$300,000. The special road fund, it is figured, will receive \$137,778.97 and the Port of Umpqua will get \$59,350.61. These are the only funds upon which estimates based on the revised figures have been made. It is roughly calculated, however, that the Union high school fund will get about \$65,000 and the special school fund about \$195,000. These figures will vary considerably when the final records are made up.

The task which faces the assessor's office is a difficult one, for the tax for all of the years must practically be extended anew. It will be weeks before the appropriations to the various districts are accurately figured.
