M'NARY DEPLORES ABOLISHMENT OF 3 LAND OFFICES

Interior Secretary's Act
Not Justified by Any
Economic Reason,
He Contends.

(Associated Press Special Wire.)
SALEM, Ore., April 19.—Returning to his home here from Washington yesterday, Senator Charles McNary said there was a feeling prevalent among western senators and representatives that the action of the secretary of the interior in abolishing the land offices at Portland, Vale and Lakeview was ill advised and without consulting the convenience of the public.

"The annual receipts of the five land offices in Oregon amounted to about \$900,000 and the cost of administration and maintenance of these offices did not exceed

\$50,000," said Senator McNary. "No program of economy can justify the action of the secretary, congress contemplated that land offices in the public land states should be maintained when consistent with public service and convenience, providing the receipts justified their existence. . . . The Oregon delegation protested stoutly against this ill-advised action of the secretary, but without avail."

Senator McNary also stated that he had advised the United States veterans bureau against modification of the proposed plans for the veterans hospital in Portland. He announced an assurance from the tariff commission that the duty on cherries imported into this country would be increased within the next few weeks, but not by more than one cent a pound.

Farm Legislation
Contending that there is a growing conviction among members of both parties in congress that some form of farm relief legislation is vital if agriculture is to be placed upon a stable basis Senator McNary said he would work out the details of the relief measure in plans to introduce at the next session during his stay here, and expected to discuss them with President Coolidge and other leaders during the summer.

"President Coolidge has requested me to take the matter up with him in more detail at the earliest possible date either in Washington, or at his summer home, which he will maintain somewhere in the west this year," the senator said. "It is too early to predict what future action the congress may take in respect to farm relief legislation, but the opinion is general that some plan of legislation will be framed."

ROSEBURG MAN CUTS YEW WOOD TO MAKE BOWS

Interesting Industry Being
Developed in Douglas
County.

PRODUCT IN DEMAND

Renewal of Interest in
Archery Creates Market
for Yew Wood of
Good Quality.

An unusual and interesting occupation or industry brought to light by the home products campaign put on by the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce is that in which Earl Ulrich, of Riverdale, is engaged. For the past few years Mr. Ulrich has produced yewwood staves for archery purposes. He has located and cut yew trees all over the country and has shipped the product to 30 different states in the union to archers, bowyers and manufacturers, all of whom declare that the Oregon yewwood is the best material obtainable for bows. He has shipped out several thousand dollars worth of yewwood from this county.

Heretofore Italian and Spanish yewwood has been considered the choicest variety, but in late years, Western Yew (*Taxus brevifolia*) has had the call from experienced archers and bowyers, Mr. Ulrich declares.

"The tree itself," he says, "grows in the hills and mountains, usually at the head or along a stream or on a bench above the stream. The best is found on the ridges far from water. It is a sturdy tree, knotted and with twisted grain and with limbs standing out straight from the trunk. The bark is thin and scaly, of a reddish color. The tree prefers the shade and is remarkably prolific. The male tree is said to bear the cone and the female the bright red berry, although the bisexual trees bear both cone and berry."

"The wood is usually of a dark brown color, sometimes shading to a light yellow. It is quite hard, fine grained and easy to work and when seasoned properly takes a high polish."

"Since the maximum strength is required the bow staves and limbs are split out of the body of the tree, great care being taken in this operation. The sapwood and bark are left intact and the ends are painted to prevent checking. A perfect yew bow is unknown, as the wood itself is so full of defects and perfection is practically impossible. Live and dead knots, wind shakes, bear scratches, are a few of the things that the bowyer has to contend with."

"A man's target bow is usually six feet long and weighs in the neighborhood of 50 pounds. By 'weight' is meant the strength required to draw the arrow to the head. The ladies' bow is up to five and a half feet and pulls from 22 to 28 pounds. The hunting bow is shorter and heavier with a pull ranging from 40 to 55 pounds and being from 5 to 6 feet long."

"In late years archery has come back to its own and everywhere men and women, boys and girls are taking up this interesting sport. In the hunting field this true sportsman finds that the bow, properly used, will provide plenty of thrills and incidentally get the game; witness the exploits of Dr. Pope and Arthur Young in Africa. While the expedition was a failure in a way, due to the inability of the hunters to get close to the game, because of the openness of the country, the bag seven lions, with bows alone, speaks for itself."

"Dr. Pope an enthusiastic archer says, 'When one speaks of bows and arrows one's mind harks back to our childhood days of the barrel hoop bow and the pointed stick. Archery, or the art of shooting the bow and arrow, has its origin so buried in antiquity that no man knoweth the date of its birth. The earliest evidences are found in the flint arrowheads assigned to the third interglacial period, probably 50,000 years ago, and surely the burned or sharpened sticks or arrows were shot before the stone or bone arrowheads were invented and used.'"

"Dr. Elmer writes in Archery, 'Unquestionably the best bow wood is yew. In Northern Europe, it has been the favorite since neolithic times, as the only bow found in England that I know of, belonging to that period, was a branch of yew.'"

**KIDDIES ENJOY EASTER
FROLIC ON CAPITOL LAWN**

WASHINGTON, April 18.—Another Easter Monday found the spacious grounds of the White House set aside for the egg rolling carnival for youngsters just ten or under.

An army of children with vast stores of ammunition—colored eggs, rubber eggs, hard boiled eggs and eggs of every description—felt the urge and there was every indication that by nightfall many tired and dirty little warriors would drift away with the sandman without waiting for bedtime stories.

CONFISCATION IS FUTILE APPEAL OF STATE TRUCK MEN

(Associated Press Special Wire.)
SALEM, Ore., April 18.—The constitutional question upon which the case of R. B. Morris, et al. vs. the State Highway commission, went to the United States supreme court was based upon a contention of the truck line interests that the law passed in 1921 in effect confiscated their property without due process of law, since they had been licensed by the state to operate trucks to a full capacity of 22,000 pounds. The supreme court's decision, announced today, declared the law constitutional.

The order as first made by the state highway commission went into effect October 1, 1925, and reduced maximum truck loads to 16,500 pounds on the Columbia river highway from the Multnomah county line east to the city limits of Hood River. Another order was later made affecting state highways near the coast, particularly the Roosevelt, McMinnville-Tillamook and Corvallis-Newport highway. The orders had in view protection of the roads during the rainy season and were enforced during the time litigation was pending.

The plaintiffs further contended that the state legislature had no authority to pass the law under which the order was made in that interstate commerce was carried on by the truck lines, and that the state in accepting the roads under the federal highway act had agreed to maintain the roads and were required to do so without prescribing the kind of traffic that should pass over them.

Those points were ruled upon adversely by the United States circuit court of appeals, a decision being handed down at Portland on January 11, 1926. The opinion asserted that "if the state is innocent to protect its highways from destruction by excessively loaded trucks because, forsooth, they may be carrying interstate freight, it is difficult to understand how its right to regulate the speed or movement of such vehicles, or other
