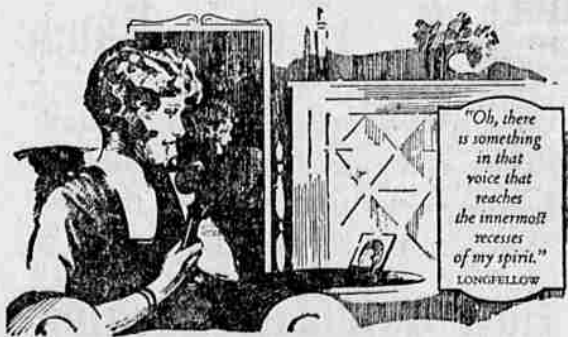
From Eugene—

Chiefs to Attend Council—

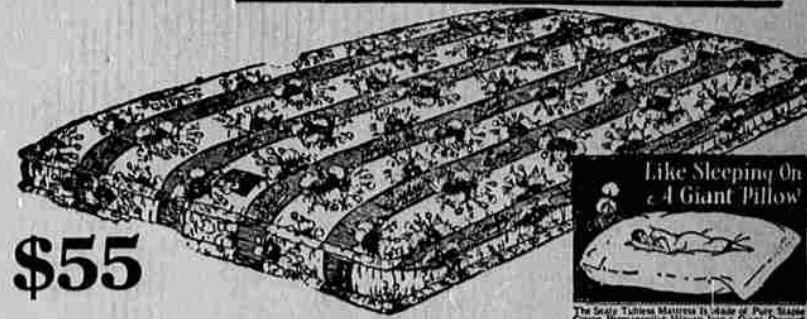
