RUM SHIP STILL HELD IN SPITE OF COURT'S DECISION

Federal Agents Refuse to Liberate Vessel Until Orders Are Issued at Washington.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SAN FRANCISCO, April 21.—Despite a stinging decision by Federal Judge George M. Bourquin, dismissing charges against the steamer Federal Ship and its crew which recently were seized under fire on the high seas by a coast guard patrol and held as liquor smugglers, the vessel and its \$1,000,000 whiskey cargo were still in custody of the customs department today.

Both United States Attorney Hatfield and the customs office declined to release the ship yesterday after the decision on the ground that they had not been authorized by Washington to do so. Accordingly, the Federal Ship was held within range of coast guard guns just inside the harbor despite the protestations of Captain S. S. Stone, who threatened to further appeal to the Panama government under whose registry the ship operates, unless a release was forthcoming at once.

Meanwhile the government's recently inaugurated policy of extending its operations against suspected rum smugglers to the high seas was without judicial sanction and no announcements were made, either here or in Washington, as to whether it would continue to seize ships beyond the 12-mile limit.

The Federal Ship was taken 270 miles at sea while avowedly on her way from Victoria, B. C., to Buenaventura, Colombia. Captain Stone at first refused to submit to arrest, and the coast guard fired five shots, two of which took effect on the main deck. Stone then capitulated. Stone's attorney then attacked the seizure on the ground that it was not precedent in law or treaty and refused to answer indictments which were returned against the captain and crew.

DENNIS BUYS RIVAL PAPER AT KLAMATH

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., April 21.—Formal announcement of the sale of the Klamath News Publishing company, morning paper, to Bruce Dennis, publisher of the Evening Herald, was made this morning. Mr. Dennis took possession of the newspaper today and will conduct it along the same news and editorial policies which have prevailed since its inception. Mr. Dennis in effecting the transfer, formed the Inland Publishing company which in turn acquired the stock of the Herald Publishing company and the Klamath News Publishing company.

The Klamath News was organized in the fall of 1923 as a weekly. It soon changed to a semi-weekly, then to a tri-weekly, and finally, about a year after its organization, to a daily.

Mr. Dennis entered the Klamath Falls newspaper field last fall when he purchased outright the Evening Herald from E. J. Murray.

Mr. Dennis is a veteran Oregon newspaper man and former owner of the La Grande Observer. Purchase price of the News was not announced.

LOOTING RAMPANT IN HANKOW; CITY NEARING PANIC

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SHANGHAI, April 21.—Looting and looting are prevalent in Hankow, said a telegram dispatched from that city today, with a panic imminent. Eighty five Americans were hugging the edge of the foreign settlement, reluctant to desert their property yet fearing to venture far inland.

It was learned authoritatively that if the Chinese at Hankow should attempt a repetition of the Nanking outrage, the foreign warships would act without delay. Among the foreign warships anchored in the Yangtse off Hankow at the present time are eight American vessels.

An unconfirmed rumor was received from Hankow that Michael Borodin, Russian advisor to the Hankow government, previously reported in a hospital in the foreign quarter of Hankow, was under detention.

From Nanking it was learned by wireless that firing between that city and Fukow, on the opposite side of the Yangtse had been resumed. Shells from Fukow fell on the railway station at Nanking, resulting in numerous casualties. The railway staff fled in panic. Nanking is held by the Cantonese (Nationalist) troops, while Fukow is in the hands of the northerners.

Marshal Chang Tao-Lin, the chief commander of the northern alliance, has ordered General Chuang Tsung-Chang, the Shanghai leader, to stop the north-south fighting on foreign ships in the Yangtse. Foreign naval authorities say that virtually all foreign ships have been fired on as a daily occurrence, the fire usually being returned and little thought being given to it.

All business property in Chungking in Szechwan province, has been sealed and padlocked. All foreigners have departed, except one American, a Japanese, two Norwegians and two Germans. Evacuated foreign bungalows have been demolished. These reports are made by Dr. H. H. McCarthy, the port physician.

David Evans, of Eugene, will also be associated with Smith in the defense, according to a previous announcement.

The announcement today completes the list of defense counsel for de Autremont. Associated in the prosecution will be Newton C. Chabey, district attorney of Jackson county; George Neuner, United States district attorney of Portland; George Roberts of Medford, and a prominent criminal lawyer for the Southern Pacific railway company, of San Francisco, whose name was not known here today.

CHICAGO, April 21.—Kansas City, Mo., has lost a chance to give American opera another Marion Talley.

For an hour last night it appeared that Miss Harriet Clark of Kansas City might be the choice of the National Federation of Music Clubs' contest \$1,000 prize of the National Opera club of America. The judges required three successive hearings of the voices of Miss Clark, Miss Kathryn Witwer of Chicago and Miss Hilda Burke of Baltimore before they could reach a decision. Even then they were unable to decide between Miss Burke and Miss Witwer, and as a result the contest prize will be shared equally by these two. Miss Clark was given third place.

Miss Witwer had one advantage over her Baltimore rival, having been awarded the \$500 prize for "best female voice" in the competition when was nationwide for American-trained artists between the ages of 20 and 31 years.

In addition to the prize award, Miss Witwer and Miss Burke are expected to share the offers of the Chicago civic opera company, the Metropolitan Opera company and the Rochester English Opera company to grant the winners auditions, with the flattering possibility of an engagement.

STATE ANSWER ATTACK ON MOTOR LICENSE ACT

SALEM, Ore., April 21.—Answering the complaint of the Oregon Stages and Parker Stages attacking the constitutionality of the new stage and bus license fees, the public service commission in circuit court today filed its answer. The commission declares that the highways of the state have been constructed at a cost to the public of \$8,000,000 and are being maintained at a cost of \$500 per mile, or \$2,300,000 annually.

The answer avers that the charges imposed by law are not sufficient or adequate to reimburse the state for the damage done by reason of use of the highways by the stage lines. The answer states that it costs Oregon practically six cents per ton mile for construction and maintenance of the highways and the part of the highways used by the plaintiffs.

The answer further alleges in its answer that the loss, if any, sustained by the plaintiffs is chargeable to the manner, method and character and extent of the operation of the stage lines, and to a condition over which the commission has no control.
