make rescue impossible, she said.

Flood Described
From a window in the telephone office she saw houses, animals and river craft being washed down the main business section.

"Dozens of houses are completely covered by water and every business building in town is in water up to the ceiling," she said. "Hundreds of persons are marooned on Tom's hill, a little mound about a mile from town, without food, and some of them almost without clothing. The raging waters struck the town during the early morning hours and while all citizens within reach of the telephone had been warned by us at five o'clock yesterday afternoon we do not know whether all the houses were vacated."

"The waters are not rushing as fast as they were early today, but they are rising," she said. She declared she was working on the second floor of a building surrounded by seven feet of water.

While telephone officials heard of no loss of life, there were reports that dozens of negroes and whites in the poorer sections had not escaped because they were unable to leave their homes, or they believed the levee would hold. Cries and screams were heard from those sections.

Raymond's wife was away during the fight, having left her small daughter Valerie in the maid's care. She returned home at about 9 o'clock that night. There was a conversation in the bedroom but the maid could not distinguish what was being said. When she was summoned the next morning she found Raymond doubled up on the floor.

"Wise Cracks" Anger

first looked to the producers' interests and have worked from that standpoint and consequently there is a better foundation upon which to build.

He traced the history of the egg industry in Oregon from 1913, when he came to Oregon and engaged in the butter and egg business, until the present time. He showed how at that time Oregon was shipping in eggs, and how in 1918 the industry had grown until there was a surplus. Washington production shut off the Seattle and British Columbia markets, he said, forcing Oregon producers to ship to the east in competition with middle western eggs having a 5 to 6 cents better freight rate.

The plan of cooperative marketing was then formulated, he stated, and was gradually expanded. A strict standard of quality was demanded until the eastern markets have recognized the outstanding quality of Pacific coast eggs and give them preference over middle western eggs even though a higher price must be paid.

The association now has over 1500 members, he reports, working under a liberal contract or producers' agreement. Last year the
